Road project update for East **Pasco County**

Two major road projects are underway in East Pasco County, here's an update on where they're at

If you travel through Wesley Chapel on your way into Zephyrhills or vice-versa, undoubtedly, you've seen some of the road improvement projects that are underway. We'll examine two of them, the widening of SR 54 and the SR 56 extension.

SR 54 widening from east of Curley Road to east of Morris Bridge Road

This is a Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) project that began back in November of 2017. FDOT contracted D.A.B. Constructors, Inc. to tackle the 4.5-mile, \$42.5 million-dollar project. It addresses two major traffic snarls for eastbound traffic. As traffic thins from three lanes down to just one lane, east of Curley Road, it creates exasperating delays Then there's always the smart aleck that tries to swing out ahead of all the merging traffic. That jam then leads directly into the intersection of SR 54 and Meadow Pointe Boulevard. An unlucky driver can sit through half a dozen light changes on a bad day. It's a massive project and isn't slated for completion until Summer of 2021. When completed, the project will widen the existing two-lane road to a four-lane road with medians. A sidewalk will be put in on the north side of the road and a 10-foot wide multi-use trail will be installed on the south side.





The cemetery, located off 1st Street, is maintained by the city and has been in existence since 1911. The local JROTC has conducted the flag retirement ceremony there for the past four years as part of Project Patriotism

"I think it's great," said Chris Worley, a booster parent whose son Shawn, a 2009 Zephyrhills graduate, was in the JROTC program. "I would like to think that it reminds them of the traditions and the ceremonies we seem to lose track of.'

"It's amazing that we get up so early and we're so productive," Leach said. "It gives me motivation.'

day's meaningful ceremony. One-by-one they reached into a plastic tub to pull out folded United States flags in disrepair and place them in metal drums to be burned.

Among the first members to burn a flag with battalion commander Josie Wedge was cadet major Kyle Hulbert, a senior who was the master of ceremonies last year.

"It's different levels of pride and honor; a sobering experience," he said. Cadet Carmelo Mendoza, who helped or-

ganize the ceremony, echoed that

sentiment: "This means a lot to me. Putting this all together, it showed me a lot. I'm honestly very grateful for all the people who showed up."

"I've been singing this for a few years now, so I don't get ner-vous," Angelina DiGioia said. "With the JROTC we definitely take more pride at having the national anthem sung at different occasions."

ROAD PROJECTS: From Page 1A

The widening will continue on to another problematic intersection, that of SR 54 and Eiland/Morris Bridge. Have you been stuck behind traffic turning north onto Eiland while you just want to go straight through? Good news. Now there will be two left turn lanes to allow drivers to go north on Eiland, as well as an independent right turn lane. There will even be two through lanes on SR 54.

D.A.B. Constructors have been around since 1987 and had already completed multiple projects in Pasco County and in 21 other counties across the state. Projects like the Suncoast Parkway and the widening of US 41 in Land O' Lakes are some recent examples.

SR 56 new roadway extension from Meadow Pointe Blvd. to US 301

This project, which broke ground in February 2017, will go even further to alleviating eastbound traffic jams in the evening and westbound ones in the morning. If you drive by it, it looks complete. The current completion estimate is late 2019, according to the FDOT website.

FDOT contracted Cone & Graham for the six-mile, \$59.1-million project. The Tampabased bridge and road construction company has been working in central Florida for 35 years and has performed 90 percent of their work for FDOT, according to the company website. They worked on several phases of the Suncoast Parkway in Pasco County and have also completed several projects in adjacent Hillsborough County.

The company, which specializes in bridges is also installing a bridge over New River. The extension also crosses the Basset Branch.

"Reinforced concrete pipes (drainage structures) have been built and are being used to convey the water under the roadway," FDOT District 7 PIO Kris Carson said.

When complete, the new four-lane road will provide a much-needed connection between Zephyrhills and Wesley Chapel. The same format for the SR 54 extension will be installed on the shoulders. A five-foot sidewalk will be on the north side and 10-foot wide multi-use trail will be on the south side. Sevenfoot wide bike lanes will be available in both directions

Additionally, the traffic signals at both

intersections: SR 56 and Morris Bridge as well as where SR 56 connects with US 301 will be put in.

"The new traffic signal at the in-tersection of SR 56 and US 301 will be active when the roadway improvements are complete and the new road is open to traffic, which is anticipated for later this coming fall," Carson said.


I-75/SR 56 Diverging Diamond Interchange (DDI):

If you've followed traffic projects in the county, you've no doubt heard about these DDIs. Well, construction has finally begun on Jan. 7 of this year. Unfortunately, it's slated to take approximately three years to complete. The existing diamond interchange will be modified and converted to a DDI.

The idea is to improve safety and mobility at the interchanges by shifting the cross-road traffic to the left side of the roadway. All traffic on SR 54 wanting to access the interstate, will be able to do so without waiting at a left turn signal. Signalized crossovers will occur before the bridge or interchange and make for more efficient signalizing and be able to handle higher volumes of traffic. Here's two examples:

If you're travelling eastbound on SR 54, once the DDIs are in, instead of driving all the way up onto the bridge to wait in the left turn lane to go north on I-75, you'll get a signalized crossover prior to the bridge that will put you on the left side of the road and allow unimpeded access to the interstate.

If you're travelling north on I-75 and wanting to take SR 56 west, you'll no longer have

> to wait at the light. First, there will be an additional left turn lane. The shared left and right turn lane will be eliminated and there will be two right turn lanes. If you're in that left lane, you won't see a traffic signal until after the interchange, where you'll be moved back to the right side after a crossover light.

> If you're looking for more information, you're in luck. The FDOT is holding a public open house on Feb. 26 at the Conference Center at Pasco-Hernando State College, located at 2727 Mansfield Blvd. in Wesley Chapel. The meeting will be from 4-7 p.m. and both of the aforementioned projects will be represented. Also the project at the interchange of SR 56 and I-75 to Cypress Ridge Boulevard will be repre-


