Great day for a parade

Snowbirds and year-round residents alike come together to celebrate city's parade and heritage

There have been plenty of cold days and even a few warm ones for the traditional parade to celebrate the heritage of what once was Abbott Station and later became Zephyrhills, an east Pasco bedroom community with a substantial influx of snowbirds during each winter.

Last Saturday, the weather was nearly perfect with a nice warm day for the 109th Founder's Day Parade and Heritage Festival. Not far behind that longstanding tradition is The Zephyrhills News, which debuted as the Zephyrhills Colonist and is now in its 108th year of publication.

The Founder's Day events were organized by Main Street cy that is based in the old Jeffries Home on 5th Avenue. Capt. Jeffries, the city's founding father, was a Union Army veteran who helped establish a colony for veterans — regardless of which side they were on — of the Civil War.

"I'm just so happy about everything," said Anna Stutzriem, coordinator for Main Street Zephyrhills. "Our volunteers are fantastic and we have wonderful judges. It's such a great community event. It's a great day for everybody

Hercules property in disrepair and will be demolished

Once the pool and building are gone, the property's fate will include public input

Public works director Shane Leblanc recently led city officials, Zephyrhills Police Chief Derek Brewer and members of the Zephyrhills Preservation Association on a tour of the abandoned Hercules property. The pool and adjacent building are in major disrepair and it was decided that a first-hand look was needed to assess the damage and determine the fate of the property.

Local politicians and city officials were quick to point out that plans for the pool and property will include public input with city council to soon begin listening to constituents. A public workshop took place last week before council members unanimously voted to demolish the property.

They want to demolish the stuff out of safety concerns," outgoing city manager Steve Spina said. "Some of it's pretty dangerous."

Kevie Defranc, the city's assistant planner, noted that "this is a project that can benefit the city. Residents should decide what happens to this

Following the tour, city council president Lance Smith spoke clearly about the state of the pool and building as well as his feelings for the property's

"After going through it I'm convinced it's not worth saving," he said.

Councilman Ken Burgess agreed, saying, "I'm thinking it's probably not salvageable. We'd really be boxing ourselves in if we kept it.'

Concerns also were expressed about the close proximity of Zephyrhills High School and Woodland Elementary School, each of which borders the

His vision included the replacement of older flags as well as purchasing new flags. "We asked for city councils' permission to have a fund drive. This is the first flag from that program. I kept it under wraps. It was a Christmas present to veterans and the citizens of the city to commemorate the completion of the library and the new city hall."

Andrew Nagey, 1st Vice Commander of American Legion Post 118 gave the dedication and his words harkened to the founding of the city. "Giving guidance to our community's seat of government, this flag under which our founding fathers, Captain Jeffries and his fellow Union Civil War veterans all took an oath to defend and protect. This flag is as symbol of our country and safe within its folds, is the

freedom and fealty of our nation." The city is required to do an evaluation and appraisal report of its comprehensive plan every seven years. The planning department completed their report in 2017 and submitted changes to the Department of Economic Opportunity. The plan is far reaching and affects areas such as a new 12-inch reclaimed water main along 12th Street and CR 54, restructuring funding for a new fire for fiscal years 20-23,





Hercules property.

Spina noted that \$113,000 has been set aside for the demolition project to be put out to bid. Initially, testing will be done for hazardous materials. Then, once a company has won the bidding process, the demolition will take place

sometime in the late spring or early summer.

The tour of the boarded-up building revealed several signs of vandalism and broken glass. Chief Brewer noted that the recent additions of Wawa and Culver's adjacent to the property likely kept vagrants away.

The pool, which has an extensive deck and is fenced in, also was damaged with visible cracks and standing water at a low level. Leblanc suggested that there could be leaks.

"We cleaned most of the junk out of here, but I think the pool leaks and the water table is high," he said.

While it remains uncertain of what will happen to the property formerly owned by the Pasco School District and now owned by the city, local officials have said that public input will help determine its fate.

"There is a trail back there, but this could become more passive," Spina said of the poten-

tial for a public park. Danny Navarro and his wife Jennifer of the Historic Preservation Board were part of the tour. Jennifer said, "I would probably envision an affordable rec center."

Added Danny, "Bring back the pool so kids can swim again."

Everybody has their own idea and I think this is what this experience is for," said Audrey McGuire, the historic preservation's specialist and community planner. "I personally would like to see something for the community to use. I'm of the impression that the pool should go."

Board member Tracy Sullivan, who years ago took her young daughters swimming at the pool, concurred that the pool should go: "I

don't think it would be feasible for the city."

Regardless of what type of park or other options available, McGuire cited a key compo-

nent she thought the area must contain.

"I think the main thing is making this a safe, inviting and visible area would be a priority for me," she said.



to come together and celebrate." Four judges sat on a trailer bed at a table in front of the Eiland Bandstand, marveling at the numerous floats and marchers as they passed by That group, which judged more than 60 en-tries, included Stephanie Black, Chris Wieck, Angie Smith and Diane Thomas.

Before the parade got under way there was



construction to finalize the plan.

Krusen Field concession stand to start in FY 18/19, and new

sidewalk along 20th Street from CR 54 to Henry Drive.

Many more items were included in the presentation presented by director of planning for the city, Todd Vande Berg. He added, "We have been working diligently with the DOT over the years and as of late are working on a final design for the 301 and Gall Boulevard corridor." The city's ultimate plan is to return all roadways in the downtown area back to two-way traffic patterns. This is a many year project and will require roadway changes and new


City council president Lance Smith commented, "I'm glad we have a plan. Traffic gets worse and worse every year."

City staff and city council have reviewed and discussed the concept of imposing a fire/rescue non-ad valorem assessment fee on properties within the city as a means of funding and providing professional fire/rescue services and diversifying revenue sources to fund local government. A pre-council meeting workshop was held with Erick van Malssen, principal with Stantec to discuss the details of how the city can fully implement the new fee.
