

Time to move on and start working to catch up on all the household and T projects that have been put to the sideline.


The weather this time of year is perfect for Model T's to take out for a spring drive!

This Model T Pie Truck was produced in the first year Ford started assembling trucks on their production line in 1914. It was purchased new by Henry Copperthite the Proprietor of the Connecticut~Copperthite Pie Baking Company the largest pie baking concern in the world and the second largest bakery of any kind in America. It has been in continuous service since new, moving on from delivering pies to being an ambassador for American industrial ingenuity and progress. For over 100 years the truck has been present at local and national events which benefit those in need. It was in the parade for the returning solders from the Great War in 1919, at the 1932 Olympics with the Olympic Pie Baking Co., and in multiple Rose Bowl Parades. The truck was freshened up and returned to Washington, D.C., where it was driven down Pennsylvania Avenue as part of the remembrance centennial honoring all men and women who served in World War I. This truck is an important part of American history as the replacement to the horse and wagon when manufacturing and mass production of delivery of goods to the market place were in its infancy. Once numbered in the thousands there are now less than a handful of these first production Model T trucks in existence. -Courtesy of Mike & Kim Copperthite



I have been given the honor of staining and finishing the wooden spokes.

I have chosen [my favorite stain] Minwax Wood Finish Golden Oak stain 210B. This is an oil-based wood stain which provides long-lasting wood tone color. It penetrates deep into the pores to seal and protect the wood and is ideal for the Pie Wagon's artillery wheel's new Hickory spokes.



istor and fission of a size -

After the 48 spokes (twelve for each wheel) are allowed to dry overnight, they receive their first of three coats of Helmsman Clear Gloss Spar Urethane. After each coat is allowed to dry at least 4 hours, (I chose to let them dry overnight) each spoke's entire surface is sanded lightly with very fine sandpaper (220 grit) to ensure an even finish and proper adhesion of the additional coats. Helmsman Spar Urethane is specially formulated to protect wood against natures



toughest conditions because it forms a protective barrier against rain and moisture and its special oils allow the finish to expand and contract with the wood as seasons, temperatures, and humidity change. Its enhanced ultraviolet absorbers reduce the graying and fading effects of the sun.

Went right to teardown of the engine and was surprised with what I found. The engine had been rebuilt but showed no use, the pistons were clean. The noises heard during the test run were thought to be connecting rods. Well the connecting rods and the main bearings were shimmed with steel shims but the excessive clearances found were not enough to cause what was heard, this was all re-shimmed using peel shims. Next stop is the transmission.

Into the transmission I went and this is when the fun began. After disassembling the transmission the problems began to show themselves. First, I must say this T does not use a magneto so no magnets. The splash paddles on the flywheel were homemade and beginning to crack (none of these were identical in any measurement). On the front side of the flywheel there were two mysterious bolts with large washers. These were removed but could not see what their purpose was. As I was cleaning the flywheel two of the triple gear pins were found to be loose, now the mystery of the mystery bolts with washers made sense. The mystery hardware was used to keep the two pins from creeping towards the block. The pin holes in the flywheel were wallowed, need a new flywheel. Surprisingly the only drum of use to this project was the low speed drum. After cleaning and inspecting the reverse drum it was found to have four cracks, two radiating from the center and the others running perpendicular to the first two and located near the band working surface. The brake drum was not found to be bad until assembly. This made a loud pop while assembling and a crack was discovered around half of its circumference on the front side.

Reassembly of the transmission went fine. The original triple gears were used their bushings needed reaming; the driven gear was kept as well as the low speed drum. All gear teeth are in good shape. A jack rabbit clutch was installed, as previously mentioned a new flywheel was sourced with new triple gear pins and the correct oil splash paddles were installed. A bronze fourth main was also fitted. This is now a very tight engine unit and I can not wait for its first start.

Once the assembly was complete I finished the engine by painting it. Rustoleum engine paints, primers and clear coats were used. The main color of the engine is called cast iron. This color compliments bodies painted in red, maroon and of course black. This engine is also accented with various brass and copper fittings and all the inspection plates, starter, generator, and intake are black. The exhaust manifold was left natural. This engine came out looking very nice and will add great value to the Pie Wagon and will gain many admirers when they have a look under the hood! +++++





This exquisite, marvelous gift from the Michael Copperthite Family is a metal folding chair of a patented design made some time in the late 1910s by the C.A. Buffington & Co. manufacturers in Berkshire, New York. This company specialized in designing all sorts of equipment for the newfangled automobiles of the "Horseless Age", including special jacks for changing tires, luggage carriers, and special automobile folding chairs like this one.

With fifteen million of Henry Ford's Model Ts being built between 1908 and 1927 meant that at least 15 million folks enjoyed a new type of mobility and could spend their leisure hours picnicking, camping, and exploring with their new cars. A new market

developed for articles like driving gloves, much needed touring maps, and collapsible chairs. You can see from the photo with Gary holding the chair how compactly the chair folds, allowing several to fit into the limited stowage of a Model T Ford.

The Accessory Corner

Time seems to be moving so fast, seems just like yesterday that I wrote the last Accessory Corner article, I guess time really does fly when you're having fun (or in my case really busy!).

Last month I covered one of the many Model T accessory distributor manufacturers that was made by the Atwater Kent Co.. This month is another distributor type system that is really unique, and rare!

What makes this so unique is that it is a three-in-one setup. It has a water pump, an oil pump, and a distributor setup all in one. If you didn't want the distributor, you could also order it with a timer riser to make accessing the timer easier.

I picked this up last year at an auction in Iowa. The auction had a ton of T & A parts and lots of farm related equipment. I got there just as the auctioneer was starting to auction the T stuff and noticed it on a pallet with a few other T parts he was auctioning, and I bought the whole pallet of parts.

Called a Tri-Unit it was made by a company out of St. Louis, MO. called the Unit Products Co. and later changed to the Tri-Unit MFG Co.. I can't find much on the company so it may have been a short run company formed just to manufacture these units. Like so many of these accessory companies... they manufacture a product for a short time then disappear.

A rare accessory, that in my years of collecting T accessories, I've only seen 2 others, with one housed in the Speed Museum in Lincoln, NE and the other in a private Model T collection.

There's a few moving parts and a lot of machining so these were quite expensive to make in the early twenties and sold for nearly one seventh the cost of an entire Model T!
















Tri-Unit mounted on a T engine with a Frontenac head at the Museum of American Speed, in Lincoln, NE.

The weather has been perfect for Model T driving!

Make sure you join us on May 6th when we meet at Vickie's at 8 a.m. and drive over together to Dean's Place for breakfast!

Let's start spring off right by returning to our roots and start driving as a group again!

If you don't want to drive your Model T or if you don't have a Model T- meet us anyhow and be the "caboose" in our Model T train!











TT The Tour Master's are the leader of all tours unless he/she delegates this role to a designated Tour Leader.

TT Model T cars should stay in their assigned order, with no passing.

TT Model T's should not scatter out but leave a five- car length between cars so on the two lane roads they can be safely passed by people not in our group. Don't follow too closely and don't lag too far behind.

TT Keep your speed constant and avoid sudden spurts. Normal touring speeds will be established at the start of the tour by the Tour Master or Tour Leader.

TT In case of trouble, flip on your car headlights. Watch the car behind you, if their lights come on, turn yours on also and start slowing down. The car in front of you will pass on the signal up the line, the leader will stop the tour as soon as it can be done safely. If you must stop suddenly, give the cars behind you a warning, and pull off the road as far as possible. The cars behind you will stop, the leader will stop the tour and return to see what assistance is needed. No one is left stranded on the road on purpose. If signals are given that you need help, you will probably get more help than you ever dreamed of. Some spare parts, water, tools, and gas are carried along on every tour. Try to take something along you might need, but if you don't have what you need, chances are that someone else does or will help you get it.

TT Cell phones shall be the primary way of communicating during tours. Please obey the law when using your cell phone by pulling over, using blue- tooth, or having your passenger make calls. The Tour Master or Tour Leader will compile a list of tour member cell phone numbers and will distribute it at the start of each tour.

TT Modern cars are welcome to accompany us on tour. They must follow at the rear of the tour and never pass. They must stay at the rear unless the Tour Leader gives them permission to pass in order to take pictures, set up a picnic site, meet at the next designated stop or other reasons that warrant the use of greater speed.

TT Arrive at the tour departure place in enough time to attend the drivers' meeting. The Tour Master of Tour Leader will/ may assign car positions and mention departure times, rest stops etc.

TT Pull over as far to the right as possible when traffic is backed up behind us. The last car in line will determine when to pull over. If possible (i.e. cell signal available) he/she will call the Tour Leader and let them know he/she is pulling over for traffic. If you see a car behind you pull over, but his/her lights are not on, you will know it is for traffic and not for a mechanical problem. Watch the car behind you.

TT We strongly recommend you carry a fire extinguisher in your Model T.

Tours are lots of fun and are very safe. Bring your "T" out and come along. Every member who has ever toured has needed help at one time or another, so, if you ever need help, don't be too proud or embarrassed to ask for it. Most of our members just love to tear into somebody else's Model T.
