More vendors, more people make this year a bigger, better event than last year's scaled-down version

Bigger and better aptly describe this year's Scarecrow Festival compared to last year's scaled-down version of the annual event at Pioneer Florida Museum and Village. Unlike last year when the coronavirus pandemic led to events being cancelled or restricted, the Dade City venue was packed on Saturday with families who enjoyed more activities and vendors than last fall.

"We did have it last year and we had half the people," said Stephanie Black, director of the museum and village. "I think it was a stellar day for all. The vendors had a good day and everybody had a good time."

Especially boys and girls who chased giant bubbles near the main stage, built their own scarecrow out of hay and donated clothes or played fun games with arts and crafts in the barn. Plus, there were plenty of smiles on the faces of youngsters walking around displaying their costumes for the festive event.

Vanessa Bratcher, of Dade City, brought her daughters Aubriella Hernandez, 4, and 6-year-old Arianna Hernandez, to the festival.

"It's a good experience, that they get to build their own scarecrows," Vanessa said.

Roman Powers, of Spring Hill, helped build scarecrows with family members that included 10-year-old

Council compensation, SVB Phase II construction, Train **Depot proposal highlight** council meeting

Uses of city property and updates to several building projects were topics during Monday's Zephyrhills City Council meeting

There were four items in the City Manager's Report. The City Manager's items were moved to the top of the agenda to facilitate an early departure from the meeting by Zephyrhills City Manager William Poe Jr. The first item would have approved a fee proposal for architectural and design services for SVB Phase II. The city of Zephyrhills was awarded a state appropriation in the amount of \$4,665,000 to construct four hard courts and an indoor multi-use facility at the SVB Tennis Center. The fee proposal would be compiled by Furr, Wegman & Banks Architects, P.A at the cost of \$283,868 and include the services of: performing programming and schematic design along with construction documents, assisting with bids, and performing construction administration along with substantial and final completion inspections.

Poe noted that the city still has one year and nine months to spend the appropriation money. In the wake of the recent budget overruns with Phase I, councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson has pushed a more collaborative relationship going forward with the project's architect, contractor and the city. With Phase I, the contractor and architect worked under what is called a design/build scenario where the architect works for the general contractor. This method allowed for some surprises when Phase I was completed.

A budget overrun of \$105,709 was approved by council at the Sept. 20 meeting. Wilkeson and the rest of council want to ensure the same type of overruns don't happen with Phase II and so the city, the project's architect and contractor are entering into a GMP or Guaranteed Maximum Price relationship. This will likely foster a more inclusive dialogue between the three entities, along the way and

Boy Scouts organize bowling tournament for wreaths

Chapter raised funds for Wreaths of America as part of a humanitarian project for military graves in Bushnell

Despite having to reschedule from Saturday to Sunday due to a time conflict, a fundraiser by a local chapter of boy scouts turned out to be fun and help a good cause. The result is that milītary graves in Bushnell will be adorned by wreaths.

As part of Wreaths Across America, Boy Scout Troop 117 of Zephyrhills hosted a bowling tournament Sunday afternoon at Pin Chasers off U.S. 301 in Zephyrhills. Proceeds for the inaugural bowling tourney mostly came from the \$20 entry fee and benefited the wreaths program with graves to be decorated at the Florida National Cemetery in Bush-

Including the entry fees from 28 bowlers, a silent auction, 50-50 raffle and wreath sponsorships, scoutmaster Meagan Sammons said the fundraiser brought in \$583.
"That was about the target of what

we wanted," she said.

For some, the benefit proved to be a bit more personal than for others. Alicia Conner's 15-year-old son Jacob Conner, who attends Pasco High, is a scout. They have visited the graves of Alicia's uncle Mark Longway, who served in






that God never expects us





could also lay any budget overages at the feet of the general contractor. Things are uncertain today with labor shortages and supply prices soaring. This new format should help foster more communication. It passed 5-0.

"The Phase I overruns were small compared to the project's budget but we still have to be good stewards of the public's mon-Wilkeson said.

Second item would have approved a task assignment for engineering design services for SVB Phase II by Cornelison Engineering & Design, Inc. or CED. CED will prepare a conceptual layout for city review and approval. If approved, CED would prepare drawings, specifications, and related documents for permit submissions and construction of the improvements. Tasks include construction plans, permitting, geotechnical engineering, surveying, landscape and irrigation design, and construction administration. Funding of \$58,772 for engineering services would be provided by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity through the \$4,665,000 state appropriation. The item was passed 5-0.

Item three would have approved Piggyback Agreement No. 41-21-30 with North Star Place Branding & Marketing. The branding and marketing study will allow Zephyrhills to communicate a clear message and identity to attract investors, businesses, tourists and provide a consistent representation of the city. The contract amount is \$72,500. After some discussion and in the absence of a City Public Information Officer to facilitate the effort, councilman Lance Smith made a motion to deny the item and it passed 5-0.

Item four was regarding use of Zephyrhills City property at the Train Depot was pulled from the agenda for further discussion. Next up was a presentation by the Zephyrhills JROTC Pro-

gram. Cadets detailed the number of events the program participates in, most notably they hoped to promote a Ruck-A-Thon at the high school on Oct. 23 to raise funds in order to cover expenses for their Raider Season. The JROTC program at Zephyrhills was praised universally by the council, with particular note of their efforts cleaning grave sites at Oakside Cemetery

Next, Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield issued a proclamation in recognition of National Manufacturing Day. There are 1,600 American Manufacturers that participate in National Manufacturers Day, observed on the first Friday of October. Century Boats, an American boat company based in Zephyrhills, built thousands of ships for the U.S. Navy during World War II. Century would go on to be one of the most innovative and stylish boat lines of the era. CEO Skip Sorenson addressed council, stating that the Zephyrhills

facility employed 60 people. The next item showcased a Non-Emergency Request and Work Management Software Application. IT Director Mike Panak demonstrated how the new application worked. It enables city residents to report things like a pothole, a code violation or other nonemergency concern directly to the city. The app can be downloaded from the Apple or Google stores and interfaces directly with the city website. The item needing action was passed 5-0.

In the Consent Agenda, three items required action. One would have approved a grant agreement, known as the Competitive Florida Partnership Grant from the State of Florida Department of Economic Opportunity. The \$35,000 award, which is actually a maximum reimbursement for expenses incurred in developing an Economic Development and Disaster Resiliency Plan.

Two would have approved a Statewide Mutual Aid Agreement from the Florida Division of Emergency Management. The State of Florida is vulnerable to a wide range of disasters that are likely to cause the disruption of essential services and the destruction of the infrastructure needed to deliver those services. The Emergency Management Act, Chapter 252, provides each local government of the State of Florida with the authority to develop and enter into Mutual Aid Agreements within the state for reciprocal emergency aid and assistance in case of emergencies too extensive to be dealt with unassisted. The item is expected to have no fiscal impact and approval was recommended by staff.

The third item would approve a resolution establishing compensation for the mayor and city council members. It stipulated that a monthly increase of \$100 for council member and mayor would be furnished but not until their next term. The fiscal impact for the current fiscal year would be \$1,200. Fiscal years 2022-23 and 2023-24 would both see an increase of \$2,400. Fiscal year 2024-25 would see a \$1,200 increase. All three items were bundled and passed together 5-0.

Just two Business Items got their seconds readings. The first, was to codified the property rights amendment, put forward in previous meetings, guaranteeing certain property rights to citizens. This brings the city in compliance with House Bill 59, which became law on July 1.

Item two codified the rezoning and land use from an annexed Pasco County property, about 12 acres in size, off Simons Road. The land use change goes from County RES-6 to City Residential Urban and the zoning from County-AC to City Planned Unit Development. It was passed 5-0.
