Despite delay, the community venue near the airport hosted the 11th Annual BBQ & Blues Festival

Although it was delayed by more than two months, a popular tradition of bringing people to Zephyrhills for some tasty barbecue continued last Saturday. Pigz in Z'hills took place at the community venue on 14 acres adjacent to the Zephyrhills Municipal Airport.

Billed as the Greater Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce's primary fundraiser of the year, the 11th Annual BBQ & Blues Festival was initially scheduled for January. It was delayed until last weekend, marking one of many festivals, parades and other events that succumbed to shutdowns or postponements brought on by the coronavirus pandemic.

"We didn't have COVID last year," said Melonie Monson, the chamber's president noting that last year's festival was held shortly before shutdowns throughout the state. "That's why we wanted to have something this year. We did not want to lose that momentum."

Social distancing was adhered to with Monson estimating about 1,000 people attending the event. Drivethru barbeque dinners and a blues concert highlighted the festival, which included a dozen older model vehicles for an auto show. There also was a cornhole tourna-

"We didn't know what to expect, 500 or 5,000," Monson said. "Obviously we wished we had more. I'm just happy we were able to put together what we could and do it safely.'

'Some people came just to pick up food and left," added Randy Stovall, the chamber's chairman.

While attendance was sparse several people echoed sentiments about having the event anyway. Among them was Meagan Sammons, leader of Boy Scoot Troop 117. She brought scouts Jacob Conner, Heath Sammons and Eric Deyarmin, each of whom passed out flyers to people as they entered the property.

"It's pretty cool," Conner said of meeting visitors near the front gate. "Although it's not as big as it was going to be because of COVID, it's still a good turnout on

The most active attraction was the area sectioned off for a cornhole tournament. Play continued throughout

'The cornhole people had a blast," Monson said.

Safety tips to battle crime and be secure

Zephyrhills Police Department keeps year-round residents and snowbirds informed about crime prevention measures

Capt. Reggie Roberts of the Zephyrhills Police Department noted that the coronavirus pandemic virtually wiped out a volunteer effort with various groups and park representatives throughout the community.

"Ever since the beginning of Covid our volunteer program has taken a hit, but we're going to rebuild that program stronger and better than before," he said.

As for moving forward, Roberts said, "We're actually teaching them how to protect their property. We will go out and speak to

Lt. Nathan Gardner, as he has done in years past, recently showed up on the department's Facebook page to deliver a message on safety tips for those seasonal residents returning to their homes up north as well as people who reside in the area on a year-round basis.

"I'm here to talk to our part-time residents about some friendly tips for you to secure your valuables and what-not when you're getting ready to leave your home for an extended period of time," Gardner said. Highlighting Gardner's overall message

were the following safety tips:

Make sure all doors and windows are secure with deadbolts and locks; secure and take inventory of valuables, preferably in a fireproof safe or take them with you; prominent identifying marks include name, serial numbers, photos and brand year; close blinds or curtains and have lights on a timer or motion

Additionally, friends, family members and neighbors can be enlisted to lend a helping hand. Have someone from that group park their vehicle in your driveway periodically; ask them to check on your property when you're gone. It also is helpful to law enforce-

ment officials to update contact numbers. Keeping vigilant is a must, especially in light of a string of burglaries in Zephyrhills in February and March. On Feb. 22 and 28 there

Museum and intro to Healing Hearts headline council

Monday's City Council meeting saw a trio of presentations showcasing local businesses and non-profits

Pascal Collard, president of Tennis Pro Florida of the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis & Wellness Center, presented an introduction to beach volleyball. SVB now has aims at adding beach volleyball to their menu of sporting options. Collard stated that 53 colleges now have Division 1 school teams.

"It's one of the faster growing sports in the country," Collard said. Collard mentioned a beach volleyball event held just

the weekend prior at Saint Petersburg Beach that drew 300 competitors and 4,000 spectators. The economic impact that bringing the sport to east Pasco County could have is potentially substantial.

'There is nothing in Pasco County or Tampa like this,"

Following Collard and SVB was a presentation by Zephyrhills Museum of Military History President Cliff Moffett about how the museum, located in an original World War II barracks building, originated and grew over the years. The barracks were converted to a museum in 1997. The building and airfield are historically significant as the 10th Fighter Squadron trained there leading up to their deployment to the European Theatre of World War II. Moffett



were seven total car burglaries with other items taken in the downtown vicinity.

In March, nine burglaries occurred at the Emerald Pointe RV Resort off Chancey Road near the Samuel W. Pasco Recreation Complex. That prompted local police to go out and speak to resi-

"We tried to urge them to keep safe," Roberts said. Five days after the crimes in Emerald Pointe, 13 more bur-

glaries occurred in the downtown area.

Snowbirds and year-round residents alike are appreciative of the department's community outreach effort. Rita Jones, who is from Maine and lives in Betmar Acres year-round, was among numerous local residents who watched the video.






Fig. 1 (See Eq. 250) (1997). TIME TWO PYRAMIDS As you move down the word owners. shown bere is seen world doors no the same lettern as the world. Monthly if the All Agent to Ben 17.00 is to some of the Minimizer with ne hads from the rub count (Espain Call Landon - 2 Betty horizon a

spoke about how museum curators formed a board and a 501(c)(3) non-profit and improved the quantity and quality of the museum's artifacts. He noted two events the museum puts on, both a D-Day event in June and a Pearl Harbor remembrance event in December and spoke about the economic impact to Zephyrhills during those events.

Some key statistics, highlighting the success of the museum, were that 400 people signed the guest book during the most recent Pearl Harbor event. Moffett stipulated that guest book signings are only a fraction of actual attendance. He noted that in 2016, 191 people signed the guest book and that in 2020, 1,595 people signed the guest book. Moffett also noted the 2,100 volunteer hours museum members logged in 2020. The museum has a catalogue of artifacts numbering 1,600. Moffett concluded by announcing intent to add security cameras to the museum and also announced a Vietnamera event for 2022

The final presentation was from Kathy Pahl of Healing Hearts Cafe, the kitchen located on 12th Street. She announced that the kitchen is open from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. six days per week. They chose those hours so that the traffic would not overlap with nearby Zephyrhills High School during arrival and dismissal. Pahl said that Healing Hearts served 50 homeless and food insecure people at their location. She also noted that the outdoor temporary showers, a bone of contention during the last council session, have been removed. Pahl added that Healing Hearts is not a shelter and that no one is staying there, currently.

Furthermore, she added that loitering outside is not permitted. The cafe seeks to provide

a number of services for the needy. A social worker volunteers there, a washing machine and dryer are on their way, there is computer access available. Pahl invited council members to stop by to check out the coffee and pastry station, provided by local donations.

She concluded by stating that the cafe may eventually petition to be an emergency shelter. ZPD Chief Derek Brewer noted that he, Pahl and coordinators with the Good Samaritan Project and Meals on Wheels are meeting

and keeping in communication with each other. The regular business followed the presentations. Six Consent Agenda items were bun-

dled and passed 5-0, the original motion made by councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson. Item 2.1 approved the March 22 meeting minutes. Item 2.2 awarded a contract to Adams Tank

& Lift to replace the Zephyrhills Airport's fuel farm. Adams came in with the lowest bid of \$654,280.

Item 2.3 asked council to approve improvement of six lift stations in the city, in the amount of \$392,530.26.

Item 2.4 approved the purchase of an emergency standby generator for Well Number 12 in the amount of \$86,626.

Item 2.5 authorized the water division of the utilities department to purchase backflow preventers in the amount of \$105,525

Item 2.6 accepted an Airport Coronavirus Response Grant in the amount of \$23,000.

Two business items were presented by community planner Audrey McGuire. Item 3.1 was a petition to rezone a small 0.19-acre parcel near the corner of 11th Street and 7th Avenue from R4 to R2 zoning. The surrounding homes are zoned for R2 or single family. It was Mc-Guire's opinion that the zoning change would help keep the historic character of the area.

The item was approved 5-0 with councilman Lance Smith making the original motion.

Item 3.2 asked to change some of the language in the Historic Preservation Board's board membership qualifications. The item asked to add two alternates to the five-person board and asked to delete language requiring board members to be city residents and allowing for the board to have "a majority" of city residents but also of business owners in the city. This measure was approved 5-0 with Wilkeson filing the initial motion.
