# Governor pays surprise visit to Zephyrhills

Ron DeSantis vows to expand vaccine dosages to more seniors and other groups in Florida

Governor Ron DeSantis paid a surprise unannounced visit to Zephyrhills on Wednesday morning to address the public on a greater vaccine rollout in keeping with his Seniors First agenda. It marked the first visit by a governor since Rick Scott came to Zephyrhills in 2012 to tout job growth in Pasco County.
Flanked by State Senate President Wilton Simpson

(R-Trilby) and Pasco Sheriff Chris Nocco, the governor spoke at the old Suntrust Building on Gall Boulevard. He informed dozens of people gathered in the parking lot about expanding dosages for seniors as well as making vaccines available to certain groups, such as fire-fighters, first responders and school-related personnel.

Vaccine rollouts began in December and while there have been some reported problems with scheduling shots online, DeSantis said that is changing nationally and statewide.

"It's easier to get online now," he said. "We've had millions of people who have already gotten the shot. We've done a majority of seniors in Florida."

City manager Billy Poe welcomed the governor and his message of keeping the economy going while making vaccines more readily available to the public.

"It's huge, the leadership and keeping people working and the infection rate low," Poe said.

City councilman Alan Knight, a staunch support-

er of the governor, was among dozens of folks to stand in line to receive a vaccine from AdventHealth staff on Wednesday morning.

This is the first (shot) and I'm looking forward to it," he said. "I've always respected Ron DeSantis. I think he's a people's governor. I think he's doing what's best for the people."

That would be getting more vaccines distributed with DeSantis saying, "Pasco and Polk are each getting 3,300 shots today for seniors. Bottom line is I think this is going to be our best week yet. We'll be back in this area soon, but we're going to make sure that everyone who

### On This Day in Florida History: The Battle of **Natural Bridge**

This Friday and Saturday mark the 156th anniversary of the battles of Newport and Natural Bridge

The State of Florida is often overlooked in American Civil War history. Florida had just become a state in 1845 and the US Army was still fighting the Seminole Indians as late as 1858. Wide swaths of the state lay largely unsettled and she had 1,400 miles of coastline to defend against incursion. While Florida managed to put a higher percentage of Confederate troops into the field than any other state, nearly 14,000 of a population of roughly 140,000, according to the 1860 Census, most of those troops marched off to battlefields in Virginia and Tennessee.

Yet, it would be events in western Mississippi that would point Union attention at Florida and her capital of Tallahassee. On July 4, 1863, the fortified City of Vicksburg fell to General Ulysses S. Grant after a nearly two-month siege. The fall of the city, brought the entire Mississippi River under Union control. Perhaps more significant for Florida, it severed a vital supply line from Texas, where Confederate armies received much of their salt and beef supply. The eyes of both Union and Confederate strategists turned to Florida. In an instant, Florida became the primary supplier of both aforementioned items for Confederate armies.

In February 1864, a Union push into the center of the state, aimed at cutting off this vital supply line, was stopped just outside a rail station at Olustee near Ocean Pond. It dismayed the strategic thought, that most regular Confederate units from Florida were deployed elsewhere. They were. What threw the theory for a loop was Confederate authorities in Charleston, S.C. sent several battle-hardened Georgia regiments, by rail, to aid Confederate General Joseph Finnegan in turning back Union General Truman Seymour at Olustee.

Fast forward to one year later and units such as the 2nd Florida Cavalry US and the 2nd US Colored Infantry are conducting raids along the Gulf Coast of Florida, again, aimed at disrupting that supply chain. They met with success. They struck Tampa, Cedar Key and

"Because of Covid, a lot of reeactments got cancelled and we heard about this from a friend," said Emily-Jane Curtis, who displayed various bonnets in a booth. "It's a beautiful area. There's that smalltown charm that a lot of places have lost.'

The living history event was highlighted by Civil War reenactments on Saturday and Sunday afternoons. People in period and dress uniforms played out the Battle of Fort Myers between the union and confederate armies. It was a step back in time to the

"It's the history and trying to teach what actually happened, because school books aren't always 100 percent (accurate)," said Everett Jones, the event's organizer from Plant City.

Afterward, people who attend numerous events at the museum and village, along with newcomers taking in their initial event at the east Pasco location, spoke fondly of the reenacted skirmish as well as the

Steve Rinck, a reenactor known perhaps more for being a retired principal who served at a halfdozen Pasco County schools. He was there with his wife Nancy and 5-year-old grandson Maxon. They stopped by the blacksmith shop to watch Steve Melton forge metal into tools.

Newcomers Gene Greek and Arlene Caswell were enthralled by the mock battle as well as the encampment of the reenactors and other historical buildings at the site.

"It was really cool," said Greek, adding that

he was most impressed with

"the amount of control (the soldiers in battle who were supposedly shot) had to lay out in the sun.'

'It definitely makes you reflect," Caswell said. "To think about how times are so different now and how hard it was back then."

Caswell and a few other people mentioned the authenticity of the battle too.

"It was really loud," she said.

Added Harold Perkins, who along with his wife Valerie are from Bushnell, "The smoke from the rifles and cannons looked real. It was just like it should've been on the battlefield.'

Chuck Sheridan, a reenactor for the confederate side who rode his horse out and carried a white flag in requesting that the union soldiers give back a cannon they took, appreciated just how authentic the battle turned out to be.

'Getting to crank her up and ride," Sheridan, of Sanford, said was the best part of fulfilling his role in the staged event.

Another part of the event was a traveling wall, which has toured throughout the state for more than 10 years and pays homage to the 4,265 names of confederates from Flor-

"People think it's awesome," said Cathy King, dressed in a long dress from that era. People don't realize that Florida had that big of a role, but it did.'

Before the battle was staged, people walked around the grounds of the six-acre site, visiting buildings like the 1860s John Overstreet House, C.C. Smith General Store and Mabel Jordan Barn. People also were entertained by 7 lbs. of Bacon, a two-man band with guitar and mandolin players.

Next up at the village is the Jelly Bing Fling, which was cancelled last year due to the government shutdown that stemmed from the coronavirus pandemic. This year, it takes place on March 20.



soon, but we're going to make sure that everyone who wants a

shot gets a shot. Two Walgreen's, one in Zephyrhills and the other in Hudson, are coming aboard as places to receive shots. Already, shots are available at various Publix, Winn Dixie, Walmart and CVS stores throughout the state.

In Pasco, DeSantis said the current rate of seniors being vaccinated is at 42 percent and he is confident that it will be increased to at least 50 percent in the near future. He expects nearby Pinellas to be at 50 percent this week, noting that some other

counties in the state already are at that level.

In addition to seniors, DeSantis said the vaccines should be available to firefighters, first responders and school personnel by

"The goal is to do everyone 50-and-up in the state soon," he said. "I think we can get through a lot of those people very quick-DeSantis expects 175,000 doses from Johnson & Johnson

Simpson was equally optimistic, saying, "I believe we will have shots in every arm in March. We look forward to getting our numbers up in the next couple of weeks."

Nocco welcomed the visit from the governor and his message of more vaccines.

"Florida's leading the way in getting people inoculated," he said, adding that despite the tragic loss of lives that business people "are thankful that the pandemic didn't take away their businesses" and called that prospect "devastating."

Annual Driver's License Reinstatement Event returns March 3-6

Set for March 3-6, Operation Green Light 2021 is the Pasco County Clerk & Comptroller's annual event to help motorists idled by certain unpaid court fines and fees get back behind the wheel legally while saving big on collections, penalties, and interest.

'This is an important moment for drivers who have seen their licenses suspended over unpaid court obligations," says Clerk and Comptroller Nikki Alvarez-Sowles. "So much of our modern lives depends on having reliable transportation, and for most of us, that means being able to drive.

During Operation Green Light, penalties, interest, and collections fees that have been piling up can, in many cases, be waived. For those who can't pay their obligations in total, we offer payment plans that allow driving privileges to be restored, too.'

Deputy clerks will be available at both

courthouses - the Robert Sumner Judicial Center (Dade City) and the West Pasco Judicial Center (New Port Richey) – during business hours, 8:30 a.m.-5 p.m., March 3-5 for inperson assistance. March 6 is by phone or on-line only, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.

All four days, sidelined motorists can skip the trip and get squared away by telephone: (352) 521-4542, Option 2; or (727) 847-8031, Option 2, between 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. and March 6, 9 a.m.-1 p.m.

even into the interior using an abandoned Seminole War-era fort at Fort Myers. Fort Myers became both a refugee camp for civilians as well as a base of operations for the Federals.

By February 1865, virtually all regular units from Florida had been sucked up into the Army of Northern Virginia, leaving precious few to defend their home state. One unit that stayed was the Cattle Guard Battalion or "Cow Cavalry." The Cow Cavalry's primary directive was to secure and drive herds of cattle northward to rail lines or supply stations in north Florida. The raids by Union troops had become so frequent by 1865 that the Cattle Guard Battalion

had to do something.
On February 20, 1865, they mustered their scattered troops and attacked Fort Myers. It was a brief exchange, the Union soldiers were not inclined to leave the protection of the fort and the Cattle Guard Battalion were not inclined to storm the fort, potentially with heavy loss. The Confederates withdrew after just a few hours of trading artillery and musket fire, back to the Fort Meade area.

This was the cue Union strategists were waiting for. This was confirmation that most, if not all, regular Confederate units were absent from the state. The Union would finally spring their plan to cross the state capital of Tallahassee off the balance sheet. In March 1865, an expedition under Union General John Newton, landed near Saint Marks and began marching north, along the Saint Marks River. With Newton, were the units from the Fort Myers battle, the 2nd Florida Cavalry US and the 2nd US Colored Infantry. Some companies from the 99th US Colored Infantry were also a part of the thrust at the capital. To oppose them, Confeder-

ates had no regular units to field. They cobbled together a group of "reserves," boys of 17 and men over 45, along with local Home Guard units, similarly comprised of young boys and old men. Adding to the opposition force was a group of cadets from the Florida Military Institute, with General William Miller in overall command. On March 5, Union troops attacked at Newport, only to find the bridge across the Saint Marks River burned and Confederates entrenched on the opposite bank.

Newton left the 2nd Florida Cavalry US to keep up skirmishing, meanwhile he would advance with the balance of the forces north to a place where the river could be more easily crossed, a place called Natural Bridge. Miller's troops shadowed the movement and before the morning of March 6, nearly 1,000 Confederate soldiers opposed Newton's men. The Union troops attacked via skirmish order at daylight but were driven back. They re-formed and charged again but again were repulsed. By early afternoon, Newton sent his entire force forward en masse but again they were driven back, this time with heavy losses. Confederates attempted to seize the momentum swing and pushed a force forward in pursuit but they were repulsed with heavy loss.

All told, the Federal force at Natural Bridge suffered 148 casualties, while the hodgepodge Confederate force sustained 3 killed and 22 wounded. Newton and the Federals returned to their ships, felling timbers across the road to thwart pursuit. Natural Bridge would preserve the state capital from capitulation. Yet, in April, General Robert E. Lee would surrender to Ulysses S.Grant at Appomattox Court House in Virginia and General Joseph E. Johnston would surrender to William T. Sherman in Durham, N.C. that same month, effectively ending

the American Civil War.

On May 10, a Union cavalry unit would finally accept the surrender of Tallahassee. The last organized Confederate troops in Florida would be paroled in Tampa in early June of
