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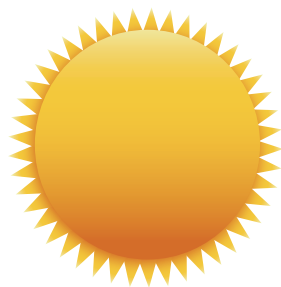

Early voting sites are open in the county through Saturday; here's a breakdown of what to expect

As of Oct. 25, more than 60 million Americans have already cast their 2020 ballots, according to the US Elections Project. This means that a whopping 43.9 percent of the total number of ballots cast in 2016, have already

been cast in 2020. It is clear that Americans are galvanized for the 2020 election. Floridians have already cast over six million votes, as of Oct. 25, totaling 42.8 percent of registered voters.

If the numbers carry out, this will be the highest voter turnout (65 percent) since 1908. If you're in the group that has already voted, you can skip to the next story. If you have still yet to vote or are undecided on a candidate or amendment, this story will be a great resource.

Let's start with the voting process. If you're voting by mail, you should have long since requested and received your mail-in ballot. If you haven't by now, it's too

Daylight saving time is Nov. 1

It is time to fall back as it already has become noticeably darker earlier in the evenings

By now, everyone can see with their own eyes that it is noticeably getting dark earlier in the evenings. It also has been getting a bit brighter in the morning of late. That's par for the course with daylight saving time.

Daylight saving time, a change of clocks that occurs twice per year, ends on Nov. 1. It began March 8. To avoid any confusion about the longstanding traditional time change, it is advisable to follow this age-old adage: fall back and spring forward.

Falling back in time will officially be marked Nov. 1 at 2 a.m. That is the time when clocks will be pushed backward. For those not up at that early morning hour, it is recommended by set clocks back by one hour before going to bed.

For some people, like Zephyrhills Police Chief Derek Brewer, there is no real difference in daylight saving time whether the changes occur in the fall or the spring, for that matter.

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Tax collector offices will be accepting donations to help build memorial

During the month of November Pasco County Tax Collector Mike Fasano's five offices will be accepting donations to help build the Pasco Fallen Law Enforcement Officers Memorial. Each year Pasco County holds a memorial service to honor law enforcement officers who were killed in the line of duty. However, Pasco County is the only county in Florida without a permanent memorial that can be visited year-round. Local attorney Craig LaPorte heads the drive to raise funds to build such a memorial and has asked Fasano to assist.

"It is especially important in this time of civil unrest and disrespect toward law enforcement that we give recognition to those in our society who place themselves in harm's way to protect us," said attorney LaPorte. "That is why we need to provide our community with a memorial to our law enforcement heroes who paid the ultimate sacrifice in the line of duty."

"Nobody but a law enforcement officer truly understands the risk they take every time they step onto the street to ensure our community is safe," said Fasano. "I have long supported law enforcement at every level. When I was asked to assist in raising funds to build a permanent memorial to these brave individuals, I was honored to make the memorial our Charity-of-the-Month for November. To have something that will stand for decades to come that will bring honor to the brave officers who died enforcing the law in Pasco County is something we can all be proud of."

Sarah Vande Berg Championships scheduled for Jan. 25-31, 2021

The SVB Championships, a USTA Women's \$25,000 event, begins Jan. 25

The United States Tennis Association (USTA) has announced that the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis and Wellness Center in Zephyrhills, will host the SVB Championships, Jan. 25-31, 2021. The tournament, a USTA Pro Circuit event, is the first tennis event of the year in Florida and attracts many players fresh from the Australian Open.

The field for the \$25,000 USTA Pro Circuit Event will feature 32 singles players and 16 doubles teams. Players ranked as high as No. 40 in the world typically compete in USTA Pro Circuit events. The qualifying rounds begin Jan. 25 and will determine the final four singles players in the field. Main Draw matches begin Jan. 26, 2021 at 10 a.m.

Hosted by the brand-new Sarah Vande Berg Tennis and Wellness Center, the tournament is a \$25,000 event and will host some of the best women's professional tennis players

in the world. The SVB Championships and the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis Foundation will give children a chance to play, regardless of their financial situation. Funds raised through the Sarah Vande Berg Championships not only help provide the opportunity to host a world-class tournament, the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis Foundation, outstanding youth, and adult programming, but also support year-round non-profits, businesses and charities in our community.

The annual Sarah Vande Berg Championships, is expected to make a significant economic impact to the community, but also provide countless outreach opportunities during the week as the women's professional players will spend time with hundreds of school children across our community.

From his perspective, along with that of his entire staff, a time change has no bearing on crime or other happenings within the city limits.

"I don't think it has any affect," Brewer said of the daylight saving time bi-annual occurrence. "We focus on trends and other factors, and less about whether there's sunlight or not."

For others, a time change that affects various degrees of sunlight at a particular time of day can be influential. Tammy Whitworth, the longtime leader of a Girl Scout Troop, said her girls are made aware of the changes in daylight saving time. More so in the spring, she reasoned.

"We tell them, but we don't really do anything about it," she said, adding, "We remind them, especially in the spring when we have to spring forward, because that's in the middle of our Girl Scout Cookie Sales."

Another local resident expressed a bit of concern about the upcoming time change. Melonie Monson, executive director for the Greater Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce, noted that getting dark earlier could affect some local businesses.

"My biggest concern when the clock falls back this time of year is it getting dark earlier, and does that mean that it hinders our businesses," she questioned. "I know that when it's dark

out I just want to be tucked into my home."

In the United States, the initial daylight saving time recognition at the Capitol Building took place in 1918. That spring, clocks were moved forward by one hour. Virtually all areas of the U.S. and Canada observe daylight saving time with exception on the North American continent being Arizona. Not on the continent, others exempt from the traditional observances are Hawaii, along with and the overseas territories of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, American Samoa, Guam and the Northern Mariana Islands.

The idea for daylight saving time stems from one of our founding fathers, Ben Franklin. A statesman and scientist who settled in Philadelphia, Franklin proposed the idea in 1784.

Written to the editor of *The Journal of Paris*, he noted that Parisians could save on candles by getting out of bed earlier in the morning during the late fall and winter months, making use of the natural morning light instead. By his calculations, the total savings by the citizens of Paris would be the approximate equivalent of \$200 million today.

In North America, daylight saving time was first observed in 1908 in Thunder Bay, Ontario. Germany, Austria and other European Countries followed with the U.S. officially adding it in 1918.

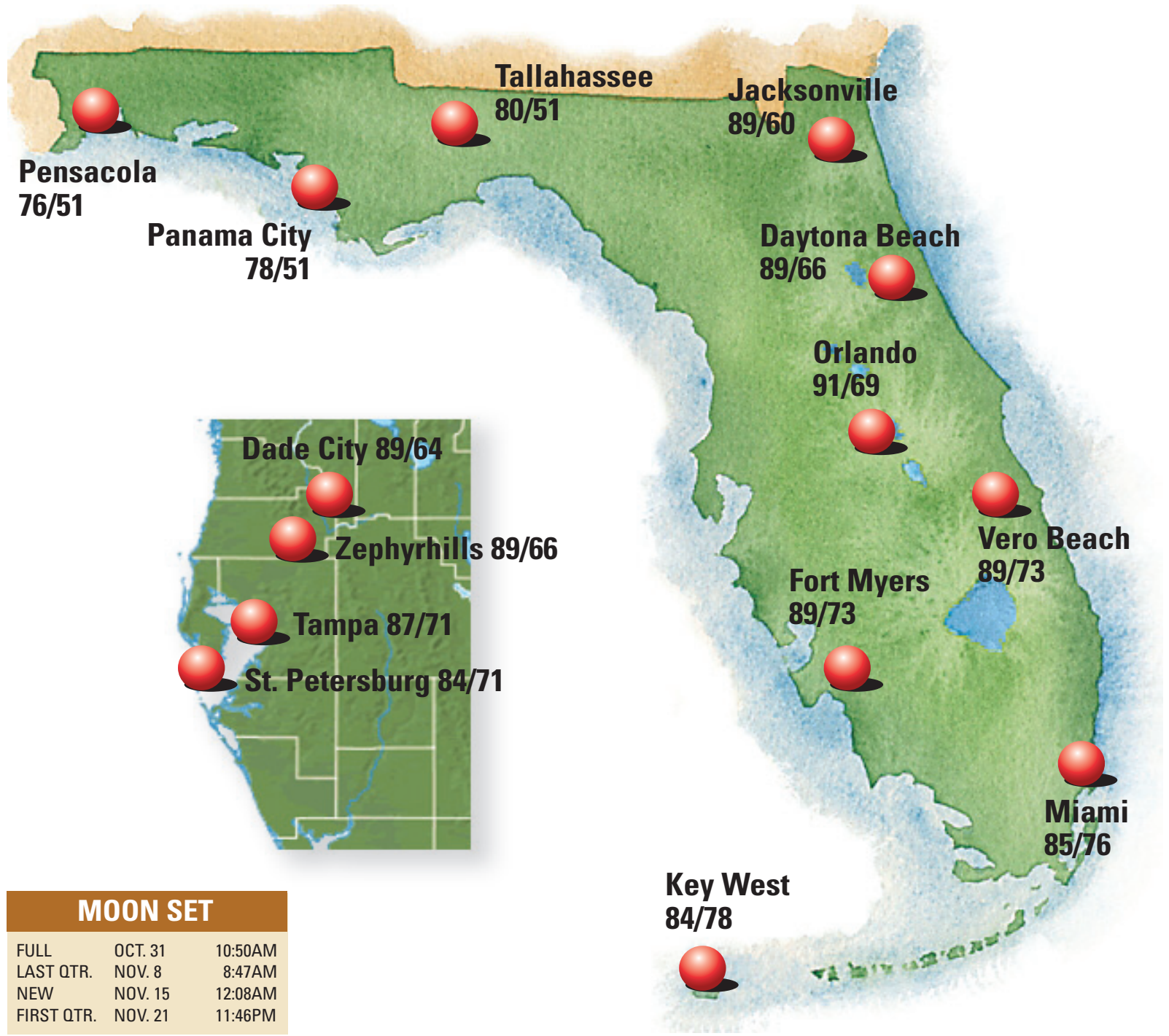

"It's been a challenging year," said Burgess, emcee of the chamber's annual banquet for the past four years. "All of you have been through hell in one way or another and we realize that. The amazing part of this whole thing is how resilient you are and how you're bouncing back."

While the theme of the community event changes annually, the venue was new this year. The chamber's traditional banquet had taken place at the St. Joseph's Parish Center for the previous four years. Last Thursday's banquet was held at Silverado's new glass events center, which opened last year under the new owner, A.J. Patel.

"This venue was a dream of his," Burgess said. "It's just such a great added value to something we know and love. This builds on the legacy."

While dinner was served and before the awards were announced, music from the 1920 were played over speakers by Q-Line Entertainment. That Zephyrhills-based company also played music during Burgess' campaign stop at Silverado's new venue in the summer.

Awards were doled out in five categories as tokens of appreciation from the chamber. An elections committee worked their way through the various candidates of individuals and organizations to determine the winners.

The Diamond Award, which goes to a non-profit organization, was the first to be announced by Monson. The Pasco County School District earned that honor.

"They worked tirelessly to make sure our students could return to school safety," Monson said.

Kevin Bahr, of Bahr's Propane Gas & Air Conditioning, was named citizen of the year. The chamber's member of the year went to San Antonio Citizens Federal Credit Union. The Zephyrhills Brewing Company earned recognition as the small business of the year and the selection for large business of the year was AdventHealth Zephyrhills.

In addition to the five categories, Bob and Helen Winters, who recently sold the family's mobile home park adjacent to Zephyr Lake, received the Alice Hall Award. Monson said that prestigious award recognized a lifetime contribution to Zephyrhills.

The park has grown over the years from 30 lots and a few cabins to 260 lots. Gordon Winters is a former chamber member with Bob and his son Scott serving the community on the police and fire departments.

Incoming chairman Randy Stovall, who replaced Vicky Jones, closed out the banquet on a positive note: "In the coming months, with all of us supporting chamber activities, we can emerge better and stronger than before the March shutdown."

Stovall, the former vice chair is switching roles with Jones for the upcoming year. The other officers for 2020-21 are treasurer John Scott and secretary Dr. Edwin Goolsby.

Rounding out the board of directors are: Sam Abrahani, Shane Barker, Kathy Britton, Amy Chappell, Dino Defilippis, Dennis Harneson, Alex Hulbert, Amanda Maggard, Dean Smith, Kevin Sullivan, Sam Turgeon, David West and Jasmine Wilkins.

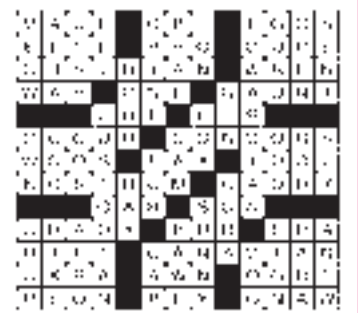

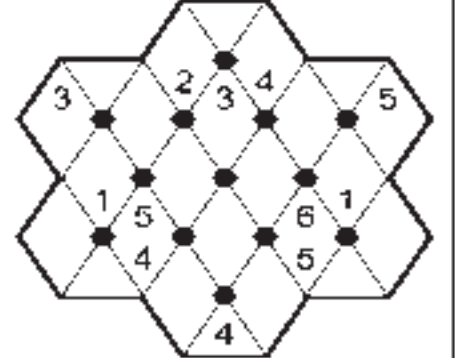

International Coastal Cleanup a success amid social distancing

Small groups make a big impact throughout Pasco County

Small teams made for mighty results during this year's socially-distanced version of the annual International Coastal Cleanup presented by the Rotary Club of New Port Richey and Withlacoochee River Electric Cooperative. Volunteers worked throughout Pasco County to pick up nearly 40,000 pounds of trash and litter along roadways, public spaces and waterways during the Sept. 19 event.

2020 International Coastal Cleanup by the numbers: 19.52 tons of trash and litter; 36 locations throughout Pasco County; 922 volunteers; and 3,248 volunteer hours logged.

"We always strive for a year-over-year increase, but not all success is best measured in numbers," said Keep Pasco Beautiful Coordinator Kristen King. "Even during the pandemic, we had a volunteer turnout that we are extremely grateful for, and we're consistently welcoming a younger generation who cares about the environment and will ultimately create lasting behavior change."

Pasco County's Department of Public Works plays an integral role in assisting with trash pickup from the cleanup. The department also manages the Adopt-A-Road program for volunteers who are interested in additional efforts.

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Pasco Sheriff's Office urges crime prevention

The Pasco Sheriff's Office has seen a recent uptick in crimes committed by juveniles. Unfortunately, one of these juvenile crimes resulted in the death of an innocent woman. However, many of these crimes are easily preventable with minimal effort.

This rash of juvenile crime is fueled by "crimes of opportunity," where a juvenile will target an unlocked vehicle and steal any valuables, or sometimes even the vehicle itself. Items stolen can range from cash or wallets left in the vehicle to firearms or other weapons. These weapons and vehicles are then used to commit additional crimes and perpetuate the issue of juvenile crime. As a crime of opportunity, suspects usually walk away from doors that are locked, as entering these vehicles or homes would draw attention to the crime being committed.

The Pasco Sheriff's Office urges residents to follow the #9PMRoutine each night. Around 9 p.m. each night, take a moment to ensure that no valuables, including weapons, are left in your vehicle and that the doors are locked. Additionally, take this time to make sure that the windows and doors of your home are closed and locked, and that you close your garage door. Making this part of your nightly routine can go a long way in preventing crimes of opportunity, such as those being committed by juveniles.

The #9PMRoutine relies on breaking the triangle of crime by removing an opportunity to commit a crime. While the Pasco Sheriff's Office, along with our community partners, continue to address ways to limit the desire for juveniles to commit these crime, the most effective way to reduce crime is to take away opportunity by locking your doors.

With the #9PMRoutine, you can help us prevent further juvenile crime, while reducing your chances of becoming a victim to crimes such as these.

Further, if you observe something suspicious in your neighborhood, contact the Pasco Sheriff's Office at either the Pasco County Communications Center non-emergency line at (727) 847-8102, option 7. If you observe a crime in progress or feel threatened or in danger, call 911 immediately.

By reporting suspicious activity in your neighborhood, you also help the Pasco Sheriff's Office solve crimes by providing valuable information on possible crime in your neighborhood.

Thank you for your continued support, as we work to keep Pasco County safe and address juvenile crime. You can help by remembering the #9PMRoutine; secure your vehicles by removing the valuables, locking your doors and closing your windows. Don't forget to close garage doors and lock your home's doors and windows. With your help, we can make our community a safer place for all.

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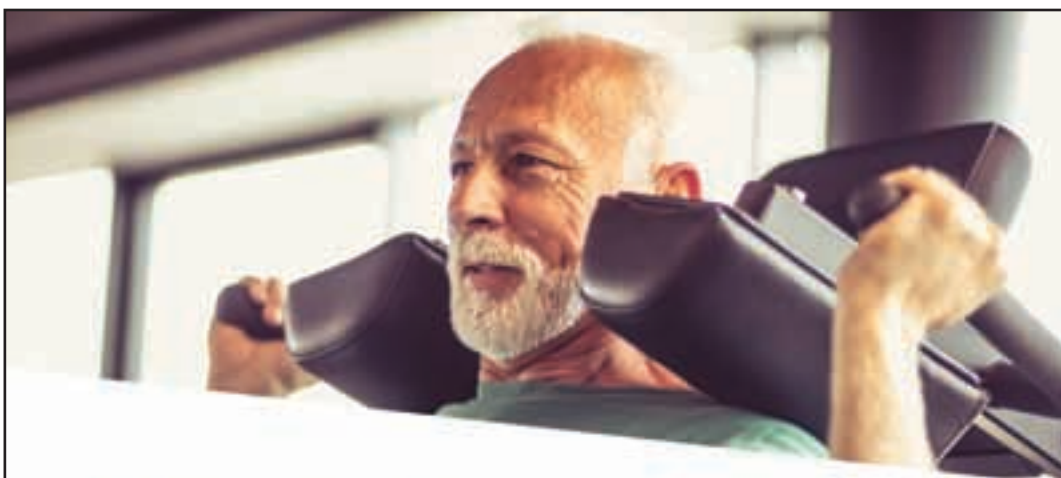

late to vote by mail and you'll need to vote in-person either early or on Election Day.

There are two ways to submit your mail-in ballot. The first is to use the post office. If you plan to mail your ballot back to the Supervisor of Elections Office, it needs to arrive on or before Elections Day. Please consider giving sufficient delivery time for the ballot to arrive prior to Election Day. Mail-in ballots can be taken at any of the early voting locations in Pasco County. You cannot drop off your mail-in ballot on Election Day. You will have to surrender your mail-in ballot and vote in-person if you wait until Nov. 3.

Early voting is another option. There are 14 early voting sites in Pasco County. You do not have to vote at your registered polling place if you choose to vote early. You can use any one of the early voting locations in Pasco County. Locations on the east side include: Advent Health Center Ice, Alice Hall Community Center, East Pasco Government Center, New River Library and Wiregrass Ranch Sports Complex. If you elect to vote in-person, please check with the Supervisor of Elections for safety protocols that are in place. Remember, if you vote early, you can use any early voting location in your county.

If you vote on Election Day (Nov. 3), you will have to go to your assigned polling place. That polling place is listed on your voter registration card or can be found at pascovotes.org.

Let's look at some of the ballot topics. If you're still undecided about the office of president, you are one of a tiny fraction of voters.

The surge in early voting is a clear indication that many Americans have already decided between the Trump/Pence ticket and the Biden/Harris ticket. If you haven't been living under a rock, you know where these candidates stand. We won't dwell on the race, even though it's worth mentioning that there are five other candidate tickets representing minor parties in the presidential race.

Beyond that, US District 12 representative Gus Bilirakis (R) is seeking reelection against Kimberly Walker (D). For the sake of brevity, we won't go down the positions each candidate represents. Just remember, that this is our representative to the US House of Representatives.

Next down the ballot is the office of the state senate. Former Zephyrhills City Mayor and state representative Danny Burgess (R) is running for State Senate District 20 against Kathy Lewis (D).

Running for reelection to the seat in the state House of Representatives District 38 - is Randy Maggard (R) facing Brian Staver (D).

Incumbent Pasco County Supervisor of Schools Kurt Browning faces a challenge from Cynthia Thompson.

Pasco County Commissioners Kathryn Starkey and Jack Mariano are seeking reelection in their respective seats - Starkey in District 3 against Jessica Stempien and Mariano in District 5 against both Brandi Geoit and Victor Rodriguez.

These races are pretty straightforward. Each of the candidates has their own website and there are multiple organizations that publish candidate comparisons.

The following are the voting options far more obscure and the ones we will dig a little

deeper into. Up next on the ballot are five judicial offices with judges up for merit retention. Don't just blow by this. Don't just use the "vote them all out" or the "keep whatever ones are in there" approach. That's a cop-out. You or someone you care about could be facing one of these judges in the future. What's more, one of these judges could rule on a state or local law, ordinance or directive that could have a significant impact on your day-to-day life. It's very much worth considering. It's very much worth a few minutes of your time.

The Florida Bar provides bios and other information on the judges seeking merit retention in this election. That information can be found at www.floridabar.org. Ballotpedia is another organization that simply breaks down the races in a non-partisan manner. Of course, there are a number of news media outlets that offer partisan views on the judicial races and make recommendations. You can find those on your own.

The offices of Mosquito Control are not the most sexy races. A good indication of a decent mosquito control candidate is if they even have an online profile. There are a number of platforms where mosquito control candidates can post their bios and goals. Many local television stations have these platforms, as does the League of Women Voters.

Lastly and perhaps most importantly, are the state constitutional amendments. There are six on this ballot and they should be examined thoroughly. These amendments will have more of a direct impact on your daily life than even that of the office of president. Please give them the time to understand what they mean and to make the best decision regarding.

proponents cite the need for a, "living wage." You get to decide for yourself.

Number 3: All Voters Vote in Primary Elections for State Legislature, Governor, and Cabinet. Florida currently has, "closed" primaries. This means that in order to vote in a preference primary, a registered voter must be registered to that political party. This amendment would eliminate that requirement and move to, "open primaries." Currently, 15 states have open primaries. If you were not a registered Democrat or Republican in the 2016 governor's primary, you were not permitted to vote in those respective primaries. If this amendment passes, it will allow voters, regardless of party affiliation, to vote in preferential primaries in the aforementioned offices of: state legislature, governor and cabinet. This does not include any federal offices. Passage of this amendment does not enable open primaries for federal elections, only for state offices.

Number 4: Voter Approval of Constitutional Amendments. The Citizens Initiated Constitutional Amendment or CICA is the only method for Florida citizens to enact legislation not by proxy of an elected representative. A CICA requires a number of voter signatures across a spread of legislative districts throughout the state. A judge or panel of judges must then sign off on the language of the CICA before it is allowed to be placed on the ballot. After that, a 60 percent threshold approves or rejects the amendment. Amendment 4 would require a CICA to be voter approved twice. Again, no commentary. This is what the amendment does, you get to decide whether to vote yes or no.

Number 5: Limitations on Homestead Property Tax Assessments; increased portability period to transfer accrued benefit. This one is pretty straightforward. It simply increases the Save-Our-Homes benefit from two years to three years. The Save-Our-Homes benefit allows Florida residents with between \$25,000 and \$50,000 of homestead exemptions two years to transfer those benefits to the new homestead. The amendment would extend that to three years.

Number 6: Ad Valorem Tax Discount for Spouses of Certain Deceased Veterans Who Had Permanent, Combat-Related Disabilities. Again, a pretty straightforward one. Amendment 6 provides that the homestead property tax discount for certain veterans with permanent combat-related disabilities carries over to such veteran's surviving spouse who holds legal or beneficial title to, and who permanently resides on, the homestead property, until he or she remarries or sells or otherwise disposes of the property. The discount may be transferred to a new homestead property of the surviving spouse under certain conditions.

Now that you know the score, get out there and vote. Make your voice heard. Again, if you haven't voted yet, it's a good idea to check with your Supervisor of Elections Office to make sure all of your information is current and to check what will be your most convenient voting option. If you have already voted, you can track your ballot on the local Supervisor of Elections Office website.

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
