

Model T Tires & Wheels

Clincher tires, demountable rims and split rims, we hear these terms at every Saturday morning breakfast, but what exactly are they? Before 1925 there were a lot of variations in tires and wheels for your Model T, especially wheels. Ford was striving to manufacture all of their own parts, but that wasn't always the case for these items. You'll find "Ford" stamped on some


wheels, but it is more likely that they will say Hayes, Firestone or Kelsey. Each manufacturer's wheels were slightly different, not making their wheels identical to their competitors. Kelsey rims would not fit Hayes and vice-versa. It was not until the mid 1920's that wheel manufacturers adapted the Hayes design and rims became interchangeable. In addition, there were periods of time when both an old and new design of a wheel was being used concurrently. In the years that Model T's were painted something other than black, wood wheels were sometimes painted to match the car.

First let's talk about rubber tires. Looking to increase the rubber's wear, chemical compounds were added to the mixture for tires. The first rubber tires on cars were white or maybe a kind of white gray due to zinc oxide in the mix. Somewhere along the line it was decided that white tires weren't esthetically pleasing. Manufacturers experimented with color by placing dyes in the rubber mixture. This was an expensive process and who wanted blue or red tires? The solution was to add carbon to the rubber. Carbon, an industrial by product, was cheap and a black tire was made. Carbon also did a better job of increasing the tires longevity.



In the beginning pneumatic tires were clincher tires. The tires were made with a bead on the edge that fit into a rounded lip on the inside of the wheel. Clinchers require a higher pressure (50 to 60 psi) to keep the tires from spinning on the wheels. Clinchers inflated to these higher pressures produce a stiff, solid ride. When balloon tires, with straight sides, became available

they would be the preferred tire. Balloon tires are inflated to between 35 and 40 psi making a much softer ride. Note: All of these pneumatic tires use rubber inner tubes.



Then there is tire size. For many years, Model T's came with $30" \ge 3 \frac{1}{2}"$ tires in the rear and $30" \ge 3"$ in the front. The thirty designates the outside diameter of the tire and the three is the width. With the advent of balloon tires, tires are now measured to the rim diameter. At or about 1925, Model T's came from the factory with 21" $\ge 4.5"$ balloon tires. The outer diameter of this tire is approximately the same size as the 30's. Also, the front and rear tires are now the same width, no longer two different sizes.



The first wheels for automobiles were adapted from artillery style wheels with wooden spokes that came from 19th century wagons and gun carriages. The wood spokes for the automobile wheels however, were fitted around a hub in a keystone fashion with miter cuts as opposed to wagon wheels that were mortised into the hub. (see picture)

A "very" few Model T's came with dished-out wood spokes on the front wheels. The thought was that the dished-out shape would allow the finished spokes to be vertical to the ground and weight would be transferred straight down to compensate for extreme camber in the front axle. These dished-spoked wheels are seldom seen, so keep a lookout. With abundant hickory forests in Michigan, Henry Ford used hickory for the spokes which proved to be the best, but not all manufacturers followed suit. In the later years there were even steel welded-spoke wheels. Then, during the "Improved Ford" era, wire wheels were the option of choice.

Road hazards and an abundance of horseshoe nails made flat tires a common problem. Breaking down your tire to patch the tube and re-inflate the tire on the side of the road was not an easy job. Manufacturers looked for solutions to ease the burden of these roadside repairs. They came in the form of demountable rims. With demountable rims, the hub, the spokes and the felloes (the rim that the spokes are attached to) stay on the car, an



outer rim is unbolted from the felloes and the tire with the outer rim slides off. You carry one or two extra tires mounted on just the outer rims. This makes for a fairly quick change.

Next, back in the shop, getting that tire off the wheel to patch your tube can be a wrestling match. That's where split rims came in. A split rim is a wheel that has a joint in the rim that can be taken apart. Splitting the rim reduces the diameter so that you can put the tube in the tire, then the rim slides in the center with a reduced diameter. The rim is then spread apart with a spreading tool. The splice is bolted in and you're ready to inflate. However, if you don't have the spreading tool, this can be a dangerous proposition.

You will find many variations with all these wheel combinations. There are even stories out there that Model T's frequently came from the factory with mismatched wheels. It's a very good chance that your Model T wheels are not a matched set. **Well, at least they worked for the first hundred years!**

Things that they learned to help make this event special for everyone:


