Pioneer Florida Museum hosts traditional family event for fourth straight year

Some kids were overjoyed as with racing out in an open field to scramble for jelly beans while others liked riding ponies, climbing an artificial rock wall or playing in the bounce house.

"The kids had such a good time doing the jelly bean hunt last year I had to bring them back," Dade

City's Sophia Kirk said of her 8-year-old son Thomas and daughter Jordan, 6.

Shelley Moon of Wesley Chapel said her 6-year-old daughter Audrey also "likes finding the Easter eggs."

Pioneer Florida Museum & Village takes namesake and mission to heart

Part two includes a general store, shoe repair shop and a train depot

There is just so much history at the Pioneer Florida Museum & Village, we had to break it up into two parts. In our first offering, we highlighted the historical buildings that you'll encounter in the first leg of your counter-clockwise circuit around the museum grounds. In this edition, we'll continue that circuit and detail more of the rest of the historical buildings. The improvements and acquisitions never stop. They are in the process of preparing an L-shaped home built in 1911 that was owned by the Black family for transport to the grounds. The museum will continue to be a portal into the past.

C.C. Smith General Store:

This building was donated by C.C. Smith's niece and moved to the museum grounds in May of 2000. Originally built in 1927 in the town of Lacochee, it was operated by C.C. Smith and his wife for more than 50 years.

"It was the Walmart of its day," Sweat said.

A local could purchase most anything that could be had at the general store. If they didn't have it, it could be special ordered. The store also served as a post office and had post office boxes that could be rented. Most of those boxes remain in the general store, many still with the original names of the people who collected their mail from them. Another building with a beautifully-restored inside, many of the larger items in the store came with the store, even a turn-of-the-century coffee grinder.

"A lot of the items you'll see in the store are from individuals' donations," Sweat said. "The museum decides on their period correctness and then either places them in the store or elsewhere in the museum."

Smith, Maggard carry clear if not lopsided victories in Tuesday's elections

Tuesday's elections seated an incumbent city councilman and advanced a state house candidate through his primary

For one candidate, Tuesday's results seated him for his fifth term. For another, the race has just begun. For two other candidates, it's the end of their run. City Council Seat 1 candidate Manny Funes and Republican primary candidate for House District 38 David "Mac" McAllister lost in their attempts to unseat frontrunners in their respective races.

Funes, who'd served on the Zephyrhills City Council prior, conducted a respectable campaign with adequate if not impressive experience. Funes braved the intermittent rains on Tuesday to be a presence primarily at the Alice Hall Community Center in Zephyrhills. He certainly had a measure of support in the community.

"You need diversity and checks and balances and sometimes you have to root someone out to get good ideas in there," Jerry Hood of Zephyrhills said. "Lance is a good guy but I want someone that's going to be tough on the law enforcement side and isn't afraid to rattle a few cages."

that in McAllister." The strategy certainly painted a contrast between the two candidates but in the end, Maggard's connection to the people and to East Pasco County was just too strong.

"I support Randy (Maggard)," Louise Columbus said. "My kids went to school with him and he's a good Pasco County guy." Maggard and his team put in a great deal of effort prior to the election and Maggard braved the rain at Alice Hall to wave signs.

"I am honored and humbled by the outpouring of support we received from Pasco County Republicans," Maggard said. "Our campaign volunteers worked tirelessly putting up signs, walking door-to-door, making phone calls and encouraging fellow Republicans to get out and cast their vote. I now look forward to the opportunity to carry our campaign message to voters across House District 38 as we work toward the general election."

Maggard's win in the primary sets the stage for the general special election set for June 18. Maggard will face off against Democrat Kelly Smith. Smith qualified via the petition method, submitting 288 qualified petition signatures. She has raised just over \$13,000 as of April 4.

The only blot on Tuesday's Election Day was the low turnout. Just 14.93 percent, 9,285 of 62,183 of registered voters actually turned out on Tuesday or submitted mail-in ballots.

"People fought for me to be able to do this (vote)," Kimberly Martin said after casting her ballot at Alice Hall. "Any time you have a civic duty, it's your obligation to do it."

Truly, local elections have a significant impact on day-to-day life and the opportunity to elect officials, especially local ones, is not a responsibility to be shirked.

"I put them in or I vote them out," Boyette said. "I never miss a chance to vote, it's the way I express who I want to represent me."

McAllister's supporters were adamant about turning out for elections, too.

"Every election is important, people have died for our right to vote," Walter said. "Because we're a rich country and consumeristic, we don't appreciate what we have. People need to be more involved with their civic duty."

Funes' background in law enforcement attracted Hood. However, Smith's experience and record of collaborative work with other government agencies helped carry the day. Smith won with 67.52 percent of the vote to Funes' 32.48 percent. In raw numbers it was 975 to 469 votes.

"It was nice having the support of the community and feels good getting nearly 70 percent," Smith said. "It gives me the impression that I've done a good job in the eyes of the people."

Smith will enter his fifth term with some clear objectives in mind.

"I'd like to continue to work with the council, Pasco County and the state on transportation issues," Smith said. "We also have some code enforcement issues that we need to work jointly with the county. There are areas in the county that are adjacent to the city and we need to work together on those. We've also got work to do with our airport and industrial area to help create jobs."

Smith certainly had some support locally. Alice Hall was the only precinct open for the municipal election and Smith posted up there for much of the day, Tuesday.

"I'm here to support Maggard and Smith," Earl Boyette said. "I've known both of them all my life and they are honest and good people. I know Manny (Funes) too and he's and honest good guy."

Smith will take on his fifth term as city councilman. City council members serve three-year terms and are paid \$500 per month.

Maggard's race was a little tighter. Maggard carried the Republican primary for the House District 38 special election 61.88 percent to 38.12 percent. Total votes was 4,520 to 2,784. Maggard being a lifelong resident of the area, painted himself as the hometown candidate. McAllister actually ran with that and framed himself as the change catalyst and unapologetic Trump standard-bearer.

"I want a guy that can't be bought, somebody who can make statements that aren't politically correct," McAllister supporter Phil Walter said. "The truth is the truth and it should be appreciated, not scorned and I think we have

J.L. Bromley Shoe Repair Shop:

A hundred years ago, when your shoes wore out, you didn't just run to Foot Locker and buy a new pair. You fixed the ones you had. Quality took reign over quantity in 1913 when the shop was built in downtown Dade City on the corner of Pasco Street and 8th Street. The shop serviced the Dade City area until 1930 when Mr. Bromley's health began to fail.

Cast iron wheels were fixed to the bottom of the shop and it was moved to the Fred

Bromley property on Lake Pasadena Road and there it remained until the summer of 1990 when Fred and Pearl Bromley donated it to the museum. Fred and Pearl operated a clock repair shop in Zephyrhills for 42 years.

Inside you'll notice the tools of a cobbler's trade. A shoe anvil, a cast iron device that looks like an upside down metal foot on an iron bar. It was used to both make new shoes and repair old ones.

Trilby Depot:

The last historical building on the property is the Trilby Train Depot. There was a train depot in Trilby as early as 1887 and sometime between 1887 and 1896, Henry Plant built the railroad depot as he extended his railroad from Sanford on the St. Johns River toward Tampa. In 1902, the Atlantic Coast Line Railroad took it over and it had between eight and 10 sections of track, one of the most active, "switching centers" and third largest rail yard in the state. The depot featured a 24-hour restaurant. Aside from connecting train depots from Trilby to Zephyrhills, the building also served as a telephone circuit and the only telegraph line in town.

In 1925, most of the town of Trilby was destroyed in a fire and a year later, the depot was remodeled without its upper story. On through the 1960s, the depot became an important means of travel. The Orange Blossom Special, the Southland, the Champion and even the Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey Circus made scheduled stops in Trilby. The depot was closed in 1976 and moved to the museum in 1978. There is a photo

inside the station that depicts how it was moved. Also inside are a number of artifacts from the era including lanterns, signal flags and maps.

Outside the depot is the Cummer Cypress Company Steam Engine, a 1913 creation used to haul logs from Lacochee to the sawmills. Behind the engine is a railroad car holding three massive Red Tidewater Cypress Logs, estimated to be at least 500 years old at the time they were harvested.

Other Buildings:

There are several other buildings on the museum grounds but they are not historical buildings themselves. The Blanton Packing House is chocked full of citrus canning and processing equipment from the early 20th Century and most of the items in the building are from that time period but the building itself is not.

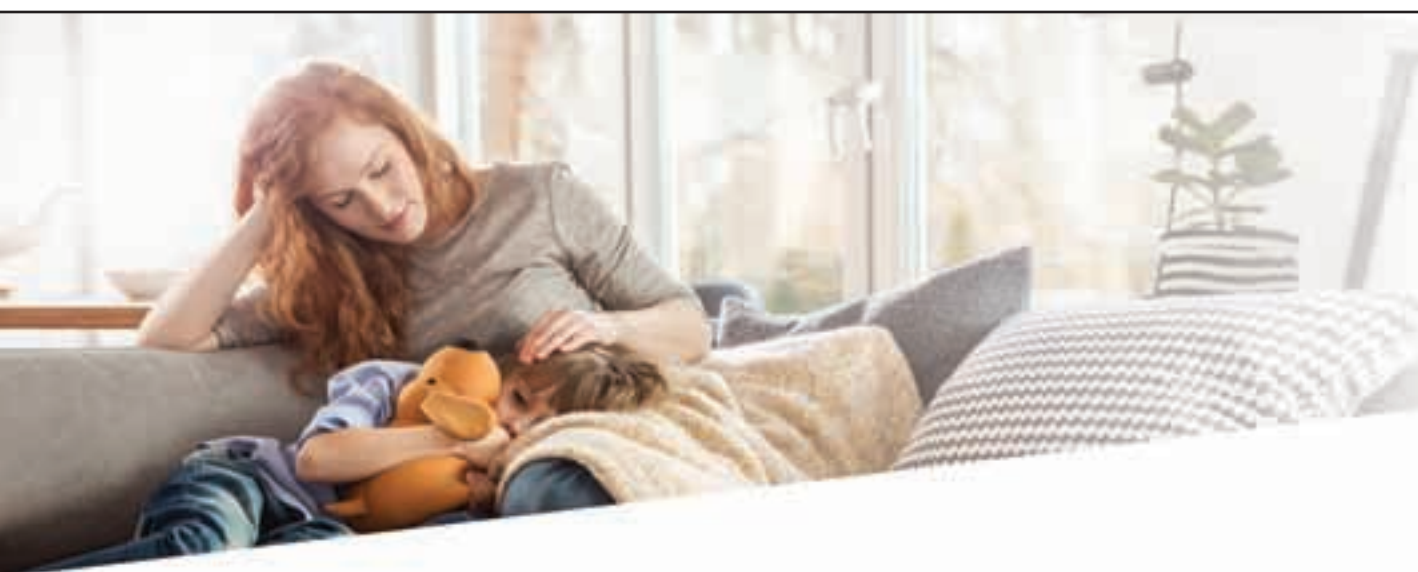
The History Center and Cummer Building is not an historical building but the contents inside are brimming with historical significance.

The Mabel Jordan Barn is also a newer building but is full of farm implements and historical vehicles, including a Model T automobile. There are several other structures on the property that are recreations of the time period.

The Cane Mill, a period carpentry shop, blacksmith shop and even a moonshine still along with a drying shed, chicken coop and hardware shed that are placed as though they were on the property of the Overstreet House.
