Daylight saving time ends Nov. 6

Officially at 2 a.m. it is time to reset clocks back by one hour, which means it will get dark earlier in the day

In keeping with the old adage of springing ahead and falling back, the clocks in the United States are on the verge of doing the latter. Daylight saving time, which began last March, ends on Nov. 6.

That means resetting clocks back by one hour at 2 a.m. on this coming Sunday. Of course, if you're not up at that time it can be done before anyone's bedtime. That allows for one extra hour of sleep on that specific date and means that there will be fewer daylight hours until the middle of March. At that time, daylight saving time begins all over again. Having less daylight later in the day is a trade-off for having more light earlier in the mornings during the time of resetting the clocks back. Locally, the change of the clock has different meanings to people. Billy Poe, the city manager, reasoned that there is not much significance to the upcoming time difference. He noted that there will be no changes in policies or schedules for city staff and department matters.

Stewart defeats John Long 28-0 in battle of unbeatens

Middle school football teams clash for conference title with the Bulldogs claiming their third in a row

There is no other way to describe the Stewart Middle football team's remarkable run than to call it what it is. Simply put — domination.

In a battle of recent unbeatens the Bulldogs defeated host John Long 28-0. That gives Stewart three straight Pasco County Middle School Athletic Conference East titles and 12 in the past 13 seasons. Stewart shared the 2018 championship with John Long.

"I'm proud of what we built here and what we're able to maintain," said Stewart athletic director Norm Scheuerman, who coached the first five of those championship teams.

Greg Mathis followed Scheuerman and coached Stewart to six championships while first-year coach Marcus McKinley notched his first title with the recent win.

After sharing the title with Stewart in 2018, the Longhorns won it outright in 2019 but struggled for two seasons before bouncing back this year.

"It was a really good season, coming off what we had last year," said John Long coach Damon Zassenbraker, alluding to a 2-5 record last season.

"We knew that John Long was back and they were dogging people just like we were," McKinley said. "We knew coming into the game that somebody was going to go down and it wasn't going to be us."

Both teams entered the conference-clinching game with identical 5-0 records with each having one game postponed due to Hurricane Ian. John Long will not make up its matchup against Rushe, but Stewart



"It's just another day," Poe said. "None of our shifts change or anything like that."

On the other end of the spectrum was Patricia Stahlke, a snowbird from Wisconsin who along with her husband Rvan recently attended the Paulie Palooza Music Festival in downtown Zephyrhills.

"I don't like when it gets dark so soon be-

at bus stops and it's dark out, so be safe," said Poe, alluding to late pickups by school buses.

cause we like to go places in the afternoon, said the retiree who now resides in Wesley Chapel. "It's even worse back home."

Vicki Wiggins, the new president of the Greater Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce, recalled her days of growing up in New England when playing outside after school meant doing so in the dark.

"The kids don't care if its' dark, but the older folks do," she said, adding, "I really don't like it. I like it to be light in the evenings. I'm an outdoor person (who enjoys gardening)."

For the elderly, safety often can be a factor in their habits. For example, many older people tend to go out to dinner early so as not to be coming home when it is dark out.

'Ŏlder have vision issues and can't drive at night," Wiggins noted.

Like Wiggins, Poe mentioned safety issues. "We like to remind people that there's kids main in observance of this practice there are some parts of the country and overseas territories that do not. They include Arizona, Hawaii, American Samoa, Guam, the Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands.

Historically in the U.S., the act of advancing clocks by one hour in the spring was formally adopted in 1918 with the Standard Time Act. That measure, however, was abolished shortly after World War I. It was reintroduced by President Franklin Roosevelt in 1942 after the U.S. entered World War II and remained in place until 1945.

Post-World War II, various municipalities made their own decisions about observing daylight saving time, which made travel timetables and other scheduling problematic. That led to the aforementioned act in 1966.

MOMENTS IN TIME The History Channel





In a continuation of a game postponed earlier this season, host Bulldogs tout Pirates 38-12

It took a while for the junior varsity version of the 9-Mile War to play out this season, but for at least one of the longtime rivals it was worth the wait. Host Zephyrhills dominated in a continuation of a football game that was postponed earlier due to rain and thunderstorms.

In a game that was scoreless and picked up early in the second quarter, the Bulldogs won 38-12 in front of some ecstatic home fans at Bulldog Stadium. Some of the varsity players were even on hand as they came directory from downtown after being part of the homecoming parade.

'That's the way it is in Florida," Zephyrhills JV coach Raleigh Allen said of weather having an adverse effect on the football game. "I was glad it didn't start with the lightning again."

Regardless of the outcome, which was played in the rain for parts of the second half, Pasco coach Bruce Patterson was glad they got the game in.

'It's a big rivalry," he said. "If we don't play any other game

this was the one to get in."

The Bulldogs improved to 2-5-1. They tied River Ridge 6-6 and defeated Cypress Creek 30-25 before the continuation of the Pasco game. Zephyrhills will close out the regular season with this week's matchup against Land O' Lakes, which is a makeup game due to a rainout earlier this season.

Pasco finished 0-5-1. That includes a 6-6 tie with Wesley Chapel to start the season.

In a first half that was tainted a bit by a handful of turnovers, Zephyrhills broke the game open with three touchdowns to take a 24-0 lead into the locker room. A 55-yard run down the right sideline by Zephyrhills' Jakari Redfield set up Malachi Woodard's 5-yard touchdown run. Roosevelt Miler then passed to Matthew Thompson for the two-point conversion and an 8-0 lead.

Switching roles, Miller then turned up on the receiving end of touchdown passes. Azuri Jackson, taking over at quarterback, completed scoring passes of 56 and 21 yards to Miller. On the first score, Miller caught a ball just beyond the line of scrimmage and eluded four Pasco defenders while running down the right sideline.

'You've got to love those kinds of kids, because you can use them in multiple positions against different teams," Allen said of Miller, who played quarterback, running back and wide receiver on offense in the game against the Pirates. "I like having him as a weapon."

Two conversions after those scores were Jackson passes to

Thompson and Redfield, respectively. The teams traded touchdowns in the second half with Zephyrhills adding a pair of conversions to account for the final margin. Zephyrhills got a 55-yard run from Miller to set up Woodard's 2-yard touchdown run before Thompson ran into the end zone for the conversion.

Miller then scored on a 5-yard pass from Jackson and a Thompson conversion run.

Pasco's scores came on a pair of touchdowns from its backup quarterback. Sidney Allen connected with Amari Williams on a 42-yard scoring pass before he threw to Jared Samon for the Pirates' last touchdown.

Allen replaced starting signal-caller Jackson Dietsch, who struggled with several fumbles in the first half.

Allen also credited solid play from Zephyrhills defenders Orion Wigerton, who caused two fumbles and recovered one, and Ethan Stone, who is versatile enough to play safety and outside linebacker.

Wigerton also is one of two sophomores on the offensive line. He plays alongside Gio Montes De Oca to provide leadership up front.







HOLLYWOOD -- Kenneth Branagh will direct and play Agatha Christie's master detective Hercule Poirot a third time, as he did for "Murder on the Orient Express" in 2017 (\$55 million cost with a \$352.8 million gross) and "Death on the Nile" in 2022 (\$90 million cost with a \$137.3 million gross). In case you've wondered why Agatha Christie's greatest success, "The Mousetrap," was never made into a movie: In 1959, a film starring Tyrone Power and Maria Schell was shelved because Christie had other plans for it. The play opened in London in 1952 and ran uninterrupted until March 2020, when it was shuttered by the pandemic. "The Mousetrap" reopened in May 2021 and has been going strong from there. Off-Broadway's longest running hit, "The Fantasticks," pales by comparison, with a 1960 opening running 42 years and 17,162 performances (until 2002). The 2000 film, directed by Michael Ritchie and starring Joel Grey, was a critical and box office failure. Christie knew what she was doing ... it was no mystery to her!

A last word about Angela Lansbury -- fans of "Murder, She Wrote" can't imagine how much Angela and her character, Jessica Fletcher, were alike. Thanks to my friendship with the legendary Esme Chandlee, an MGM publicist during the Golden Age of Hollywood who handled Elizabeth Taylor, Ann Miller, Jane Powell and Angela (among many others), I was invited to many lunches and dinners with Esme and Angela. Angela had the ability to make anyone feel accepted and welcomed in her world. I never wanted those meals to end. The angels are the lucky ones now!



will close out the season against Cypress Creek.

There were other similarities. Stewart outscored the opposition by a whopping 285-14 margin, including the win over John Long, and had four shutouts. Meanwhile, the Longhorns finished the season with a 177-28 scoring advantage and one shutout.

It might have been two shutouts for John Long if not for allowing a safety in the season opener, a 7-2 win over resurgent Pasco. The Longhorns preserved that win when they got a late interception from Elijah Fudge in their own end zone.

As for their last game of the season, the Longhorns had their moments on defense by holding the Bulldogs to their lowest scoring output.

"That was by far the closest game," Scheuerman said.

Nonetheless, Stewart had four key scoring plays with a pair of touchdowns in the second and fourth quarters.

The Bulldogs took a 14-0 halftime lead on Sanilyn Black's quarterback keeper from 18 yards out and Black's 34-yard touchdown pass

to Coby Ten Brink. The latter score was followed by John Blanford's two-point conversion

Stewart pulled away with two more scores in the fourth. Dylan Burney's 11-yard touch-down run preceded Black's 54-yard scramble into the end zone. Ten Brink added another conversion run to close out the scoring.

In addition to Black's two touchdown runs and a scoring pass he had three interceptions on defense.

Black also threw an interception. In the second half, John Long defensive back Donovan Crume picked off one of his passes in the red zone and brought it back nearly to midfield to thwart another potential Stewart scoring drive.

"We were outsized. They were just huge," Scheuerman said of John Long's defense, adding, "We're very good at being physical. I just think that our kids are fundamentally sound.

McKinley gave a special mention to three of his players.

Aside from eighth-graders Black and Blanford, Zacary Carroll was the only other Stewart football player who never lost a game. All three played as sixth- and seventh-graders as well.
