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SOUTH NEVADA CLUB GOES FROM ZERO TO FIFTY-EIGHT IN THIRTY-ONE YEARS

round the middle of 1992 a group of five men interested in Model T restoration and touring got together and contacted the Model T Ford Club of America to find out what had to be done to form a local club and become an official Chapter. The five were: Gary Cooper, Ralph Cordell, Harold Mann, Randi Petri, and Marvin Ray. They applied for a charter and National Liability Insurance with the MTFCA. A meeting was planned and advertised for July 26, 1992, and so the future "Southern Nevada Model T Club" was off and running.

At the meeting they added their sixth member, Don Cooper. They also elected officers for the club to meet the national club's rules: President: Ralph Cordell, Vice President: Marvin Ray, Secretary/Treasurer: Harold Mann. Other directors were Historian/Tour Master: Gary Cooper, and Membership: Randi Petri.

For the meeting an agenda was set to form bylaws and choose a club name, meeting dates, a place and times to meet, and to develop an operating budget. It was decided to have a newsletter or some formal way to communicate with members and the public of their plan to form a club for all interested in the restoration and preservation of the Model T.

The first tour was south on Las Vegas Boulevard to Fremont Street and west to Main Street. The crowd-stopping cheers, hand clapping, photo and video taking was enough to know the city had a great interest in the old cars.

Early on the club meetings were held in Gary's workshop, then at Strawberry's Café. The club added new Charter members to their roster in the first full calendar year ending in 1993: Dan O'Brian, Rex Welker, Dr. Koph, George Abernathy, Marvin Robinson, Joe Ballard, Gregg Dempsey, Michael Kerekes, Pete Proschold, Richard Hapiuk Sr., Dennis Nelson,



Bill Palmer, Larry Coon, Wayne Campbell, Burton Barrett, Frank Catania, Dick |Aggen, LaMont Hess, Jimmy Grieco, Jim Marsh, Frog LaGrow, Val Marleau, Vic Crafton, and Bill Belter.

Fast forward 31 years, the club now boasts 68 member/families and just did an amazing job of hosting the MTFCA's 58th Annual Meeting. The club decided to establish a Founder Award to be given to a deserving member each year.

After the presentation of an award to the MTFCA and their Board of Directors for "their dedicated service and efforts in representing Model T Clubs", Southern Nevada Model T Club's president, Tom Collins, asked Harold Mann to join him for the presentation of a new and special honor. Tom presented Harold with the very first Harold Mann Founder Award. This is how clubs thrive.

The Boy Who Built a Model T Family

ost Model T stories begin with an adult or a couple who fall for one of Henry Ford's quirky cars. They finally find just the right one and bring it home.

As time goes by, they do a little work on their T to get it running better and take it on family rides around town. They may even join a local club and bring their children along on an organized Model T tour. Secretly they hope their kids will love the Tin Lizzie



as much as they do. But when you're young, there are so many other exciting things to capture

other exciting things to capture a kid's attention, like friends and video games.

My Model T story is completely different. It began when I was about six. I was the one in the family who wanted a Model T. So my dad and I drove to see an old TT Truck. It was in very good condition and the owner said he would sell it for \$8,000. We did not buy it, but ever since that day I knew I liked old cars. I taught myself to draw them and have slowly gotten better at it over the years.

In 2018, I started looking online at Model Ts for sale. I wanted to get an idea of how much one would cost. I had saved some money I earned by selling pigs through 4-H, but it was still not enough. I contacted many sellers to ask about the price, but most of them never got back to me or just said no to my offer. I sold several more pigs, did chores, and worked on our family's farm, Las Vegas Livestock. My savings grew to \$6,000, but I could not find one at that price.

About a week later, I looked again on the Classic Auto Trader website. Sure enough, I found a 1924 Model T Touring which was almost exactly the type of Model T I wanted. The owner, Jim Page ("Mr. Jim"), and I talked via email for months, then dad and I called to get the story on his car.

Mr. Jim bought it from a guy trying to restore it, but he had it all wrong and sold it to Jim for "too much money" according to Mr. Jim. Over the next few years, Jim put the T together. He finished it in 1987. Mr. Jim had the car for 36 years and was ready to have his garage space back. His only grandson was not into the Model T, so he said I was the next best thing.

In January 2018, my family and I drove to Modesto, California to





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pick it up. I negotiated with Mr. Jim from \$7,500 to \$5,000 over the phone before we planned to drive up there. When we got there, he and his wife were very pleased to meet us. Ms. Page made the best brownies you have ever had!

Mr. Jim taught me and my dad how to drive it and we took a drive around the block a few times. Then we loaded it onto the U-Haul® trailer we had rented.

My family joined the Southern Nevada Model T Club, our local MTFCA Chapter. And the weekend after I bought my T, we drove it to breakfast with the club. They were so excited to meet a kid who was interested in Model Ts.

I had to remind my dad how to drive the Model T on the way to breakfast, because he had already forgotten. He stalled it twice!

In March 2018, we drove the T to Lake Mead on an 85-mile journey. We had no problems, except for the muffler coming loose, so we just took it off.

With the help of another club member and my dad, I have learned how to fix the car myself, almost every time. I have had to fix the coils, the starter, the brakes, the tires, the spark plugs, and the wheels. I also took off the water pump that was on it.

Most of my friends don't care about older cars. But I do have a few who absolutely love my Model T, including my history teacher, Mr. Webb.

I'm now a Jr. Ambassador for the Southern Nevada Model T Club. My job is to send email and texts each week for our Saturday breakfast gatherings. Unfortunately the meetups were postponed for several years because of Coronavirus. My hope was to have the club over on May 9th for a lunch my mom was making; it also happened to be my birthday.

The story above is from the article I wrote for the MTFCA's Model T Explorer newsletter in 2020, about how I got my first T at 12-years-old. I'm 15 now, and much has changed since then.

The previous owner restored the T in 1987, but with the insane amount of touring I have been doing with it, she is about ready for another rebuild. As I am writing this, my T is in pieces, scattered around my parents' garage.

I decided to restore the whole car again, after the engine started to knock and my roof practically fell apart after its last tour. So that is where my '24 is for now. Slowly but surely, I plan to restore it better than when I got it.

In the meantime, I caught the "T Bug" I'd been warned about. I bought another Model T touring car from the WAAAM Museum in Vancouver, Washington, a year or so ago. Although it came from a museum, it was in no shape to be in one!

The car was pretty rough, aside from the motor the museum had restored. I planned to turn it into a speedster. Now I'm not sure what I'll do with it, as I don't have the funds or the time to build the kind of speedster I had planned on building. I am sure I'll figure something out soon.



Both of my Model T's so far have been fantastic touring cars and have taken us over many miles of beautiful countryside roads and cities. My first tour in one of my cars was a speedster run through St. George in my '23.

It was a whole week and there were lots of mountains, so my lack of a Ruckstell axle meant lots of low pedal up the hills. Good thing it was pretty chilly so I didn't have to worry about my T overheating!

I think my favorite tour so far was one where I made good friends with another member of the Model T Club we were touring with, Barbara Beach. The tour was through Yosemite and Sequoia National Parks.

This was a progressive-tour, which means you have to haul all your gear for the tour inside the Model T. We had to pack light, because my family and I take up almost all of the room in the car. We had to stack most of our luggage on the running boards and hood. It was a sight to see.

My newly acquired friend, Barb, helped keep my car running well. I had some issues with the timer and coils and maybe even ran out of gas a few times. Our family has a history of doing that. Luckily Barb came to the rescue with her tools and spare gas can.

We have met and made many wonderful friends in this club. That alone makes it worthwhile. A big influence in my Model T hobby has been Steven Chase, a northern California Model T club member who has taken me along on many events and tours. We have had a lot of fun with Steven and look forward to many more tours with him.

Aside from the Model Ts, I also acquired a 1925 Dodge Brothers business sedan from a friend. It has been stored outside its whole life and it shows. It was sitting under a tree for some time before I got it home, so I had to get it back into running shape.

This was no easy task. It took me a few days to get it to run again, but almost six months to get the gas tank cleaned, the tires changed, and other needed things to make it drivable again.

Because most of the bolts had not been touched in 70+ years they were terribly rusted. However, with some WD-40°, a blow-torch, and a few bad words, I finally had the car in good enough shape to drive. We took

the Dodge on a Model T tour through Thousand Oaks, California with no trouble.

I even drove it to school for a few weeks after the tour, until it ran into some engine trouble. It is now sitting in our front yard faithfully waiting for me to get around to tearing into its old, tired motor.

I'm now the proud owner of two dirt bikes I ride every chance I get. I've also been working on my grandpa's 1976 F-250. It has been almost as much of a hassle as my Dodge sedan.

As a sophomore, my mom still keeps my grades in check like she did when I was 12. I managed to keep them up long enough to get my driver's permit and hopefully my driver's license in August – fingers crossed.

I've always been the one in my family who was into Ts, researching parts, and repairs. My parents help, but they mainly fetch and hold tools and watch me work.

The Accessory Corner

Hard to believe that a month has already passed, I guess being busy does make time fly and with spring in full swing there seems to be no shortage of projects to keep me busy.

The last couple of months I've been covering distributors made for the Model T by a myriad of manufacturers jumping on the accessories bandwagon for these old Fords.


This month's accessory T distributor was made by the Bosch Corporation. The Bosch company has been around for nearly a century and a half and has been making magnetos and distributors since the first automobile came on the scene. When the automobiles started racing, Bosch really came on strong with higher performance ignition systems.

The Bosch distributor is probably the most common of the T distributors you come across. Bosch produced quite a few of them and all are made from pot metal. Seems just about every Model T swap meet you go to you see one of these Bosch distributors, but most are in such poor shape due to zinc corrosion. The one pictured I purchased for the cap and the cam gear to complete another one I have but the rest of the distributor is besieged with cracking and distortion from the zinc trying to escape from the pot metal making it nothing more than a wall hanger! If you happen upon one of these Bosch distributors in good shape without any cracking or pot metal pieces missing, you're pretty fortunate.

Yet, another nifty Model T accessory for the Accessory Corner!



Meeting adjourned: 7:32PM














In days of yore, a marvel did unfold, A machine with stories yet untold, Its steel frame gleaming, polished bright, The epitome of progress, a wondrous sight.
