You will probably hear of more government action, as some projections say that unemployment will rise to over 20% for a while.

Now might be the time to repair props or make some new gimmicks. You could watch those magic videos that you have not seen for years. I know that I have a lot of work waiting by just cataloging many of mine. I have a wall full of magic books and lecture notes that I have not looked at in a while. I have more writing to do. I am 71 and right in the bullseye of the target for this bug, but I have no underlying health conditions. I believe my odds of surviving are good, so these next few weeks are a great time to figure out what direction I want to take with my magic for the rest of my productive years.

I can tell you that historically after great plagues, such as The Black Death in the mid-1300s, the survivors were in an extreme party mood. That could be very good for a rebound in our business. The exuberance also led to a historical period we call The Renaissance (rebirth) and the effect was profound on all parts of

Avoiding confusion and hiding our obfuscation allow the effect to seem magical.



If you are an entertainment gig worker, contract variety arts worker and want to speak out for help though a labor organization:



Tell Congress to include displaced entertainment workers in relief package

As social distancing measures are enacted and productions are cancelled across all sectors of the entertainment industry, the COVID-19 situation has become so dire for entertainment workers that it requires decisive action from the federal government. Entertainment gig workers who expected to work for a day, week, month, or season on a production are finding themselves without planned wages and benefits.

The bipartisan Families First Coronavirus Response Act (H.R. 6201) is a good start to providing relief to workers, however, the provisions on the table for emergency paid leave benefits won't apply to displaced entertainment workers because of the requirements for days worked on a job to qualify.

The unique nature of the entertainment industry means that many of the creative professionals may not work every day, or even every month. Existing paid leave programs are by and large not applicable to this workforce. Entertainment workers depend on the income from *each* project they book to ensure they can support themselves and can qualify to participate in our collectively bargained health plans. Rules designed specifically for the traditional single employer relationship, or even for multi-employer work in the construction industry are likely to exclude our members, and entertainment freelancers in general.

Entertainment workers shouldn't be collateral damage in the fight against COVID-19. We need a special Emergency Coronavirus Economic Support Benefit geared to include workers who have a bona fide, good faith offer to work that gets canceled due to the coronavirus.

Enjoy the full 1977 Special. *Doug Henning's World of Magic*. The show is magnificent entertainment. It does show the downside of a live TV show.

This show had some great stuff including the "Walking Through the Brick Wall"

Here is the infamous "reveal" (that only magicians with a VCR caught!) that

shows Henning's Double just after the moment of transformation.

It is obvious they used mirror tables on both sides and Henning just scooted out and around the back of the wall

and the hands, on that side were the double's. The curtain rose just a fraction of a second too soon, before he was

fully below the table.

It is at 42:34.



With any magic special, the magician (and his technical crew, preferably also magicians) should be able to sit in the editing room and study every effect, looking for errors. As well, the camera operators should be made to understand the nature of magic. Many of the errors, as well as, the subtleties of illusions, close-up and so on, that enhance the

spontaneity of a live performance, could be totally eliminated through camera cuts and other forms of technological trickery. But then — what would be the POINT of sending magic into millions of homes through the medium of television, if it is just pre-packed like special effects in a movie?

The problem of televised magic was apparent almost from the time of the first television sets. Take, for example, one of the major pioneers of televised magic, Mark Wilson. Even after "training" the camera operators and the technical wonks on how best to capture the magic, Mark Wilson then had a second problem to deal with: educating the home viewer by more-or-less "begging" them to believe (and strictly on faith!) that "no camera trickery of any kind is used. What the audience sees in the studio is exactly what you'll see at home!"

With Copperfield, Blaine and all who followed, it no longer matters. We all now know that everything is a trick. You can so anything on a screen.

If you are fan of storytelling patter, they you are aware of Master Payne.

Here is a captivating card reveal with a story that draws you into its premise.


Salvano had a masterful act. All the moves and methods of dove work but with cocktail glasses!


I can recall when Murray lived in Orlando and was our 2000 Convention. He was a warm and funny performer and a big hit.


Moving to Las Vegas changed his style and approach. In many ways I liked the younger Murray's work a whole lot better that the current Murray


He is a little sassier, more flip and a bit arrogant for comfort.

Originally I did the track for Wes Iseli, full time Virginia Magician because he did not want to do the well-worn Banana Bandana Trick.

Plus he wanted to continue to use Natalie as the his side kick. He worked out a role for her similar to the old "Sonny and Cher" approach.

As you may recall, Cher was always topping Sonny in the jokes and gags. Here, Natalie magically saves what looks like it went wrong.

Women seen as worse magicians despite identical skills

Male magicians are judged to be more impressive than female magicians, even when the tricks being performed are identical, new research into gender bias suggests.



Yet this bias disappears once an audience is asked to think more critically about the tricks themselves by trying to figure out their own solutions. Psychologists conclude that it is more difficult to evaluate a trick negatively, whoever it is performed by, if you struggle to explain it yourself.

The study was led by Pascal Gygax from the University of Fribourg, with co-authors including Dr Gustav Kuhn at Goldsmiths, University of London. A report of the research has been published in the open access journal Social Psychology Bulletin

Study participants were shown close-up videos of 14 magic tricks. Only the hands and arms of the magician presenting the tricks were visible. The figure wore white gloves and long sleeves which

prevented participants identifying cues about whether they were male or female.
