Zephyrhills students fare well with farm animals at fair



Local youngsters claim top prizes in several categories at the Florida State Fair Livestock Show

Marissa Shivers, a Cypress Creek High sophomore from Zephyrhills, and Stewart Middle eighthgrader Emma McKelvey made Stewart Middle's Future Farmers of America teacher, Kathy Nawlin, proud by winning some top prizes last weekend at

the Florida State Fair.

Both learned from Nawlin and showed off their goats in the fair's livestock show. Shivers had two grand champions and a reserve champion while McKelvey took a first and a third in showmanship.

"I've put in a lot of time and effort," said Shivers, president of her high school's 4-H Club who previously attended Stewart Middle. "For it to start paying off in the ring means the world to me."

"She did very well, especially being her second show," McKelvey, president of the middle school's FFA Club, said of her goat named Honeybee.

Shivers had some help as Shannon Green, who sold a goat to her, came from his home state of

Council gets a look at the newly designed city website

Gail Hamilton demonstrated the capabilities of the new website

The city of Zephyrhills is in the midst of a website update. This reorganization and functionality redesign is reactionary to a recent spike in American with Disabilities Act compliance (ADA) law-

Zephyrhills City Manager, Steve Spina opened the council's discussion by citing a recent instance where Flagler County was forced to pay a \$15,000 settlement for lack of ADA compliance with their website. "He (the plaintiff) got a \$1,000, the attorney got \$14,000.

Gail Hamilton, Community Redevelopment Agency Director introduced the committee overseeing the project and proceeded with a demonstration of the site's new capabilities. "We are working to look at the ADA issues with the website, for making the website better. We are mainly in compliance with ADA. We are not worried about being sued."

The external changes visible to users is the use of colors. Hamilton went on to illustrate how visually impaired person may struggle with understanding website content if the entire page is not separated by contrasting color blocks. She also highlighted how multiple navigation methods; how to navigate the site, can be utilized by users who mentally process information differently.

'The program will read it to you," she said in reference to how written words are now structured on the site.

full of healthy

meals each Friday to ensure that they have food to eat over the weekend. The students return the empty backpack to their school on Monday, which is then refilled for the following weekend.

Since the first Hunger Walk, Team Tax Collector has raised over \$16,000 to help feed students who participate in the program. It is estimated that in Pasco County approximately 38,000 children live in homes that struggle to put adequate amounts of food on the table. Fifty one percent of students in the county qualify for free or reduced lunches. The need is great and the Hunger Walk helps meet that need.





Missouri for support.

"I'm happy that he came down to help," said Shivers, who plans to do about 15 shows

on the national circuit this year.
Shivers brought 15 of her 30 goats to last week's fair competition while McKelvey brought three goats. Both have entered other shows as well. McKelvey had a heffer that won grand champion at a show in Okeechobee in

Three Zephyrhills High students from that school's FFA chapter — Stephanie Johnson, Natalee Mason and Emile Limoges — also did well at the fair last week.

Johnson's goat Fudge was a two-time reserve grand champion who took a herdsmanship award as well. She has been showing goats and sheep at the state fair for the past five years. In that span she has had one grand champion and three reserve grand champions.

"It helps, because you know what to expect," Johnson said of having that valuable experience. "I would do shows before the state fair and that would help me stay calm."

Mason, a junior, had her 260-pound hog named Randee earn a runner-up ribbon in showmanship. The state fair marked her first show at that level.

"I was nervous at first, but showing at the state fair was a lot of fun," she said.

Of the two dairy goats Limoges showed, one got junior grand champion and the other was a runner-up in her class. This marked Limoges second straight appearance at the state fair. A Zephyrhills High freshman, he showed last year as a Stewart Middle eighth-grader but did not place with a goat from that school's FFA chapter.

"That was fun. I had a good time," he said. "This year I had my own goats instead of chapter goats."

Additionally, there was also a contingent of students from Academy at the Farm. That group included former student Danyelle Miller, who also has attended Pasco-Hernando State College and showed a hog at the state fair for the first time.

Miller also showed at a national fair in Louisville, Ky. in July and took ninth among 1,000 hogs in her class.

"I was pretty nervous, but we ended up getting ninth," Miller recollected. "I've never shown at this state fair before. I work with a lot

of other animals, but only show swines." Tim Carter, Academy at the Farm's physical education teacher, helped the students take care of their animals at the fair. Another adult who helped support the students from Pasco County was Rick Brown, a breeder from Shady

Hills who has sold animals to them. 'I like to keep it local, to help with their

projects," Brown said. As for the rest of the fair, the weather was warm but not too hot for patrons over the weekend. One couple from Wesley Chapel who stopped to watch the swine show applauded the youngsters for their efforts in working with

'These kids know what they're doing in there," Sarah Patton said.

"Good showmanship," added her husband Jackson.

Spina spoke about how the website changes were affecting other areas of city business. "You notice how the agenda (for the council meeting) looks different."

The digital version of the agenda uploaded to the city's website is interactive. Hyperlinks allow the user to view supporting documents for the agenda and if the user's computer is setup with text-to-speech, the documents can be read, out loud, to the use.

City council president, Lance Smith closed the conversation with reassurance to the council and residents at the meeting. "We don't need to worry about someone coming after us. We are doing everything we can to avoid that."

Tony and Linda Starr Kerns, owners of Kerns Family Construction requested the city to approve a lease at 5031 Airport Rd. With the 30-year lease; improvements and employment they will bring to the area, the city's evaluation committee believe their business would be an excellent fit to the city and airport.

The proposed rental rate is \$565.19 monthly with a term of 30 years; with \$180,748.50 of capital improvements to be completed by the tenant. The Federal Aviation Authority (FAA) is part owner of the proper along with the city and a final exit strategy for the lease is dependent upon the FAA's approval.

The lease has a termination clause that allows the Kerns' to purchase the property after four years of occupancy.

Smith commented about the prospect of the city relinquishing a piece of property. "Sometimes the tradeoff is important for the area." Spina reminded the council that the city

should focus on property tax generation and not take on the role of landlord.

The council approved the lease with councilwoman, Jodi Wilkeson saying, "The bottom line is we can collect tax revenues."

Zephyrhills Fire Chief Brian Swartout updated the council on the recent development with Pasco County and the emergency phone service. Spina and Swartout met with Pasco County Administrator Dan Biles on Feb. 11 to discuss the cost and logistics of how to handle emergency cellphone calls.

Spina is interested in how the county can justify the \$60,000 annual cost when as he sees it, "dual taxation issue," for Zephyrhills resi-

The police department continues to focus its efforts on Wisteria Drive, prompted by recent citizens complaints to city council. The council applauded Zephyrhills Police Chief Derek Brewer for getting ahead of the problem and offered to support his efforts. Brewer's update included the department's efforts to start a neighborhood watch in the area as well as assisting the city in levying several code violations to local properties.

Center Association.

To advance to that upcoming show, 240 performers primarily from the east side of Pasco County as well as Hillsborough and Pinellas counties, auditioned in 108 acts last Saturday at the Center for the Arts. That included individuals and groups with the youngsters ranging in age from 6-18.

The talent was local but the judges were not, specifically to ensure there would be no bias or knowledge of the performers from Pas-

"The judges are usually from somewhere far away, so they can't know the contestants," explained Barbara Friedman, the talent show's executive producer.

Nearly 60 were selected as finalists with top-3 placements in eight categories up for grabs. In all, \$4,000 in cash and trophies will be awarded with the top senior earning \$1,000. Performers range from singers, instrumental musicians, acrobats, novelty acts, bands, baton twirlers, dancers and other forms of entertain-

Last year's overall winner of the \$1,000 Pasco Heritage Scholarship was Victoria Neukom, a Pasco High graduate who trained at Blackwood Studios in Dade City and went on to compete on the television show, "So You Think You Can Dance."

Other former Spotlight on Talent performers have gone on to college on dance or music scholarships, including the Boston Conservatory of Music, and Indiana and Yale Universities. Spotlight alums have also performed professionally on Broadway, with the Florida Orchestra and several were named Miss Pasco County among other pageant titles.

"Kids go onto bigger and greater things," Friedman noted. "The kids deserve it. They deserve all the kudos they can get."

Jessica Werckman and Shirley Surratt, co-

producers of the Moonlight and Ivory Concert, spoke glowingly of the local talent and the opportunities presented by the Spotlight on Talent

"It never ceases to amaze me that in our quaint little towns (primarily the east Pasco area encompassing Dade City, Zephyrhills and San Antonio) how much talent we have," said Werckman, a vocalist who performed in the Moonlight and Ivory Concert.

Talent alone is not the only reason why the young performers take to the stage. Gaining confidence, memorizing lines and learning

poise are other factors.

"It's pretty stressful," said Surratt, whose daughter Shelby has performed on numerous occasions and will graduate from Pasco High this spring. "It's actually a learning talent show. They learn how to improve on their talent. It also helps them prepare if they want to do it in the future.

Even the ones not advancing to the finals can gain from the invaluable experience of auditioning on stage and being judged accordingly. Judges provide critiques for all of the contes-

"I love the fact that they get feedback from the judges," Werckman said. "It's a positive cri-tique of the performances and that gives them something to work on. There's a lot of wonderful things that come out of it."

Like Surratt, Werckman has young performers in the family. Andrew, 9, and 5-yearold Elizabeth have taken Arts in Motion camps. One day soon they could be belting out musical notes on stage just like their mother.
