

Zephyrhills City Council recognizes city employees, explores talks with county about fire rescue

Monday's city council meeting recognized several city employees and moved ahead with its consent agenda while approving talks about the future of the fire department

Monday was the first meeting with new council president Ken Burgess and vice president Charlie Proctor seated. It was also the last regular meeting with outgoing city manager Steve Spina seated at the dais. Spina even stepped out of the group photo taken in front of the fountain at city hall on Monday and despite being on the hook for a few more workshops and special sessions, William Poe is ready to step into the role. Monday marked five years to the day since Spina returned to his position as city manager and he is ready to make the transition to Poe. Mayor Gene Whitfield started off Monday's meeting with some proclamations. The first was a recognition of Jessica Carter as she was presented with her certificate for becoming a certified municipal clerk. Every city council member had praise for Carter. They acknowledged her work taking calls and walk-ins as well as her work developing the city's website and particularly her work uploading Oakside Cemetery records to the website. Temple Terrace City Clerk and Central West District Director Cheryl Mooney made the presentation. Next up was the Irene Dobson Proclamation. Last meeting, the council directed that a naming committee be formed to decide of the name for the stretch of new sidewalk connecting the parking lot to the restrooms and pond at Zephyr Park be named after 65-year resident Irene Dobson. The committee approved the naming unanimously. Saturday marks Dobson's 95th birthday and the presentation of a commemorative plaque on the new sidewalk will be done at that time. Lastly, was the Public Works Proclamation. 2019 marked the 59th Annual Public Works Week and select department heads were recognized at that time.

Friday morning broke clear over the historic courthouse building in downtown Dade City. On that morning, May 10, law enforcement personnel from nearly every branch in the central Florida region converged on the courthouse steps to honor those comrades fallen in the line of duty. Pasco County Sheriff's Community Relations Director Kevin Doll served as master of ceremonies and the event, which began in 2005, commenced with a presentation of colors.

Next, officers presented a memorial wreath that contained likenesses of each of the fallen officers to be honored. During that time, the national anthem was performed by Melissa Marques.

The event commemorated eight law enforcement officers that fell between 1909 and 2019. Sworn officers wore black bands around their badges and flags at the courthouse were at half mast. Those fallen officers were: Pasco Deputy Sheldon S. Nicks, Prohibition Agent John Van Waters, Pasco Constable Arthur Fleece Crenshaw, Pasco Deputy William Henry O'Berry, Pasco Deputy John Herbert McCabe, FHP Trooper James Bradford Crooks, Pasco Deputy Charles Bo Harrison, Hernando Deputy John Charles Mecklenburg and Tarpon Springs Officer Charles Kondek.





The consent agenda items flew through quickly. Approval of the April 22 regular meeting minutes was a layup but a Hold Harmless Agreement with Duke Energy, a Bid Award and Construction Agreement regarding the Hercules Aquatic Center & Pool Demolition, and a contract renewal with Odyssey Manufacturing were all lumped together and passed unanimously, without discussion.

In Business Items, council members discussed dates to hold a special meeting for a city salary survey. After some brief deliberation, it was agreed on that May 20 at 6 p.m. would be the appointed time. Item 3.3 gave unanimous approval for formation of a committee that would engage in contract negotiations with incoming city manager Poe.

Item 3.4 brought up the notion of consolidating the city's fire department with Pasco County's. Nothing is set in stone yet but city officials will begin talks with Pasco County this month to explore the pros and cons. It's something council members expressed caution about but it's also something that appears to be moving forward.

In his memo, Spina pointed out that 90 percent of calls in the city, Pasco County Fire Rescue also assists on. Spina also pointed out rising costs of expanding the department and reducing call times. "These are very important issues because operation and financing are tied together," Spina said.

Councilman Lance Smith acknowledged the department being short-staffed but commended their hard work and interdepartmental cooperation.

Local 3884 Union president Travis Geiger was in attendance and spoke briefly about the move. It would be a landslide move to consolidate Zephyrhills Fire Rescue with Pasco County's but the council is moving ahead slowly and deliberately.

Councilman Alan Knight requested that fire rescue personnel be included in the discussions.

Spina is set to meet with county officials on May 23 and council members discussed and approved a May 28 workshop to discuss details of said meeting.

"We're going to talk to them, then come back to you," Spina said. "We will probably have multiple meeting about this."

In the announcements, Whitfield announced that Main Street Zephyrhills recently received a letter from the Department of State's National Accredited Main Street commending their efforts of public-private partnership.

Councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson noted that Main Street Zephyrhills ranked in the top three organizations in the state with regard to new businesses and jobs created.





relatives in attendance. Dade City Police Chief reflects on all of us. We fight as one." James Walters gave some remarks.

"There is not an adjective to describe those who put themselves in harm's way, words seem inadequate," Walters said. "(Today) we are paying a debt we owe to these families and the law enforcement still working with us. We pledge to never forget to acknowledge their sacrifice.'

Pasco Sheriff Chris Nocco took the podium next.

"This is a collective alliance of 700,000 to one million men and women who work in law enforcement across the country - we are all in this together," Nocco said. "We have an obligation to the spouses and children of those fallen officers to respond to anything they need. We are all part of a large family. Every action

Keynote speaker Ardian Zika, House District 37 Representative took the podium next. Zika shared an anecdotal story about a friend, Orange County Deputy Sheriff Jonathan Scott Pine, who was killed in the line of duty in 2014.


