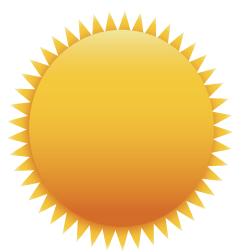

Class of 2021 overcame adversity unlike any other previous students to earn their high school diplomas

From one graduation to another, there was significant progress for outgoing students from Zephyrhills High School. During the height of the coronavirus pandemic last year, attendance for the Class of 2020 was severely limited with just two family members or friends per graduate.

It was noticeably different last Thursday. While graduates from the Class of 2021 still had to sit on the football field at Bulldog Stadium with just two guests per student, the stands were filled with plenty of supporters.

Led onto the field by the JROTC Color Guard, graduating seniors took their respective places in folding chairs. Once settled, they listened to a handful of speakers who were led by principal Christina Stanley. For her, both graduations she has presided over came in the Covid-19 era. Stanley replaced Angie Stone, who retired after the Class of 2019 graduated at the University of South Florida's Yuengling Center in 2019.

Stanley commended the graduates for persevering

A Look Back ...

JUNE 10, 1965

New series harkens back to days gone by. Let's look at the above date

This week's Look Back, the fifth in our series, takes us back to 1965 and graduation was a major theme. Although it was not quite as detailed as our recent special section highlighting high school graduates at Zephyrhills and Pasco in Dade City, a story noted just the Zephyrhills graduates.

Back then, the high school was located at what is now Stewart Middle School. The current site for Zephyrhills High did not open until 1975. Diplomas were presented to the Class of 1965 with its 81 graduates being the second most in school history.

Including valedictorian Linda Hayden and Barbara Thompson, some of the other top students were: Ronnie Cherry, best all-around boy; Kaye Henry, best all-around girl; Larry Chauncey, most athletic boy; Ronnie Carroll, activities award; Robert Winters, school spirit; and Lillian Johnson, citizenship award.

High school students were not the only ones earning recognition in the June 10 edition from 56 years ago. During assemblies at West Elementary and East Elementary, students were recognized for making honor rolls and perfect or near-perfect attendance. Additionally, youngsters were recognized for moving on from the ABC Kindergarten and Day Nursery.

In a sign of the times, there were stories galore on the front page of The Zephyrhills News. Count 11 in all, although some were brief announcements.

There was a piece on W. Byron Hill, an active civic leader who at 66 suffered a fatal heart attack. The lifelong Zephyrhills resident born in 1899 worked in the sawmill and cattle industries before overseeing the Hill Lumber Company. That was one of the city's major industries before a 1961 fire destroyed the plant.

Among the groups he belonged to were the Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce, Pasco County Fair Association and Pasco County Cattleman's Association. He also was a charter vice president of the Zephyrhills Democratic Club and Zephyr Elks Lodge 198 member.

In a story that combined heroism and tragedy, three Melbourne teenagers came to

Rain holds off for Pasco's Class of 2021

The ongoing challenges for Pasco's Class of 2021 continued last Friday night at W.F. Edwards Stadium in Dade City. Having overcome the adversity of dealing with the coronavirus pandemic for more than a year and having a co-graduation with the Cambridge program students sharing the experience, inclement weather factored into the equation.

The forecast called for thunderstorms to soak the east side of the county that night, but fortunately the rain held off except for a few minutes during the middle of the traditional ceremony. Rain, a deadly virus and a co-graduation did nothing to dampen the spirits of the 114th graduation in school history.

No school in the county has had more graduations, excluding the Cambridge program that is just in its seventh year at the Dade City-based school.

Plea for Pasco customers to conserve water during dry season

Pasco County Utilities suggests money-saving irrigation tips

An urgent reminder from Pasco County Utilities as many areas in Pasco continue to experience dry conditions with little to no rainfall: Please conserve water whenever possible and follow Pasco's watering guidelines, regardless of your watering source.

Pasco County's reclaimed water supply is critically low. How and when you water your lawn can put additional strain on the system, especially if your sprinkler system isn't working correctly. It's important to check your sprinkler system's settings, use the correct watering schedule and water only during your scheduled times.

Here are some effective irrigation tips that can also help you save money:

Irrigate only on your assigned watering day
Follow the watering schedule specific to your water source (Potable, reclaimed or well)

Watering is prohibited between 8 a.m.-6 p.m., regardless of water source

If water pressure seems low, run sprinklers between midnight-6 a.m. on your watering day

To avoid over watering, use suggested run times specific to your irrigation system

Check your system for broken or misdirected spray heads, which can waste water

"Water conservation is always important, and during periods of extremely dry conditions, it becomes even more critical that we all do our part to conserve water - especially outdoors," said Pasco County Utilities Customer Service Director Sandra Anderson. "We encourage everyone to consider skipping their watering day or week and consider hand-watering hot spots within the landscape where necessary."

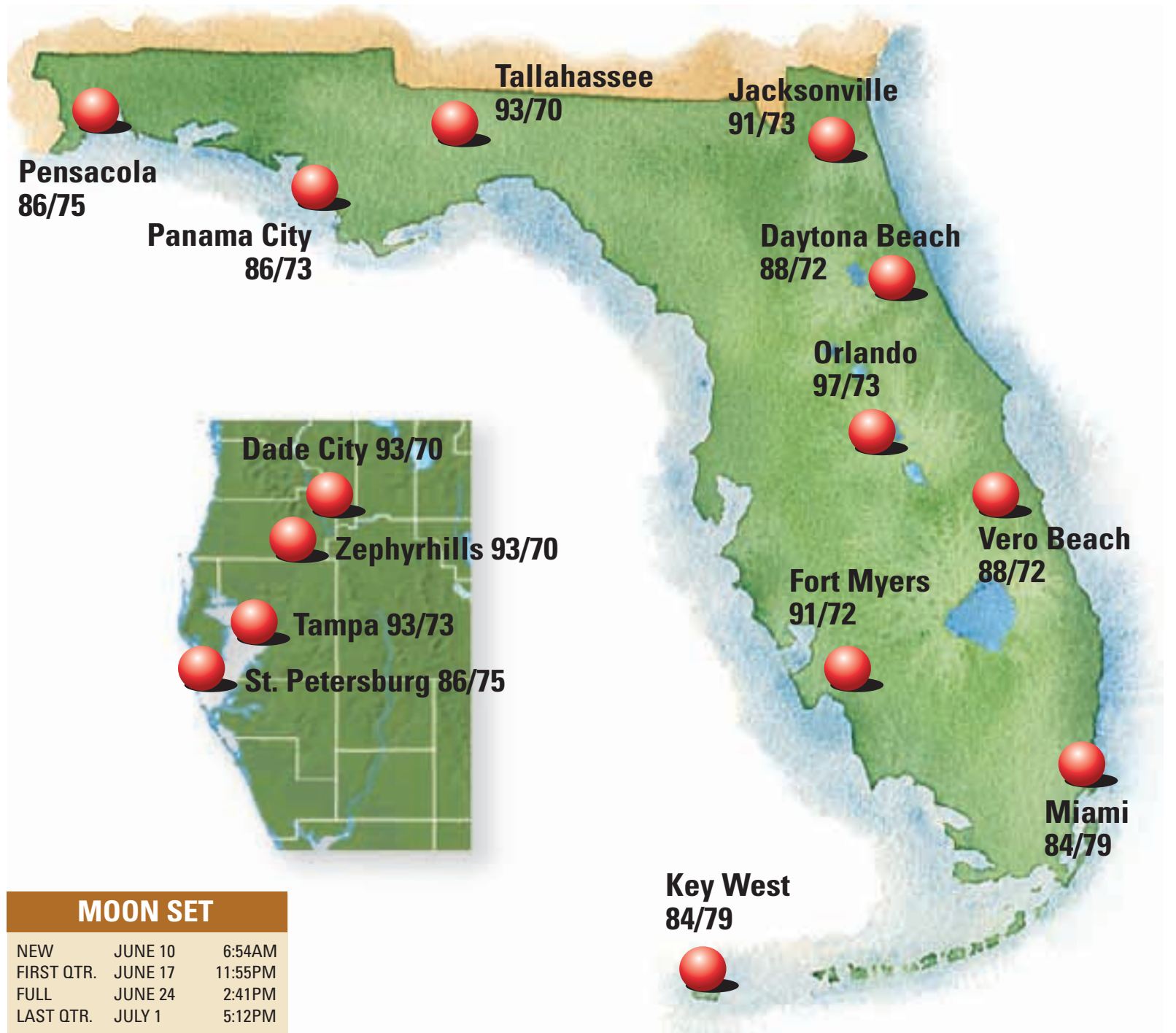

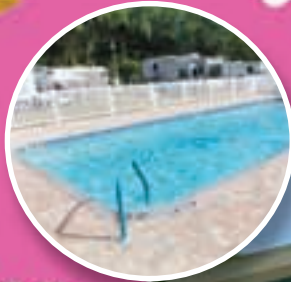

the rescue when a car carrying people from Orange Grove Villas in Zephyrhills overturned in a water-filled ditch. Four people were pulled from the vehicle and two lives were saved. Unfortunately, 5-year-old Terri Lynn Berhow and Henry David Turrell, 44 of Old Wire Road, perished.

In other news on the cover, a Dollar Day promotional event was a joint venture among Zephyrhills businessmen who cooperated to offer customer specials for various goods and services.

Zephyrhills High Principal Raymond B. Stewart announced plans for a summer recreational and academic program from June 21-July 30. The program, sponsored by the Pasco County Board of Education, was free to kids with the exception of 10 cents per session at the municipal swimming pool.

Locally, the chamber of commerce recommended the city construct tennis courts in time for use by children during the summer and some council members did not take kindly to that, noting that money already was earmarked for the project to be completed in the fall.

Another local, Karol Kelly, represented Florida in the televised Miss USA Beauty Pageant. She narrowly missed being selected among the top 15 to advance.

Traditional features in the long-time weekly newspapers were Tourist Club, Zephyrhills Garden Club, scouting and church news; anniversaries, weddings, births and deaths; and business news that included low bids for fire equipment.

Neukom's Drug Store and Elsie's 5&10 offered various items for \$1 during Dollar Days. Thriftway's specials featured a can of Campbell's tomato soup for 10 cents and 15 12-oz. cans of soft drinks for \$1. And at Zephyr Kleen Cars, a 1965 Plymouth Fury could be driven off the lot for \$2,995.

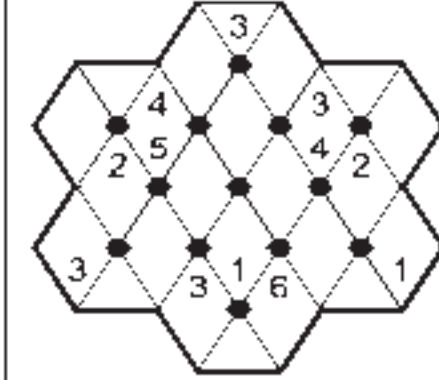

How to eat to improve your energy levels

A little extra energy during the day could benefit just about anyone. Late morning mental fatigue and the post-lunch yawns may seem unavoidable, but there are plenty of ways to improve energy levels throughout the day. One such means to getting an extra hop in your step involves utilizing food.

When eating every three to four hours, remember to prepare smaller portions than you would if you were eating three meals per day. The AAND points out that feeling comfortably full but not stuffed is a good indicator that you've eaten enough.

• Aim for balance. A balanced plate should include foods from multiple food groups. The AAND notes that even a small amount of fat can find its way onto your plate, which should include a combination of whole grains, lean protein, fiber-rich fruits and vegetables, and fat-free or low-fat dairy. If that's too much for a single sitting, ensure these food groups are represented on your plate at some point during the day.

• Avoid added sugars. Added sugars can adversely affect energy levels. In addition, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that consuming too many added sugars, which are found in sugar-sweetened beverages like soda and iced tea and sweet snacks like candy, increases a person's risk for obesity, type 2 diabetes and heart disease. The AAND notes that the energy provided by foods with added sugars is typically misleading, as it wears off quickly



and ultimately leads to an energy crash. If you're looking to eat and drink for energy, then choose water or low-fat milk instead of coffee and soda and replace sweet snacks with fruit.

• Choose the right snacks. The AAND recommends snacks have lean protein and fiber-rich carbohydrates. Low-fat Greek yogurt, apples, a

handful of unsalted nuts, and carrots are some examples of healthy snacks that will provide an energy boost between meals.

How people eat can help them overcome fatigue or exacerbate existing energy issues.

Small, impromptu gathering at Veteran's Memorial Park honors a local man who wears many hats

Danny Burgess is a husband, father, attorney, former mayor of Zephyrhills who has risen from the local ranks to become a state senator, strong supporter for veterans issues and long-time advocate for the Tampa Bay area, most notably east Pasco.

Now he has another title. Commissioned in 2012 as a First Lt. in the U.S. Army Reserves and promoted to Captain in 2013, Burgess is now a Major.

"Of every professional hat Danny wears — Senate, attorney, and Army — the one Danny is most proud of is Army," his wife Courtney said during an impromptu speech on Tuesday evening at Veteran's Memorial Park. "Somehow he finds the right balance between these responsibilities and being a father, husband and family man. The kids and I are so proud to stand by his side today."

First and foremost, Burgess thanked his wife "for putting this together, literally in 18 hours."

Looking up into the early evening sky, Burgess, family members, friends and other supporters watched a helicopter flyover. That came moments after he took an oath for his promotion from retired Marine Corps Major General James S. Hartsell.

"This is something they've been doing since George Washington's time," Hartsell said

of a ceremony to decorate Burgess with a new pin and cap symbolizing his new status.

Hartsell and Burgess echoed sentiments about never forgetting what it is like to take the oath. Hartsell recently took over one of Burgess' former roles as the Deputy Executive Director of the Florida Department of Veterans' Affairs. The respect between those men is mutual.

"I literally have had one of the greatest mentors and beacons," Burgess said.

Standing next to Hartsell and Burgess during the ceremony was Major Mike Wilson, a Pasco County resident since 2005. He recalled meeting Burgess when he entered the military as a First Lt. "Looking where to go and I said stand next to me."

Soon after, they became close friends with Burgess thanking Hartsell and Wilson for showing in the ropes, so to speak.

While several local officials and community leaders, among them being State Senate President Wilton Simpson from Trilby, came to the small gathering at the park, nobody traveled further than Bob Asztalzos. He is chairman of the Florida Veterans Foundation in Tallahassee. "Danny gives and gives," Asztalzos said. "I wanted to be here."

Added Courtney, "He wakes up every day and thinks, how can I better the community."

Burgess, who has been a judge advocate, is no longer a jag. Now he is in civil affairs. He actually became a Major on May 7.

As part of the ceremony, each of Burgess' children — Adeline, Daniel, III and Eleanor — helped rip off his former Captain pin and cap, tossing them aside in order to be replaced with symbols of the new ranking.

"Just rip it," he told Eleanor, bending down so each child could participate. Afterward, Burgess' children read homemade, hand-written cards he shared with the gathering.

Adjusting his new cap, Burgess said, "This is, without a doubt, the most special hat that I wear."

Before Burgess started, Hartsell requested that he keep his speech closer to five than 25 minutes, saying, "You're not a politician now."

Burgess jokingly responded, "Now I'm statutorily protected. When you hit Major they can't kick you out so easy."

Then, on a more serious note, Burgess thanks everyone who came: "It just means the world to me to share this with you."

"This is both the beginning and end of a chapter for us and the world awaits us," said Lillian Kurz, of the National Honor Society. "I cannot wait to see everyone grow."

In a symbolic gesture, graduating seniors sat in the visitor's side stands so people on the home side could see a "2021" formed by the students in different colored gowns and caps. The Pasco High Jazz Band, led band director Kyle Spence, entertained the crowd as the stadium filled up.

Once the pomp and circumstance marching song was piped into the speakers the students began taking their places on the field. Each student was allowed two guests with plenty of other family members and friends witnessing the historic event from the stands.

Among the honors graduates seated with family members in the front row were the top four members of the class — Pasco's valedictorian Thalia Soto and salutatorian Brian Schildt Jr., along with Cambridge's valedictorian Athena Kuriakose and salutatorian Allyson Jender.

All four plan to stay in the state when they continue their education. Kuriakose and Schildt Jr. landed scholarships to the University of Florida while Soto is headed to Tallahassee to attend Florida State, an arch-rival of the school in Gainesville. Jender will be closer to home at the University of South Florida.

The Navy JROTC Color Guard of Blake Harrell, Jonathan Ramirez, Xavier Sepulveda and Olivia Kral marched in and the crowd rose for the national anthem and pledge of allegiance.

Principal Kari Kadlub wish graduates well in their bright futures and offered some sage advice for whatever field they choose to go into: "No matter what, don't miss the journey. Your goal is the sum of the decisions you make along the way."

As has been the case with most graduating classes across the country over the past two years, there were speeches from members of the top of the class about strength, overcoming adversity and everyone sharing life-changing experiences resulting from the worldwide virus. There also was talk about moving forward with heads held high.

Brian Schildt Jr., Pasco's salutatorian, offered a unique perspective on a speech he labeled, "The best version of you." In it, he mentioned a recent study about the average life span reaching 78 years old. So with roughly 21 percent of a graduating senior's life already in the past he said, "This is a new chapter to create your own legacy."

To do just that successfully he listed four areas: a positive attitude, embrace opportunities, have a purpose and never give up.

"Take risks and live life without the fear of failure," Schildt Jr. said.

Atheena Kuriakose, Cambridge's valedictorian, noted that those attributes drove her to excel in the classroom. Not to mention overcoming adversity like all of the graduates.

"This year has been crazy and full of uncertainty," she said. "I can't believe I'm here right now."

One good place to start is the East Pasco YMCA. It's more of a hybrid option as the YMCA hosts both indoor and outdoor camps. Their first option is their Day Camp: Activity Central. This camp runs 9 a.m. to 4 p.m., Monday to Friday. Activity Central boasts "everything" fun camp has to offer. Activities include: swimming, STEM, arts and crafts, outdoor education, games, team building and more. Campers are grouped into ages 6 to 12. The camp will run you \$129 per week if you're a member, non-members pay \$204 per week. This camp runs all 10 weeks of the program from June 1 to Aug. 1.

The YMCA has a number of affordable programs for families to join. The Arts & Crafts Camp runs the third and seventh week of the summer program and lets children aged 6 to 10 let their imaginations run wild in an "immersive" experience. Campers will explore drawing, painting and pottery. The cost is \$159 per week for members and \$229 per week for non-members.

The swim camp is the option to be outside but in the pool. It hosts children 6 to 12 and runs the fourth and eighth week of the summer program. It's more than just swimming, too. Water sports and pool games add to the experience, while the camp still teaches traditional camp activities like team building and character development. Campers are required to pass a YMCA Swim Test. This requires the ability to swim the length of the pool and then tread water for one minute. The cost is \$159/week for members and \$229/week for non-members. Campers are asked to bring sunscreen, a swimsuit and towel.

The basketball camp runs during Week 2 for youths aged 9 to 12 and Week 6 for youths aged 6 to 8. The camp focuses on drills and scrimmages with an introduction to basic and advanced skills in addition to traditional camp activities.

While the Zephyrhills and really the whole Pasco County Cooperative don't have options for in-person summer camps, there is a litany of online and virtual classes that both adults and children can participate in.

Never fear, the Zephyrhills Municipal

Library has some options. It's dubbed the "Take & Make Crafts." When children come to the library to check out a book, they can take home a pre-packaged craft.

"All of the materials fit in a bag and the kids can walk out the door with it," Zephyrhills Library Director Lori Brightwell said. "Sometimes they'll need glue, sometimes they'll need nothing at all."

The crafts range from puppets to underwater scenes and are catered to different age groups.

If the performing arts is more your camper's speed, try Arts in Motion Pasco. They are putting on a theatrical/musical show as part of a camp that runs June 21 to 25 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. with the show going on that Friday, June 25, at 6 p.m. This camp is for the younger groups entering first through eighth grade.

Rising eighth-graders to college-aged campers will put a show together the week of June 28 to July 2 with their show on Friday, July 2 at 6 p.m. and on Saturday, July 3 at 2 p.m. Prospective performers will have to prepare an audition song where they'll be required to bring their own music. The audition for younger campers is June 14 from 6 to 9 p.m. Older performers will be asked to do cold readings on June 12 from 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. Both auditions are at Arts In Motion, 13921 7th St. in Dade City.

The camps cost \$150 for members and \$175 for non-members. The fee does include two snacks, crafts, a commemorative t-shirt and pizza party on the Friday of the show. For more information or to register online visit: <http://www.artsinmotionpasco.org/summer-camp.html>.

Now if you're getting too hot for all of this, make sure and hit up Zephyr Park near downtown Zephyrhills and cool off at their new splash pad. Parking is free and the park is open from 9 a.m. to sunset.

HOLLYWOOD -- Superstar stand-up comic Sebastian Maniscalco, who made his film debut in the Oscar-winning picture "The Green Book" (as Johnny Venere) and then played "Crazy Joe" Gallo opposite Robert De Niro, Al Pacino and Joe Pesci in Martin Scorsese's "The Irishman," will now STAR opposite De Niro in "About My Father." The script, written by Maniscalco and based on his relationship with his real father, starts shooting later this year.

Chris Rock, a huge fan of the "Saw" franchise, approached Lionsgate with his ideas on how to extend the franchise from "Jigsaw" ("Saw 8") to a ninth film, which opened May 14 to favorable reviews. Rock had a dramatic role in 2020 in 10 episodes of "Fargo" (as Loy Cannon), and he enjoyed it so much that he wrote the starring role (with touches of comedy) in "Spiral: From the Book of Saw" for himself.

With Rock on board, Lionsgate was able to sign Samuel L. Jackson and Max Minghella to join him. It started shooting July 2019 and wrapped that August. Originally scheduled for release in October 2020, it was rushed to release May 2020, then delayed due to the pandemic. A sequel, "Saw X," is already in the works, along with a possible TV series.

Sequels, sequels, sequels! "Knives Out 2" will again star Daniel Craig, as well as Edward Norton and Dave Bautista, when it begins shooting in Greece. Netflix has allotted \$400 million, aiming at a December 2022 release for "KO2," followed by "Knives Out 3," being shot back-to-back. And "Venom," which grossed \$855 million in 2018, has the sequel "Venom 2, Let There Be Carnage" already shooting with Tom Hardy, Michelle Williams and Reid Scott returning, adding Woody Harrelson and J.K. Simmons to the mix.

Two-time Academy Award-winning Hilary Swank (best supporting actress for "Boys Don't Cry" in 1999, and best actress for "Million Dollar Baby" in 2004) seemed to disappear during the pandemic, but she was in Australia in June 2019 making the sci-fi thriller "I Am Mother," with Rose Byrne; the horror/thriller "The Hunt," with Betty Gilpin, Amy Madigan and Emma Roberts (in New Orleans); as well as "Fatale," with Michael Ealy and Mike Colter (shot in L.A.). She also starred in the Netflix series "Away."

But she'll return in a blaze of glory playing racing pioneer Janet Guthrie, the first woman to compete in both the Indianapolis 500 and the Daytona 500, in "Speed Girl." If that doesn't get her career racing again, nothing will!

The Zephyrhills Museum of Military History brought D-Day to life over the weekend

Hitler's Weirmacht had occupied continental Europe for the better part of four years. Allied forces had pushed Axis forces out of North Africa and had begun the invasion of Italy but as that offensive bogged down on the narrow and easily defensible Italian Peninsula, Operation Overlord, the invasion of France loomed large. Hitler's Atlantic Wall was a formidable obstacle for the Allies. An intense and highly sophisticated game of cat and mouse, saw the Allies trying to fool the Axis powers as to where the landings would take place. The Allies wanted Hitler to think the invasion was coming at the Pas de Calais. They went so far as to stage a fictional army complete with inflatable tanks and planes.

It worked to some degree because the D-Day landings would be in Normandy and not the Pas de Calais. On the night of June 5, American paratroopers dropped in behind the Normandy beachhead in order to disrupt communications, stall reinforcements and occupy key bridgeheads. Allied warships opened up on the morning of June 6 and the invasion force soon followed.

"We were pinned down by Germany for so long, D-Day was our big day," Vice President of the Zephyrhills Museum of Military History Ted Johnson said. "It was important that we started moving forward and we had to fight for every inch."

The D-Day landings and ensuing breakout forced Germany to fight a war on two fronts, a war they could not win. German soldiers fought fanatically as the Allies closed in but the Allies eventually prevailed, freeing Europe and potentially the rest of the world from facism. Johnson is an avid living historian and was portraying a DJ for the Armed Forces Radio Service. The Armed Forces Radio Service broadcasted music and other forms of entertainment to troops in the field from stations in both Europe and the Pacific.

"They wanted to give guys entertainment," Johnson said. "The guys would listen in on what were called, morale radios and they would be either battery powered or just plug in."

The Zephyrhills Military Museum brought that moment to life last weekend. With several military vehicles of the era, planes from the time period and the museum itself which is a

former barracks for the 10th Fighter Squadron, who participated in the D-Day landings. Perhaps the most interesting thing was the living historians and their displays, depicting different parts of both civilian and military life. Joe Mazzuchelli of Brooksville, brought out a World War II rations display. It showed the different types of rations that were issued to troops in different branches.

"I did reenacting when I was younger but my interest was more in how the individual soldier lived, day to day," Mazzuchelli said. "People can relate to these things. Everybody knows what SPAM is, a Nestle chocolate bar is something you can buy in the store today."

Mazzuchelli's display showed the difference between K-rations and C-rations, the "C" standing for "can." Well, airborne troops didn't want to carry the heavy cans and elected to carry K-rations, which were packaged in boxes. An "M" unit contained meat, a "B" unit contained bread and the K-ration would later inspire MREs or Meals Ready to Eat.

Living historian Chris Heesch walked spectators through a number of weapons demonstrations, both American and German from the time period. Other historians had their displays set up for spectators to learn about the people that served in the great conflict. Tim Oliver, who is an active pilot with the 81st Fighter Squadron, put together a display depicting different air force units. Prior to November 1941, the air force was called the Army Air Corps. After November, 1941, it became known as the Army Air Force and in 1947 it became its own branch, the Air Force. Oliver had memorabilia and gear from the 10th Fighter Squadron, who trained in Zephyrhills, the 313th Fighter Squadron, who trained in Gainesville.

"These kinds of things are not being taught - what our troops did," Oliver said. "We try to convey the sacrifice, the suffering and hardships they went through."

Oliver's wife Pam, had a display depicting the WASPs or Womens Air Service Pilots. Women from this group ferried planes to different air bases, both state-side and in Europe. 1043

women eventually made it through the selection process. Anne Baumgartner would later become the first female test pilot and first woman to fly a jet.

Women played a major role in the Second World War and D-Day landings. Living historians Hannah Howell, Hannah Schultze and Hannah Hoffman, portrayed women of the 12th Army Group WAC Detachment. The unit was activated out of Fort Oglethorpe in Georgia and landed on Omaha Beach in Normandy in August of 1944.

"They were one of the few groups of the WAC that deployed to an operational theatre," Howell said. "They were noted as being the most mobile unit and living in the same conditions as the men," Schultze said.

Brent Howard, portraying a member of the 41st Armored Infantry, had his tent shelter and weapons stand. He was cleaning a Stenmark 5 machine gun. The armored infantry rode on tanks into combat. The 41st Armored Infantry was attached to the 2nd Armored Division. Howard's great grandfather on both his mother's and father's side, served in World War II.

"It's fun (doing living history), people ask about the rifles, kids put the helmet on and it falls down over their face," Howard said. "I'm a firm believer that if you don't remember the past, you're doomed to repeat it."

Portraying a mobile unit on the German side was Hunter Lehr. Lehr was depicting a German soldier of the 59th Fusiliers, a bicycle unit. The bicycle units could be towed behind trucks.

"It was basically a substitute for vehicles," Lehr said. "You would see a long rope with them all holding it."

Lehr also does U.S. Army, Army Air Corps and Navy impressions.

Zephyrhills Military Museum President Cliff Moffett was pleased at the turnout and in keeping a long-running tradition going at the museum. The museum annually does a D-Day and a Pearl Harbor remembrance day.

"It's progressed each year and this was our first two-day event in 10 years," Moffett said. "This year we have more history presentations, different lineups."
