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Economic Summit portends major growth and expansion

The summit brought familiar faces and some not so familiar but all talking up the economic potential of the city and surrounding area

Zephyrhills City Manager William Poe Jr. welcomed the speakers and audience to the Oct. 13 event. The first part of the meeting was titled, "City of Zephyrhills - Growth & Expansion." Poe would actually be the first speaker. He talked up the \$10 million the city received in grants over the past three wars and high ceived in grants over the past three years and high-lighted some of the projects at the Zephyrhills Municipal Airport (ZMA). Two box hangers at \$1 million each, a taxiway to the F Terminal and runway extension were projects already underway at the airport.

Next up was Tampa Bay Regional Planning Council (TBRPC) Economic Development Planner Harry Walsh addressing the audience via video call streamed into the room. Walsh brought up a topic that's becoming more and more common at city council meetings, that of "Industry Clusters." Walsh detailed the TBRPC's recent Aviation Cluster Study and how it could benefit the area. The ZMA is a General Aviation airport, meaning it accommodates most flight activity except, "big commercial and cargo planes" according to Walsh. He pointed out that while Covid-19 severely curtailed commercial airline traffic, general aviation remained, "mostly steady" and had already reached the type of traffic seen since before the pandemic.

'General aviation has been mostly fine and ZMA is

well-situated for development," Walsh said.
Walsh wrapped his presentation touting "Aviation Clusters," meaning connected businesses all in one area - restaurants for employees to eat at, distribution centers near manufacturing - that type of thing. He cited a study in Duval County, where Jacksonville is located, as having produced a great deal of revenue and dozens, if not hundreds of jobs.

Cancer survivor shares her story for inspiration

AdventHealth Zephyrhills nurse overcomes breast cancer and encourages others to get screened

Few people witness first-hand how life can sometimes hang in the balance during an emergency room procedure. Plus, not every-one diagnosed with breast cancer survives.

Elizabeth Ann Campbell, affectionately called "Sam" by family and friends, has done

A nurse anesthesiologist at AdventHealth Zephyrhills, which also houses the Simpson Breast Health Center, Campbell won her battle with breast cancer and encourages others to keep up with their screenings. That is why she felt that it was imperative to share her story, reasoning there was no better time than during breast cancer awareness month.

"I wanted to do this; to tell people don't be afraid to seek help and don't be afraid to do the test regularly," said Campbell, who never smoked and has no history of cancer in her family. "It happened to me. It could happen to you. I know what growing old does to your body. I thought I was in good health till this hit me. I was surprised."

According to the American Cancer Society, about one in eight women develop breast cancer over the course of their lifetime with an estimated 85 percent of breast cancers occurring in women with no family history of it.

Campbell, 65, considers herself extremely fortunate to have battled a disease that can sometimes be fatal. In fact, her mother-in law was diagnosed with breast cancer at the same time as she was last spring, underwent treat-

ment, and passed away in early October.

Campbell, whose nursing career spans 28 years, found a lump one morning last March and shared that information with some co-

workers at the hospital. "It was big and it was hard," she recollect-

Campbell then went to Dr. Kimberly Apple, a general surgeon at the hospital. Campbell often is the anesthesiologist when Apple performs surgeries.

"It's a little more personal, I guess," Apple said of treating her friend and co-worker. "You

Paulie Palooza Music Festival sets fundraising records

On its 10th anniversary, the annual event raises \$26,000 for Gulfside Hospice

Like many things that were either cancelled or postponed during the height of the coronavirus pandemic, some activities and events that were revived are now bigger and better than ever before. On the local front, the Paulie Palooza Music Festival last Saturday in downtown Zephyrhills actually turned out to be the best ever.

Last weekend marked the 10th anniversary of the annual event, founded by Paul Correia in an effort to show his appreciation to Gulfside Hospice for taking care of his late father. It brought 40 vendors, six musical bands and hundreds of people downtown.

"The weather broke for us perfect," said Correia, owner of Sun State Aluminum. "It was a little warm, but it didn't rain. I call it the quiet return. Everybody wants to come back, but nobody wants to go crazy. It was a good time."

Even better is the fact that the festival, which serves as one of four primary fundraisers for Gulfside Hospice, proved to be a record-setting event. It raised \$26,000, which is about \$11,000

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

She really tried very hard to take this all in stride," Apple continued. "She was planning to come back to work and I told her that she's taking a week off. Her focus has always been on

Within a week, Campbell underwent the first of two operations to remove the cancer, the first being a lumpectomy and the second one to scrape out more tissue. A month of radiation

treatments followed and now she is cancer-free. "I was lucky to get treated so fast," she

Campbell also appreciated the support from her sister Joni Gauger, best friend Jean Hill, brother James Burnside and "everybody


Apple noted the importance of getting regular mammograms and to act quickly.



was next to speak. Vande Berg spoke about the importance of planning and how it related to the rampant growth in East Pasco County and Zephyrhills.

'We have important decisions to make to ensure resiliency and ensure the economic base for the community is solid," Vande

He spoke of updates to the City's Comprehensive Plan moving forward and of an "Industrial Corridor" city planners hope to develop and cultivate. Vande Berg went on to discuss the city's historical value and touted the CRA.

"We want to create a vision that has goals and reflects a broad

base of community interest," Vande Berg said.

Vande Berg then went on to use as examples some of the larger municipal projects already underway, like the 7th Street improvements, the intersection of Simons Road and Eiland Boulevard, as well as the State Road 56 extension. The list continued with mention of the Dairy Road extension, the US 301 and Pretty Pond improvements, the Abbott Square development, Simons Property, Trotter's Crossing, Zephyr Commons Apartments, 15th Avenue townhomes, among others.

Next was president of CBD Real Estate Investment David

Waronker, chiming in via video call. Waronker touted the 20 years of business and the development of 20 properties in Zephyrhills.

"There is so much more that we want to give back to the city," Waronker said.

He quantified it by stating that CBD provided eight full-time scholarships last year but did not specify just what kind of scholarships they were. He stated that one of the big needs was both hotels and quality rental apartments.

Vice president of marketing for Metro Development Group Vaike O'Grady spoke about the rapid sales of homes in the Abbott Park/Zephyr Lakes Development, as well as the solar street lights.

Dr. Randy Stovall, the Chairman of ZEDC and the Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce, followed. Stovall revealed highlights from the recent Biz Walk, the first of its kind since 2014. He noted that 57 businesses completed surveys about their experience in Zephyrhills.

"It's a way to take the pulse of the business community," Stovall said.

Some of the statistics pointed out were that: the average business had been in the area for at least 20 years, 75 percent said they had difficulty finding quality employees and that 49 percent had plans to hire people. Stovall pointed out the two PHSC campuses in the County and nearby universities of Saint Leo and South Florida.

Tom Ryan and Turner Arbour of the Pasco Economic Development Council (PEDC) spoke about large tracts of developable land near the ZMA, and how they are being talked about at the top levels of the state government. They continued to discuss the area and its potential connectivity to major roads and highways. They continued on about job creation, although the cited study listed: sales, office administration and food service as the top three occupations in the area. This brought out an earlier comment by Melissa Parks from Habitat for Humanity, stating that a person needs to make \$20 per hour to afford an apartment in Pasco County. She went on to state that one-third of created jobs in Pasco County made less than \$20 per hour.

Last to take the podium was Pasco County Commissioner Ron Oakley. Oakley touted many of the municipal projects in the county, such as the paving of Wire Road, improvements on State Road 54 East, the Diverging Diamonds at I-75 and State Road 56 recently back underway after a stall when the contractor defaulted. Oakley went on to detail future projects like the realignment of State Road 52 and the rebuilding of Lacoochee. He also spoke of the small business boom and the opening of the Wesley Chapel District Park Recreational Complex.

Wrapping up the meeting, State Senator Danny Burgess dropped in via conference call, while in Tallahassee. He spoke of the excitement in the state capitol about East Pasco County and Zephyrhills. He spoke of the National Guard coming to the area and how it would be a "big economic driver." Lastly, he praised the efforts of local politician and Senate President Wilton Simpson.

more than the previous high set in March of 2020. Last spring's Paulie Palooza was virtual and that generated about \$10,000.

"We had a big crowd and a steady crowd," said Leesa Fryer, Gulfside Hospice's fundraising and event planning specialist. "Over \$10,000 more on the 10th anniversary, how great is that? That's a huge leap. We're very excited

The proceeds are spread to hospice patients and families throughout Pasco County, not just the east side.

"These fundraising efforts are important," Fryer said. "We are a non-profit and we turn no one away, regardless of their ability to pay.

The festival marked just the second event that Main Street Zephyrhills

contributed to in the past year, following Music & Motorcycles in September and preceding Halloween Howl on Oct. 30. T'm delighted that Paulie kicked off our second event and

the community really appreciates what they're doing with Gulf-side Hospice," said Faith Wilson, Main Street's director. Aside from the aforementioned vendors and food trucks,

the crowd was entertained by six bands. Correia plays with Sand Spurs, but also got on stage to jam with some other bands. "This is stuff I just like to do," he said. "This is all for fun."

During a break in the music on stage, members of Gulfside Hospice surprised Correia with an acoustical guitar in a shadow box and he was emotionally shaken up a bit.

"I had no idea at all," he said. "It was a miniature acoustic guitar. I did tear up, because I didn't expect to get anything out of this thing.

The idea to raise money for hospice came about 10 years ago when Correia and a handful of friends talked about playing music for people. It took off and initially became a component of the Ride for Hospice fundraiser with the Pasco Sheriff's Mounted Posse. It has since transformed into its own all-day music festival that, before this year, had raised more than \$71,000 to support hospice patients and families.

The Paulie Palooza, which also has taken place at Skydive City, adjacent to the Zephyrhills Municipal Airport, and the large public venue near the airport as well, was relocated to downtown

I have been involved with Gulfside since my father passed

Zephyrhills three years ago. away and I really do appreciate all the help they give to the patients and the family," Correia said. "It has been 10 years and we have a great following."







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
