### You might even get a ride!








# "The less you know about motor cars, the more you need a **Franklin**. And the more you know, the more you **WANT** one."



That line is taken from the advertisements of The Franklin Automobile Company of Syracuse, New York. Franklins were produced there from 1902 until 1934. Most of you probably never heard of a Franklin, but they were popular and most reliable in their day. Even today there are more than 1000 active members in The H.H. Franklin Club. Franklins gained notoriety during the annual races from L.A. to Phoenix that took place from 1908 through 1915. The race was originally proposed to demonstrate an automobile's ability to cross mountains and road-less deserts. The Franklin proved itself with it's flexible, resilient construction, large wheels, light weight, full elliptic springs and air-cooled engine. They were technological leaders with the first six cylinder engines as early as 1905 and the first automatic spark advance in 1907. Franklins were, however, odd-looking cars with no radiators. They had barrel shaped and "Renault" styled hoods. Critics of H.H. Franklin agreed that he produced excellent cars, but he should build a car that looked like what the public thought it should look like. He succumbed to the pressure and in 1925 enlisted the help of outside designers, in particular J. Frank deCause, and produced some beautifully designed automobiles that included faux radiator shells and even hood ornaments. These redesigned bodies were what started the "classic" years.

The first Franklin was actually running on the streets of Syracuse in 1898. Originally John Wilkinson and John Burns designed and built a car with a 4-cycle, 4-cylinder, air-cooled, front (trans-mounted) engine. Most cars of the day were one cylinder and steered by a tiller. Franklins had a regular steering wheel system that was easy to maneuver. They were built with an Ash



wood frame which gave the car flexibility on the rough roads and trails. Since one of the great drawbacks of beginning automobiles was the frequent failures of rubber tires, Wilkinson thought that keeping Franklins lightweight would reduce the punishment to the tires. This was accomplished with the extensive use of aluminum. The air-cooled engine cylinders were cast with several cooling fins to allow heat dissipation. There was no need to cast a water jacket system into the block and no need for a radiator. Since there was no commercial antifreeze for several years yet, a great side benefit to air-cooled was it's ability to be used in cold weather. Doctors were especially grateful to have a ready to go vehicle for those cold-night emergencies.

Herbert Franklin was a savvy businessman that had purchased a patent process that was called "hydrostatic molding." This process was later renamed "Die-Casting." His first project in this new business was manufacturing a wall mounted match striker. In a few years his shop was big enough to take on the

manufacturing of an automobile. Franklin provided the money for research and development and Wilkinson's automobile was put into production. "Franklins" quickly evolved into luxury cars. They retained air-cooled engines, and extensive air plenums and fans were added to cool the six and twelve cylinder models. Wood and aluminum were still used extensively with steel supplementing the fenders as aluminum did not hold up well to road hazards.

Franklin had borrowed heavy in order to develop the 12-cylinder engine as the depression started. Just as other businesses didn't think the depression would last, it took it's toll on The Franklin Company and the creditors soon moved in and took control of the company. The 12-cylinder project was abandoned and their existing line of cars were sold at heavy discounts.

The company soon collapsed. During the 32 years the Franklin Company had produced 153,000 automobiles. However, air-cooled engines were not lost. The engineers from Franklin started their own company and started to produce aircraft engines. Long story short, Preston Tucker bought into the new company and guess what kind of engines were in the 50 Tucker automobiles?

You say, "Franklins, I've never seen a Franklin." There is a Franklin museum practically in our backyard. In Tucson, AZ there is a collection of maintained Franklins, several with some great provenance. One was even the personal town car of Mr. Franklin. Thomas Hill Hubbard acquired these autos during his years of being **THE** professional restorer of the "classic" models of Franklins. He worked for many clients, but he was best known for his work with Bill Harrah. Bill Harrah had a special place in his heart for Franklins and had a large collection of Franklins (62)



within his large collection. The Franklin Museum is on the grounds of Mr. Hubbard's estate, which consists of all the shops where the restorations took place and Hubbard's family home, a classic 30's Pueblo desert ranch house. The curator and docents are hands-on people that have personal attachments to the vehicles and extensive knowledge. Our docent, Bill, grew up in the neighborhood and at 10 years old was helping Mr. Hubbard. And just to let you know, our own Scotty, from Scotty's Castle fame, was frequently seen driving a Franklin.

Before planning your trip, check in with the museum. They are typically closed for part of the hot summer.
