Main Street Zephyrhills hosts downtown event that has become a staple in Zephyrhills

Numerous U.S. military veterans, family members and supporters came out in droves for last Saturday's Veterans Day Parade along the downtown streets. Main Street Zephyrhills hosted the traditional event that pays homage to those who have served the

nation on battlefields as well as during peace time. With only four parades to honor veterans scheduled last weekend throughout the Tampa Bay area, the only other such event in Pasco County was cancelled in New Port Richey due to a lack of entrants, according to Main Street Zephyrhills Coordinator Anna

Two days later, on Nov. 11, a ceremony honoring veterans took place in Zephyr Park with local dignitaries and key community members, as well as current and retired military personnel, taking part in that annual event. Similar ceremonies in Zephyrhills include

Danny Burgess relishes new role as champion for U.S. veterans

Longtime Republican leader served three terms as a state representative for District 38

Like many U.S. military veterans, Danny Burgess can pinpoint the exact moment he felt compelled to take action by serving his country. As a Zephyrhills High School student he watched aghast as the north and south towers of the World Trade Center crumbled in clouds of dust and debris after terrorists directed commercial airplanes to crash into those world-renowned buildings.

He said the 9/11 terrorist attacks, which also included crashes into the Pentagon and a rural field in Pennsylvania, mobilized a nation. It also prompted him into action.

"I knew I wanted to serve," said Burgess, who now is in the Army Reserves. "The post 9/11 era really instilled a new sense of service and purpose."

That sense of service and purpose instilled in Burgess bodes well for the duties in his current role as executive director of the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs. Previously, he was a Republican member of the Florida House of Representatives, representing District 38 in eastern Pasco County for three terms (2014-2019).

Burgess, known affectionately as the youngest mayor and city council member in the history of Zephyrhills, was tabbed by Governor Ron DeSantis for his new role earlier this year. Nowadays, the former Zephyrhills resident who is raising his family — wife Courtney along with their children Adeline, Daniel III and Eleanor — in Wesley Chapel, can appreciate the bipartisan nature of his job.

"It's an incredible opportunity to get to work every day on such a noble mission that everybody rallies around and everybody wants to support," he said. "Coming from a political world it's very refreshing to work on something that can unite people rather than divide people.

Zephyrhills has an annual Veterans Day parade, which Burgess always is a part of. He also helps to honor hometown American heroes by being involved in Memorial Day and 9/11 commemorations at Oaklawn Cemetery and Zephyr Park, re-

Iconic volkswagens drew thousands of enthusiasts and curious onlookers to the Pasco County Fairgrounds last weekend. They came from near and far, like they have for years, for the 31st Annual Florida Bug Jam that took place Nov. 9-10.

The two-day event kicked off last Saturday with a poker run, pre-jam party, VW parade, off-road track and live musical entertainment. Sunday was highlighted by the VW car show and swap meet. It literally turned out to be a fun-filled weekend of everything volkswagen.

Randy Yoho, the owner of Dade City Motocross, which is adjacent to the fairgrounds and had its track open for a weekend of VW rides, has helped organize the event for the past six years. Like many who showed up during the weekend, he was impressed with the variety of VWs as well as all of the accessories and other aspects of the annual event.

"It was probably as good as any of them" he said, noting that numerous people with VWs set up

"I feel it is my job to serve those that have served us," he said of an obligation he welcomes. "I look forward to (those aforementioned events) every year, because it is my hometown and those are the people I grew up with. They helped inspire me to want to

Recently, Burgess said he was honored to receive the annual Lieutenant General James B. Peake Award for supporting the statewide veterans legal hotline operated by Bay Area Legal Services during the last legislative session.

In 2018 as a state representative, Burgess filed a trio of veterans bills for that year's legislative session. Those bills, which he said constituted a veterans improvement package and were designed to make Florida a veteran-friendly state, addressed the critical issues of mental health and licensing.

The three bills were as follows:

Alternative treatment for a veterans pilot program, which dealt with mental health and substance abuse issues. It noted that up to 17 percent of veterans returning from combat are affected by depression, post-traumatic stress disorder or suicide:

Services for veterans and their families, such as a crisis hotline to connect with behav-

ioral health care services 24 hours a day;

Temporary employment or appointment of officers, which addresses excessive licensing and training requirements for returning service

"We still need to do so much," said Burgess, who also previously worked for a Dade City law firm.

The crisis hotline is near and dear to Burgess' heart. So much so, he said, that he still has the napkin he wrote the proposal on nearly four years

"That's pretty special," he

Some in the east Pasco communities and surrounding areas feel that way about Burgess. Notably Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield, who often introduces Burgess at various events in the city and has praised his character and accomplishments on numerous occasions.



a Memorial Day event at Oaklawn Ceremony and 9/11 com-

memoration in Zephyr Park.

"It's amazing," Stutzriem said at the conclusion of Saturday morning's parade. "It's fantastic and we really want to thank Danny Burgess, who helped us get it together."

Burgess, executive director of the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs, previously was a Republican member of the Florida House of Representatives. The former Zephyrhills resident, a Zephyrhills High graduate who was once the city's youngest mayor, now lives in Wesley Chapel with his wife Courtney and their three children.

"I look forward to this every year," said Burgess, who also serves in the Army Reserves.

As the downtown speakers in the medians along the parade route blared patriotic and other popular American songs, the procession marched on in front of a few hundred spectators. It included 43 entries, highlighted by city and community leaders, school bands and youth organizations, scouting troops and dance squads, as well as a few local businesses displaying their

"It's what we're all about," Stutzriem said. "It's about our small-town charm. It's appreciating our veterans and their ser-

Among the veterans lining 5th Avenue for the parade was Robert Halstead, a U.S. Army veteran who spent 23 years in the

military and is a snowbird from Syracuse.

"This means a lot to us. I love it," he said. Closer to home was Army veteran Chuck Morris, who served in Vietnam after graduating from Zephyrhills High in

"I try to make (the parade) every year," he said.

Veterans Day is a federal holiday observed on Nov. 11. On that day in 1918, the Allied nations and Germany signed an armistice ending World War I, which killed more than 15 million people. A year later, King George V of England proclaimed that date Armistice Day.

The Treaty of Versailles, which formally ended the war, was signed on June 28, 1919. That year, President Woodrow Wilson noted the monumental changes that World War I provoked. In 1954, in response to calls for recognition of veterans of World War II and the Korean War, President Dwight D. Eisenhower changed the name of the holiday to Veterans Day.

It's that history that some veterans say is not taught to or learned by much of today's youth.

"Recognizing veterans is going downhill, but it's still good that they do it," said Morris, adding that he wished more people came out for last Saturday's event. "I wish that there was a lot

more of the young generation coming to the parade."

Clara Clevinger, a Zephyrhills retiree whose father John spent 31 years in the U.S. Air Force, concurred. A former elementary school teacher in Virginia she said there were plenty of "older folks here, but it would have been nice to see more families

As the crowd dispersed, Burgess had a parting sentiment for Morris as one veteran to another.

"Thank you for your service," Burgess said. "We can't forget

University community representatives lay wreaths for each branch of military

Saint Leo University began its Veterans Appreciation Week on Nov. 8, with a special veterans appreciation luncheon and an Honoring Our Veterans ceremony.

The public was invited to join the university community at the For Those Who Serve sculpture for the ceremony, which included a presentation of the colors by Saint Leo's ROTC cadets; brief statements by president Jeffrey D. Senese and guest speaker retired U.S. Army Lt. Gen. John LeMoyne; a wreath laying ceremony featuring representatives of branches of the military; and patriotic music by Saint Leo students accompanied by Dr. Cynthia Selph.

LeMoyne, who also spoke at an invitationonly luncheon prior to the ceremony, served 40 years, including combat tours in Vietnam, Panama, and Iraq. He received five awards for valor and the Purple Heart for wounds he received in combat. When the terrorist attacks of 9/11 occurred, LeMoyne was asked to delay retirement to serve as chief of human resources and personnel for the Army at the Pentagon to help rebuild the team following the attacks. His grandson is a freshman at Saint Leo.

After cajoling his grandson with, "you better make your grades," LeMoyne spoke about leadership and management. "There are two proven pathways to societal growth," he said. 'Military service and education."

LeMoyne said he was a college dropout, but his military service allowed him to begin classes again and earn a bachelor's degree from the University of Florida and a master's degree from Shippensburg University of Pennsylva-

"Google 'leadership' and 'management,' and you will find a lot of the same terms," he said. "The real key is to unlock potential."

He said leaders are born, but everyone has the potential to become a leader under certain circumstances.

LeMoyne said good leadership has many traits, but two stand out—which coincide with Saint Leo University's core values—"One, your personal integrity is sacrosanct," he said. "Lie one time, and you will never be trusted. "And two, treat people with respect.

"Today's generation is the next Greatest Generation," LeMoyne concluded.

At the Honoring Our Veterans ceremony, Senese reminded everyone of Saint Leo's history of educating military personnel and veterans. "We now operate on 14 military bases," he said. "And we just received permission to operate at Naval Weapons Station, Joint Base Charleston (SC)."

Earlier at the luncheon, Senese shared the university's gratitude for its student-veterans and all who have served in the military. "On behalf of a very grateful Saint Leo University, I

want to thank you for your service," he said. Dr. Luke McClees, director of the Office of Military Affairs and Services, introduced members of the Saint Leo community, who represented their branches of the military and placed a wreath at the base of the sculpture. Representatives included: U.S. Army, retired Lt. Gen. John LeMoyne; U.S. Marine Corps, Col. Richard "Dick" Johnson, a member of the Saint Leo University Board of Trustees and a 1968 graduate of Saint Leo; U.S. Navy, Noel Boeke, former Saint Leo trustee; U.S. Air Force, Frank Hernandez, Class of 2014, and an adjunct faculty member in the Tapia College of Business; and U.S. Coast Guard, freshman Olivia Johnson, who is a member of the U.S. Coast Guard

The ceremony concluded with a blessing by Father Kyle Smith, university chaplain, and a performance of "God Bless America" by student Olivia Callahan and the Saint Leo Cham-
