

Zoning changes at Trotter's Crossing, Abbott Square highlight council

A series of adjustments, both contractually and in zoning designation, were the lion's share of the work done

There are some big projects underway in Zephyrhills. Trotter's Crossing and Abbott Square are a couple but the city is trying to stay ahead of all of the municipal projects and last Monday's meeting was almost entirely about these adjustments to keep the projects moving forward

Two Consent Agenda Items started the meeting. Item 1.1 authorized Zephyrhills City Manager William Poe Jr. to sign documents pertaining to the Zephyrhills Airport runway extension as it relates to the FDOT grant. The FDOT grant will pay eight percent or a maximum of \$240,000 as part of the \$3 million project. The city is still awaiting results of the State legislature's appropriation for the project. The item merely authorized the city manager to ion documents related to the contra FDOT. Item 1.2 would have accepted the Florida Department of Law Enforcement's distribution of their Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding (CESF) grant to the city. The reimbursable grant expenditures for the city qualified it for \$51,980. Both items were bundled together and passed unanimously. The Business Items opened the flood of zoning changes and contract adjustments. Item 2.1 was a public hearing of both an annexation and rezoning. It would annex approximately 18 acres of property into city boundaries between Tucker Road and Alston Avenue. It also asked to change the zoning designation from AR-1 to R-3, to allow for homes to be built on the property. Senior Planner Rodney Corriveau stipulated, per the last council meeting, that language about the property's close proximity to the airport be included in documents for potential home buyers. The parcel could host up to 108 units. The measure passed without public comment 5-0. Item 2.2 requested a zoning change for a

American flags retired at cemetery

Zephyrhills High's JROTC upholds longstanding tradition with ceremony to retire U.S. flags in disrepair

Retiring American flags in disrepair and to honor U.S. fallen soldiers are longstanding traditions for Zephyrhills High's JRÖTC students. The most recent ceremony, which included cleaning veteran's headstones and planting U.S. flags, took place last Thursday morning at Oakside Cemetery.

That site, along 8th Street, was fitting since the cemetery is where Flag Day and Memorial Day commemorations have been held in the past. Deeded by the Zephyrhills Colony Company in 1911, the tract is a burial ground for veterans of six wars that involved U.S. soldiers.

Tanner Kardashian, a Lt. Col. and Battalion Commander, was among a handful of commanders to address a gathering that included



roughly 17-acre parcel, also in the airport vicinity, from R-2 to R-3. This increases the number of units that can be developed on the property. That item passed without comment from the public, 5-0.

Item 2.3 requested a change in the comprehensive plan to the future land use map to the same property in the Consent Agenda. This request would change the zoning designation from county AR-1 to R-3 Residential, again, to open up the site for residential development.

Item 2.4 shifted over to Trotter's Crossing, the development west of US Highway 301 between Phelps Road and Terrabella Avenue. The item was set to codify an agreement between the developers and adjacent landowners to provide adequate screening and fencing along the property. The contract arrived at by the respective parties' attorneys set a 6-foot PVC fence as the standard for the agreement. All lot sizes and setbacks remain unchanged.

Discussion bounced around the dais about different types of screening outside of PVC fencing. Nearby resident Leon Wilson was on the phone during the session and expressed concern about the 91 lots with 20-foot wide streets in the proposed development.


Then councilman Alan Knight pulled the conversation back to his concern from the item's first reading; that there was only one way in and out of the complex.

Planning director Todd Vande Berg stated that Silverado has 550 units and still just one way in and out. Vande Berg also pointed out that there is a current access road that could be used in cases of emergency but that it also could be developed into a new ingress/egress point in the future. Discussion then turned toward the "conservation easement" in the area and it was brought up that just what defined a "conservation easement" was unclear and should be clarified. Vande Berg stipulated that many of these details could be hammered out in the platting phase but that was not enough to assuage the misgivings of councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson, who ultimately cast the lone dissenting vote on the item.

Item 2.5 opened up into the Abbott Square development, the roughly 173-acre development that wraps around the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis & Wellness Center off Simons Road. It proposed a zoning change to the PUD master plan and focused on landscape buffering along Simons Road,

among other things. Council was universal in their approval of the types of landscape buffering detailed in the project. The proposal even incorporated a rural-styled 4-rail fence. This item passed 5-0 with no public comment.

Item 2.6 dealt with the light industrial property along Chancey Road and at the terminus of Copeland Drive. The nineacre property would undergo a change from Industrial to Mixed Use and the zoning designation would change from Light Industrial to Planned Unit Development. This opens the door for residential development on the project but Corriveau has

been vocal about a mixed use on the property. Again, with no public comment, the measure passed 5-0.

Business items 2.1 to 2.6 were all second readings and will all have their third before they become codified.

Item 2.7 was the first reading of a development agreement between the City of Zephyrhills and The Cottages at Silver Oaks, LLC, the Golf View Cottages at Silver Oaks, LLC, and the District at Silver Oaks, LLC. It set a series of building standards that included a maximum height of two stories. There were 13 total clauses in the contract. Number 7 would benefit the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis and Wellness Center at the rate of \$500 per unit. The 651-unit development would eventually contribute \$325,500 to the center. Number 8 would obligate the developer to design, permit and construct a traffic signal at the intersection of Eiland Boulevard and Simons Road.

'We could almost use that (traffic signal) now," councilman Ken Burgess said.

Discussion then diverged into how Pasco County should contribute to the project. Details about how exactly the money could be used were brought up and Poe stipulated that the city would control how the dollars are spent. There was no public comment on the measure and it passed 5-0.

In the Comments Section, Poe noted that while it might not look it, the Pretty Pond/US 301 traffic signal project is underway and that May 10 is the date for substantial completion of the project with the final phase being just 30 days later. A workshop considering dispatch consolidation will be given by Zephyrhills Police Department Chief Derek Brewer on Feb. 18, just following the Mayor's Caucus.





remain in place during the entire fair at the Pasco County Fairgrounds off State Road 52 in Dade City. That includes face masks required indoors and when not being able to maintain social distancing outdoors.

"We've got to have their cooperation to make it all work," Thompson said of the public's responsibilities while they attend the fair this year. "We were one of the last fairs before the shutdown (which began last March). We're hoping it's as good as last year's. The people seem excited that this is something they can come to."

Mary Kelleher, whose family — husband Daniel, 7-year-old son Owen and 5-year-old daughter Mandy declined to venture out to the fair last year, showed up on the first day.

"We have chickens, so the first thing they want to see is the chickens," Kelleher said. "We're just glad they have it this year."

In the poultry barn, the top chickens were on display



at the entrance. Austin Greim, a student at the Academy at the Farm, had the grand champion (a black Wyandotte), which was in a pen next to Violet Dorough's reserve champion (a black Cochin).

Nearby at the Albert A. Barthle Livestock Pavilion on Monday night, a crowd filled the stands to

cheer on the celebrity milk-off, which this year is being sponsored by Pasco County Commissioner and local resident Ron Oakley.

While plenty of people showed up to watch the 35 participants in two divisions — pee wee and adult — the dairy cows will not be a part of the show later this week. That's because some are involved in the upcoming show at the Florida State Fair in Tampa, which pushed back its schedule this year.

"It's okay," said Tammy Hanlon, the Dairy Committee Chairwoman and emcee for the celebrity milk-off. "We're a flexible group."

Before the dairy cows, four of which came from Milk-A-Way Dairy in Webster, were milked, a couple of former champions and local family members reminisced about their titles and winning strategy.

"There's a secret grip," said Charlie Waller, a longtime Dade City attorney.

Added his daughter, Chelsea Waller-Douthard, "I can't tell you my secrets."

Competing in the adult division was Alicia Polk, a Circuit Court Judge for Pasco-Pinellas who got a helping hand from her 8-year-old son, Aiden. Monday marked the second time she has competed in



a celebrity milk-off with one of her children.

"My oldest son (Connor) was my assistant. Now my younger son is my assistant, so we've come full circle," she said.

Helping out with the dairy cows and lining up the competitors were several Future Farmers of America members, including Centennial Middle School's Gabriella Philipsen. The others, who are from Zephyrhills High's FFA were: Brooke Lea, Emma McKelvey, Stephanie Johnson, Isabella Aguilar and Emily Strife.

Billy Poe, Zephyrhills' city manager who also once held that position in Dade City, started off strong with the most milk pulled in the first heat.

"It's kind of the charm of small-town America," Poe said. "I like it. It's good clean fun."

Poe's wife Kim, assistant superintendent for Pasco County Elementary Schools, along with their children, Madison and William, also have competed in previous milk-offs.

The winners were Dusty Rowland in the adult category and pee wee champion Haylee Gilmore.

several local residents and city officials.

"The American flag may be a piece of cloth, but it is a symbol of freedom to the world," said Kardashian, a senior noting that it also means hope and bravery to him. "Countless men and women have fought and died for this flag throughout history and I am thankful for them and their sacrifice. To this day we still fly and fight for this beautiful flag.

Robert Starnes showed up in support of his daughter Madeline, one of four cadets to carry a flag in disrepair to a barrel and drop it into a fire for a ceremonial burning. He came with family members that included his mother, Margaret Starnes, niece Brianna Seenerine and her I-year-old daughter Ania.

"It's just a special thing. I go to all the (JROTC) events," said Starnes, whose father Lee served in the U.S. Army and passed away

nine years ago. In all, 35 local JROTC cadets showed up for the traditional event.

"It was an awesome experience to see my cadets heading up this event and going out into the community soliciting help," said Sgt. Jimmy Mcaulev.

Equally proud and impressed with the cadets was Sgt. Michael Smith, who along with Mcauley oversees the school's JROTC program.

'I loved seeing the cadets develop the idea, plan it, and divide the duties and responsibilities among them by their different skill levels," Smith said. "They had to explain (the plan) to school administration, do a presentation at city

hall (in front of Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield and city council members) and execute it. They did an outstanding job."

The primary student-officer in charge of the event was Captain James LaFerriere. The purpose, he noted, was to motivate cadets and raise their morale by paying homage to vet-erans, teaching cadets about citizenship, and maintaining respect and professionalism while helping better the community.

"It was an uplifting experience as most events have been cancelled," said LaFerriere, alluding to several JROTC events that have been cancelled during the ongoing coronavirus pandemic. "I am glad that we were able to help our community and have a positive experience from this year of uncertain times."

Aside from LaFerriere, other cadet leaders included: Battalion Executive Officer Major Zachariah Arnold, Battalion Command Sergeant Major Jovonne Guzman and Non-Commissioned Officer in Charge First Sergeant Parker Stuckey.

Four cadets marched under a sabre arch by that unit of the local JROTC to respectfully drop flags in disrepair into a barrel of fire. A presentation of colors also was made with the national anthem sung by Adrieonna Webber and Autumn Bayless.

The city provided a barrel to burn the flags in as well as a few five-gallon buckets, nylon brushes, rags, sponges, soap and bleach. Many cadets spoke proudly of taking part in the cleanup of headstones and planting of flags, as well as the flag-burning.
