

The 1957 Zephyrhills Founders' Days celebration commemorating the town's 47th anniversary, wound up in a blaze of glory Tuesday night after limping off to a feeble start Monday be-

Tuesday the big day, dawned bright and clear, however. Many of the participants in the Tourist Club's shuffleboard tournament, who had come from cities of the central and west coast districts on Sunday and Monday, stayed over purposely to see what made a Zephyrhills Founders' Day tick. Side by side with hundreds of residents and winter visitors, they found out before the sun set on a Fifth Avenue that bore marks indicating a good time had been had by all.

With a carnival going full tilt, a mammoth parade swung down Fifth Avenue at 10 o'clock, moving to spirited music by four highs stepping Pasco County bands -- Zephyrhills' own pride and joy, St Leo's, Pasco High and Gulf High of New Port









## **Double Wrestling**



# City Celebrates 52nd Birthday

Zephyrhills' Founders' Day festival shifted into high gear Tuesday after getting off to a slow start Monday when rain threatened during the setting up for the "big day."

And a big day it was! The biggest parade ever staged here was witnessed by an estimate 12,000 persons, making the turnout the biggest on record. Thousands of people lined Fifth Ave. on both sides the length of the parade route while untold hundreds jammed the downtown business area, center of activities for the

Balmy weather brought senior citizens and youngsters alike out to the festival. Carnival rides and concessions by Southland Amusements got a big play, as did home town concessions.

Mack Sennett cops, recruited from the rank and file of Junior Chamber of Commerce members, saw to it that the Lions Den did a lucrative business with proceeds going into the Lions Club's eyesight conservation fund.

The parade in which more than 100 decorated floats and automobiles, bicycles, marching and horseback units were entered, passed in front of a reviewing stand set up at the Chamber of Commerce building where John E. Lanham officiated as master



# Thousands Enjoy 54th Founders' Days

March 12, 1964

The woman living longest time in Zephyrhills and registering at the Chamber of Commerce was Mrs. Reese F. Knapp, who has lived here all of her 78 years.

Runner-up to Mrs. Knapp was Mrs. L. D. Geiger, who was born March 10, 1888, between Richland and Abbott Station (which in 1910 was superseded by Zephyrhills).

Hats were doffed and right hands placed over hearts in salute as American flags carried by color guards of World War I Veterans, Veterans of Foreign Wars and the American Legion swept by. Miniature American flags fluttered from a decorated car in which Gold Star Mothers rode and a station wagon with American Association of Retired Person as passengers employed a red, white and blue decorative motif.
