County fair steer show and sale is a big hit



in price per pound

With safety measures stemming from the coronavirus pandemic, some local events have been cancelled or postponed and the ones that happen often are a fraction of what they have been in the past.

Not so with the youth beef show and steer sale at the 74th Annual Pasco County Fair off State Road 52 in Dade City. One of the chief organizers and prime backers noted that the price per pound for steers actually increased over last year. In fact, a 45 percent increase, according to R.J. Huss, president of the county's fair association.

"I think the community as a whole understand that

these kids need help and they stepped up," Huss said during last Thursday's show and sale at the Albert A. Barthle Livestock Pavilion.

While numerous local businesses, farmers and ranchers do their part to lend a hand to the annual effort, they all say it's about the kids from their Future Farmers of Ámerica groups.

City council awards airport runway bid, reviews code enforcement

Monday's city council meeting got one of the biggest municipal projects going

It's been a long time coming but the Zephyrhills Airport Runway Extension took one giant leap closer to commencing on Monday. Packed up into a Consent Agenda item, city council members voted 5-0 to award C. W. Roberts Contracting the bid for the project. The Roberts bid was the lowest of eight accepted bids on the project and comes in at \$3,673,232.40, which happens to be well under the allotted budget of \$4 million.

All six Consent Agenda items were bundled and passed together, 5-0. Item 1.2 approved a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) between Zephyrhills Police Department and the Pasco County Sheriff's Office for their SNAP or Street Narcotics Apprehension Program. Other Pasco County municipal police departments are part of the MOU which is designed to adhere to guidelines in the Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) that sets certain quotas for drug arrests and seizures.

Item 1.3 was a task assignment presented to council by Cornelison Engineering & Design (CED) Inc. The scope of the task assignment is to engineer, design, prepare construction plans, estimate construction probable cost and coordinate permitting for Simons Road Phase II from the northern boundary of the Links at Silver Oaks to Fort King Road. The not-too-exceed fee is \$48,049.

Item 1.4 requested council approve a Task Assignment Amendment with Jones Edmunds for Engineering Services during Construction and SRF loan administration services for the Reclaimed Water Line project. Added time, materials and scope of work is not to exceed \$86,500. The closing date for bids on the project is March 17.

Item 1.5 entered the city into an MOU with the University of South Florida and its College of Public Health for data tracking on violent

City weighs consolidated dispatch with Pasco County

ZPD Chief Derek Brewer gave a presentation to council regarding consolidated dispatch with the Pasco Sheriff's Office

First, let's lay out just what consolidated dispatch is. Consolidated dispatch means that the Pasco Sheriff's Office (PSO) would field all 9-1-1 emergency calls and then PSO would dispatch the officer or officers, potentially from either or both departments, to the scene. It is not a world apart from how it currently operates. Dispatch between PSO and ZPD currently uses the following model.

Any 9-1-1 emergency calls made from cellular phones go straight to PSO Dispatch. The dispatcher gets the information and then decides whether or not to forward the call to ZPD Dispatch. If the call is not forwarded, PSO dispatches its own deputies. If the call is forwarded

to ZPD, ZPD Dispatch takes the call and dispatches a ZPD officer or officers.

Landline calls that originate from within Zephyrhills city limits, go straight to ZPD Dispatch. What consolidated dispatch means is that PSO would take all 9-1-1 calls, be they cellular or landline and then PSO would dispatch PSO deputies or ZPD officers or a combination thereof.

There are some important factors to consider. The first is call volume. ZPD Chief Derek Brewer prepared a PowerPoint presentation, detailing the intricacies as well as pros and cons of consolidated dispatch. A salient point in the presentation is that 9-1-1 calls from landlines are eclipsing rapidly. Brewer cited statistics for emergency calls county-wide, over 10 years. In 2010, between 20 and 65 percent of emergency calls came from wireless callers. By 2012, 70 percent of emergency calls were from wireless phones. In 2020, 82 percent of emergency calls in Pasco County were from cell phones. Brewer also pointed out that 62 percent of emergency calls to ZPD in 2020 were calls that were transferred from PSO. Could

there be a day in the near future where 100 percent of emergency calls are made from cell phones?

"Truthfully, yes," Brewer said.

Brewer laid out three scenarios that the city could take. First, would be to keep dispatch just as it is. The second, would be to formulate some sort of hybrid model. The third would be to fully

consolidate dispatch with PSO. Pros and cons were discussed but one overarching sentiment was that no ZPD Dispatch personnel would have their positions eliminated. Multiple councilmembers stated such and Brewer said that while the dispatchers' role would shift slightly, that they would otherwise be

needed. Communications Operator Brittany Burris addressed the council as other members of dispatch were on-hand during the meeting.

"We have a streamlined dispatch at ZPD," Burris said. "Our dispatchers are personable and knowledgeable of the people and the area."

This was one of the stronger cases to keep dispatch at ZPD; that ZPD dispatchers were vastly more familiar with the area and the people that live in it.

"If somebody (calling 9-1-1) can't tell where they're at and they can see they're near a McDonald's, well there are only two here in town," councilman Alan Knight said. "Our dispatchers would ask if it's a stand alone and they'd know right away which one." One of the strongest arguments for

lidated dispatch was the extra time their call was taken at PSO and then trans- 5 drew no opposition for their reelection bids. ferred to ZPD.

Zephyrhills City Manager William Poe Jr. stated that the delay amounted to, "seconds" and not minutes but it was also generally agreed upon that seconds can be very precious in an emergency situation. Brewer was proud to note that ZPD has a record of handling emergency calls in less than two minutes.

No action was taken but council did elect to conduct a feasibility study to mine out details and get an even clearer picture of just what consolidated dispatch would look like.

"It (feasibility study) would determine if this makes sense for us," Brewer said.

Some important factors to consider are that the proposal is no more than a consolidated dispatch; that PSO does not have aims at taking over ZPD. Both Brewer and Poe stated that they had spoken with PSO Sheriff Chris Nocco and that taking over ZPD was not in his purview.

Council president Charlie Proctor echoed the desire to not reduce staff.

"It's a deal breaker for us if we lose staff," Proc-

tor said. It's also important to note that Dade City PD consolidated dispatch with PSO several years ago



deaths in the area. ZPD has agreed to participate in the statewide data initiative to help researchers evaluate homicides, suicides, and other violent deaths in Florida.

Item 1.6 approved a task order amending Runway 1-19 Extension - Phase 2 (Design and Bidding). Tasks include construction phase services, obstruction survey, airport geographical information systems (AGIS) uploads, and the coordination required for instrument flight procedures and publication updates for Runway 1-19. Amendment 2 of the original task order

There was just one business item on Monday's agenda. It was the second reading of a development agreement between the city and The Cottages at Silver Oaks, LLC, Golf View Cottages at Silver Oaks, LLC, and District at Silver Oaks, LLC for the Abbott Square development. It sets an estimated density of 0.24 units per dwelling acre, yielding an approximate total population density of about 1,500 units. It also set a maximum height for structures at two stories.

Councilman Alan Knight made the initial motion and the item passed 5-0.

Next up was an update from Zephyrhills Code Enforcement. Code enforcement officer Joel Bacon and public safety inspector Gene Brown both addressed council, providing information and a bar graph detailing a breakdown of the types of service calls the department makes. Miscellaneous calls occupied a majority share of the calls. Those include minor infractions like vehicles and grass.

Knight got an opportunity to again voice a concern he'd previously brought up at council meetings, that of corrugated plastic yard signs being staked all over the city. Council members concurred that it was indeed a considerable problem but also that it was one that's difficult to enforce. Bacon cited the frequency with which the signs get put out, against the desire for new businesses to promote themselves and even mentioned how a proposed joint-force cleanup with Pasco County never really materialized.

Councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson brought up the notion of more punitive consequences for violations.

Bacon replied that the judge who reviews code violations, does not look favorably on cases brought before him, regarding yard sign violations and that in most occasions, it was better to settle the affair between the offender and code enforcement. It was discussed and settled on that Bacon and the department would continue to pursue a plan of attack partnered with Pasco

County In Citizen Comments, Greater Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce president and CEO Melonie Monson asked council to approve alcohol sales at the April 10 Pigz in Z'hills event. Monson detailed the COVID-adapted plan for the event, which includes drive-up barbecue, a corn hole tournament in the afternoon and a concert in the evening. One of the more novel approaches was to have 10 foot by 10 foot grids that are spaced seven feet apart. Concert-goers can purchase a grid and up to six people can oc-

Council approved alcohol sales 5-0. Monson also asked the city for a discount on the permitting fee paid by the chamber to the city. Monson stated that the chamber still pays all city staff, including police but that the uncertain times have left the chambers coffers light and that a discount in the permitting fee would be very helpful in generating funds from the event, especially

considering its pared down application. Knight suggested a 50 percent discount on the fee, while other council members cautioned that this should not set a precedent. No action was required at the meeting but the proposals seem likely to go through.

Monson is also on the Board of Meals on Wheels of Pasco. The long-established entity is just moving into Pasco County and is having a ribbon cutting and block party on March 20 at their new facility - the Genesis Community Center - at 38120 15th Ave. The event is 4 to 6 p.m.

Zephyrhills resident John Paul Pigeon addressed council in Citizen Comments, decrying what he described as an, "ongoing" drug dealing problem on his street. Pigeon stated that he made multiple calls to the police department and emailed or spoke with city staff but that there has yet to be any resolution to his satisfaction. Council members and even ZPD Chief Derek Brewer acknowledged problems in that area and Brewer spoke with Pigeon aside after the meeting.

In the City Manager Announcements, William Poe Jr. brought up an economic impact report on the recent Sarah Vande Berg Tennis & Wellness Center events. Poe stated that for the first, "six or seven" events, there was a \$500,000 economic impact to the area.

Lance Smith stated that the impact was more in the neighborhood of \$665,000.

'And that's in the COVID-era," Smith said. "It's only going to get greater from here."

Aside from the steer sale, this year's fair featured a hog sale and plant sale later in the week. Another highlight was a twonight rodeo. Those events, held Friday and Saturday in the arena, were sanctioned by the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association.
