Family of God Baptist Church in Dade City hosts traditional reenactment with three other churches assisting in the joint effort

Following a two-year hiatus, a local Walk Through Bethlehem that dates back to 1996 was revived. Formerly held at the Richland Baptist Church, where the reenactment originated, this year's three-night event took place at the newly opened Family of God Baptist Church

It marked a combined effort featuring reenactors

and volunteers from four churches — the two already mentioned, along with Pasadena Baptist Church and Faith Fellowship in Jesus Christ Church in Trilby. The latter church is associated with Family of God Baptist, located at 102331 Old Lakeland Hwy.

"We're doing a joint effort," said Martha Guynn, wife of Family of God Baptist's pastor Russell Guynn. "They weren't going to do it, so Russell talked to them and asked if we could do it this year."

No problem since the message simply was to revive the walk, which is a mock village of that city south of Jerusalem in Israel. Renowned as the birthplace of Jesus Christ, the village depicts life there centuries ago and includes a marketplace, live animals, Roman soldiers and the three wise men. There also is a manger with Baby Jesus, Joseph and Mary.

'We're all friends," Guynn said. "We all know each

IPAC at Pasco **Hernando State** College ready to open doors this spring

The massive performing arts center in Wesley Chapel has reached substantial completion status

It's impossible to miss the chic new construction while travelling on Old Pasco Road near Cypress Creek High and Middle schools. Only recently did the chain link construction fences come down. The facility is looking toward "final completion" status in January and has aims at some manifestation of a grand opening toward the end of February. The details of the opening will have to be weighed against the current state of the COVID-19 pan-

"The construction should be complete by then (February), it's just details like doors and light switches and minor thing like that left," Provost of the PHSC Porter Campus Kevin O'Farrell said. "We hope to do some kind of celebration at the end of February, an open

O'Farrell oversees both the PHSC campus on Mansfield Boulevard, near Wiregrass Ranch High School and the IPAC facility adjacent to Cypress Creek. The facility will be a boon for performing arts in the area but it will specifically benefit high school students with

aims at degrees in performing or digital arts.
PHSC's Instructional Performing Arts Center (IPAC), located in Wesley Chapel, will provide students state-of-the art learning in the performing arts beginning 2021. The IPAC will offer four Associate of Arts (AA) performing arts curriculum pathways for students who plan to transfer to a Florida public university to complete a Bachelor's degree in dance, theatre or music. The curriculum will include dance, theatre, voice chorus and instrumental pathways

The IPAC will also offer an Associate in Science (AS) degree in Digital Media and Multimedia Technology with six College Credit Certificates. This high-demand STEM program will prepare students for initial employment in several digital media and multimedia technology professions such as digital media/multimedia programmer, digital media/

Melissa Scharber, wife of local attorney Jarrod Scharber, relied on her own case of adopting a daughter to assist Robert and Angela Moore. That couple awaits a little boy or girl, or perhaps more than one of each if twins are involved.

Before Christmas, the Scharbers presented the Moores with an oversized check for \$6,800 toward their adoption effort. Also on hand were several staff members of the law firm as well as Lifetime Adoption employees Robyn Moore and Linda Rotz.

The IPAC won't just help local and regional students. It plans to network with local theatre and performance groups, as well.

O'Farrell anticipates even more collaboration but also accessibility as plans for an I-75 exit on Overpass Road are in the works. It could be two full years before that project is online but it will set a decent runway for ÎPAC to start developing the connections. Staff is currently working on a virtual tour, they hope to be able to offer ahead of the anticipated grand opening.



other. We just go to a different church. The more the better."

It is unclear where the Walk Through Bethlehem will take place next December with the Richland Baptist congregation expected to make a decision on the matter by next summer. If that church declines to host it, however, Guynn said that Family of God Baptists would gladly step in again.

As for this year, more than 800 visitors came through the mock village during three nights, Dec. 11-13.

"That was a good turnout for the first time of us having it," Guynn said.

At the end of the village, visitors were greeted by pastors from the four churches. Aside from Guynn that group included Claude English, Mike Thacker and Robert Perkins.
