50/50 DRAWING Won by Carson Combs, \$16 to Carson and \$15 to the club. Meeting adjourned






Ralph Wilson in 1916 Model T "Tim Wilson's Grandfather"

#### **Model T Ambulances**

During World War I the Ford Model T was one of the most widely used vehicles. The British Army alone used some 19,000 of them. What made the Model T popular was its reliability, ruggedness, low cost and ease of maintenance and repair.

Henry Ford himself, was dead set against the war. He was one of the leading figures in the "Keep America Out of the War" movement. Even so, Ford did not refuse to sell chassis to the Military, but he made sure that Ford Motor Company did not manufacture any body parts for the military. Ford supplied the chassis, engine and running gear. These were then taken to various body and carriage makers who made the appropriate body. Both Model T's and T truck chassis were converted into staff cars, utility vehicles, machine gun cars and ambulances.

Legend has it that the first ten ambulance bodies were made out of the wood from the transport crates. Later bodies were produced by the coach builder Kellner of Boulogne, near Paris. The light wooden body was mounted on a standard Model T auto chassis and could carry three stretchers or four seated patients. The ambulance version's light weight made it well-suited for use on the muddy and shell-torn roads in forward combat areas. If stuck in a hole, a group of soldiers could lift one without much difficulty.

Many American field service men and Red Cross volunteer drivers, including writers Ernest Hemingway and Bret Harte and cartoonist Walt Disney drove Model T ambulances.









## What Is Wrong With This Picture?

Before the Model T, Ford's cars had right-hand steering, a holdover from horse and buggy days when the driver wanted to judge his distance from the road edge. With the Model T, however the driver was moved to the left side where he could better judge oncoming traffic. Also the passengers could dismount safely onto the roadside or sidewalk instead of the center of the road that was typically layered with horse manure.

The first 800 or so Model T's built had a two-pedal, two-lever system: one pedal was the brake and the other was the clutch. Forward and reverse gears were selected by one lever and the second lever controlled the parking brake. There is a very small number of surviving Model T's to have the original two-pedal, two-lever transmission, along with an early water-pump-equipped engine. In mid-1909, Ford switched to the Model T's standard three-pedal, one-lever transmission. The three-pedal system was used until Model T production ended.

In the photo you will see two levers and three pedals. There were never any cars built with this configuration. This illustration was taken from an early parts catalog. (Obviously the artist was not a Model T owner.)

#### **Pie Wagon News**

**February 19, 2020** 101 years ago today, in the news, it was announced that a parade for the returning soldiers of the Great War would be held here in the Nation's Capital. The 1914 Model T Pie Truck of the Connecticut~Copperthite Pie Baking Company was in that tribute to those who served, and the celebration of the end of the deadliest conflict known to mankind. One year ago, last year that exact same truck participated in the 100th Anniversary of the end of WWI and followed much of that same parade route down Pennsylvania Avenue.

Today we meet with the powers to be at the Museum of American History of the Smithsonian to offer them the truck for display as a gift from our family...like we did in 1903 for a pie wagon that has been on display there which has historical significance, as it was part of the revolution in sanitation, refrigeration, transportation, cooking, and marketing of foods for the household by the largest pie baking concern on the planet. It started right here in Georgetown in 1885.
