Pasco County School District celebrates April as Volunteer Month

Jacob White is a big help in Catherine Burgess' art class. Former school resource officer and softball coach Jeff Hupp has come back to coach the boys golf team and oversee attendance issues. Gwen Stein and Evylyn Simmons assist with running the media center.

Collectively, they are among 700 Zephyrhills High volunteers who do not go unnoticed. They are being recognized as part of a statewide education effort to declare April as School Volunteer Appreciation Month. In Pasco County, that includes more than 17,000 volunteers contributing 185,000-plus hours.

"Zephyrhills High is very lucky to have a large contingent of people who are willing to give their time and effort to help students who are in need and to help school programs that would probably cease to exist without that," said principal Angie Stone. White, a 2018 Zephyrhills graduate who is autistic, helps fellow art students in Burgess' class on Tuesday and Thursdays. "He works with the clay and has been running our pug mill, as well as helping with student projects," Burgess said. "He is always there and always helpful." Paul White said his son is appreciative for the chance to stay connected with the school and enjoys time spent with some of his former classmates. He took art in Burgess' classes for all four of his years at the high school. "It's good for him," Paul White said. "He en-joys it a lot and it gives him something to do. He likes stuff to do. He doesn't want to sit at home. He and his teacher get along well."

Zephyrhills Public Library hosts popular sessions, which are free and held monthly

It's that time of year with young and old alike making baskets and decorating eggs as Easter approaches. A monthly art class at the Zephyrhills Public Library, which convenes on the second Friday or each month, was filled with eager artists doing their part to uphold tradition. "I knew these crafts would be a big hit," said Lori Brightwell, who is in her second year as the city's library director.

Brightwell, who formerly owned a photography business, previously started a crafts class when she was the director of the South Hillsborough Library. Knowing how well it went over, she wasted no time in initiating it when she arrived at the Zephyrhills Library.

There is plenty of camaraderie among the participants, as well as the assistant librarians and volunteers who led a helping hand. There also have been several generations of family members at the sessions, Brightwell noted.

Daybreak Rotarians bowl for a great cause

Zephyrhills Daybreak Rotarians converged on Pinchasers on Saturday afternoon for some good times and good deeds

It wasn't an ordinary Saturday at Pinchasers on Gall Boulevard in Zephyrhills. Sure, families and friends took the afternoon to beat the heat and fellowship but 14 different four-person teams were competing, not just for a trophy but to help make the world a better place.

"So many people come to bowl-a-thon, even the Dade City clubs come out," Daybreak Rotary of Zephyrhills president Rick Leanillo said. "We're here to show our presence to the community as well."

The 24th Annual Daybreak Rotary of Zephyrhills Bowl-A-Thon was held on Saturday. The event is one of two primary fundraising events of the year for Daybreak Rotary, the other being an October golf tournament. The 2018 bowl-a-thon generated a net of \$4,800 and the 2019 event looked to improve on that figure. There were several ways the Daybreak Rotarians raised funds through the event.

grandparent," she said.

Librarians Debbie Lopez and Victoria DeGeorge, along with volunteer Susan Clark, helped out with last week's project.

"This is alcohol ink on eggs," Clark said. "We did it one other time on another project." Added DeGeorge, "We try to pick a different theme each

month. Easter's here.'

The classes are free and are held in the meeting room, just off to the right as you enter the library. They have become so popular that an extra session was needed.

"We've got such a following we have to do two classes," said DeGeorge, alluding to morning and afternoon sessions that bring in about 20 people apiece.

You come in, you do your craft and you go home," Clark said.

Zephyrhills resident Lisa Cummins enjoys the crafts, but it is about much more than simply making something: "Just the relaxation and meeting new people."

'It's wonderful to see them come in every month," said Clark, who then looked over at Cummins and said, "You're ready for eggs.'

Quite a few people in the library's meeting room last week said they have been coming to the sessions for various periods of time. Zephyrhills resident Dianne Fisher, however, was a firsttimer.

"I recently joined the library and I joined the book club," said Fisher, adding that she enjoyed making the eggs.

Lynne Westervelt, a Zephyrhills resident who has taken the crafts class for about six months, said she liked making a heartshaped wreath during one session, "but this is good too."

Added Zephyrhills' Stacey Puckett, who has been coming to the sessions for three months, "It's fun. It's enjoyable." Not everyone is local. Molly Meadows travels to the local li-

brary from Lutz since a library in that area does not have crafts classes

"I like coming out here," she said.

Two people who drove further than that were Sandra Livengood and Helen Manchesi, who drove across the county from New Port Richey.

"It's a long drive with the traffic," Livengood said. "Is it worth it? Yes, it is."

It does not look like the crafts classes will end anytime soon, especially since they are such a big hit, as Brightwell noted. And, the librarians and volunteers pointed out that there always are plenty of ideas, which in turn draws people to Zephyrhills from near and far.

"With Lori having an art degree she understands what you can do," Clark said.

Upon Brightwell's arrival to the Zephyrhills library, she said, "We really didn't have much in the way of programs. We really wanted to make it active for all ages."



Create colorful Easter eggs

Beautifully colored Easter eggs are a beloved holiday tradition. In many cultures, eggs represent new life, fertility and rebirth. For Christians, the Easter egg is symbolic of the resurrection, or the eternal life, of Jesus Christ. The practice of coloring eggs and offering them as decorative items is embraced during both secular and religious Easter celebrations.

Many fond memories and traditions are tied to Easter egg coloring, and some people may have their preferential kits or practices to achieve beautiful eggs. But embracing some new tips and tricks can produce beautiful eggs and make this beloved tradition even more fun.

• Begin with firm, hard-boiled eggs. Bring a pot of water to a rolling boil. Then use a large spoon to gently lower the eggs into the water. Lower the heat to maintain a simmer and boil for just about 12 minutes. Transfer the eggs to a bowl with ice cold water and let them cool. Allow the eggs to cool completely be-

tay out news-paper or an old tablecloth to soak up any spills. Spills are inevitable, so don't let them spoil

the fun. In addition, empty egg cartons make ideal drying racks, so do not discard them.

• Make patterns or other designs on the eggs. Use a white crayon to draw on the egg directly. The dye will not stick to the wax. Or use string, rubber bands, tape, stickers, or other items to create your pattern. Dip the egg and then remove the materials afterward to reveal the design.

• Swirl a few drops of food coloring into shaving cream on a flat surface. Roll the eggs into the mixture, let dry, and then gently clean to remove the excess shaving cream. The result is a marbled effect.



• Recognize that you don't have to "dye" eggs at all. Use a sponge to dab on a design. Strips of tissue paper can be adhered to the egg with glue or shellac. Children may enjoy submerging the egg in glue and then coating it in glitter.



Fire up the smoker for Easter dinner this year

For much of the country, Easter Sunday typically falls during a time of year when the weather outside is still pretty chilly. But this year Easter falls on the third Sunday in April, increasing the chances that temperatures will be more spring-like and less reminiscent of winter.

Warmer temperatures on Easter Sunday means hosts tasked with cooking Easter dinner might be able to ex-

they might not have consid-ered it before, hosts might want to fire up their smokers to give their families something delicious and different to dine on this Easter Sunday. If the weather takes an unexpected turn for the worse, electric smokers can typically be used indoors, but check the manufacturer's instructions to confirm that.

Big meals are part and parcel for Easter Sunday, this recipe for "Pork Loin Roast with Hot Pepper Jelly Glaze" from Karen Putman and Judith Fertig's "Championship BBQ Secrets for Real Smoked Food" (Robert Rose) is a great way to take advantage of warmer Easter weather while still ensuring everyone has a full belly by the end of the meal.

Pork Loin Roast with Hot **Pepper Jelly Glaze**

Serves 4 to 6

1 boneless pork loin roast (about 2 lbs.) 4 cups apple juice 1/2 cup Brown Sugar Rib Rub (see below) 1 cup hot pepper jelly Additional apple juice for spraying

1. Rinse pork under cold running water and pat dry. Place in a large sealable plastic bag and pour in apple juice. Seal bag and refrigerate for at least 8 hours and up to 12 hours.

2. Remove pork from marinade and pat dry. Discard marinade. Sprinkle dry rub

over the surface of the meat, coating evenly. Set aside.

3. Prepare a fire in your smoker.

4. Meanwhile, in a small saucepan, melt hot pepper jelly over medium-low heat. Keep warm by the smoker.

5. Place pork directly on the smoker rack, add wood to the coals and close the lid. Smoke at 225 F to 250 F, spraying with apple juice every 30 minutes, for 2 hours. Brush with hot pepper jelly, close the lid and smoke, spraying with apple juice every 30 minutes, for 1 to 11/2 hours, or until a meat thermometer inserted in the thickest part of the pork registers 160 F for medium, or until desired doneness. Let rest for 15 minutes before slicing.

Brown Sugar Rib Rub

Makes about 31/2 cups

2 cups packed dark brown sugar or granulated maple sugar

- 1/2 cup fine kosher or sea salt
- 1/4 cup sweet Hungarian paprika
- 1/4 cup chili powder
- 1/4 cup ground lemon pepper
- 1/4 cup granulated garlic 1 tablespoon freshly ground

black pepper

1 teaspoon dried basil 1 teaspoon dried thyme

In a medium bowl, combine brown sugar, salt, paprika, chili powder, lemon pepper, garlic, black pepper, basil, and thyme.
