Off-duty Tampa cop shot after hit-and-run

Suspect apprehended just hours after a May 29 shooting in Zephyrhills

The black male reportedly involved in a hitand-run and shooting of an off-duty Tampa police reserve officer was apprehended soon after both incidents in Zephyrhills. Christopher Jones was arrested on the afternoon of May 29, just a couple of hours after the alleged events took place.

The Tampa reserve officer, Robert Potts, reportedly witnessed a driver leave the scene of a hit-andrun and was shot in the shoulder with his own gun during a fight with the suspect. Potts followed the suspect for a few miles from where the auto accident happened near Gall Boulevard and 5th Avenue. The fight took place around Pretty Pond Road and 23rd Street.

"At about 10:30 (on the morning of May 29) there was a vehicle crash where one vehicle rearended a second vehicle," captain Tait Sanborn of the Pasco Sheriff's Office said at a news conference that afternoon. "The at-fault driver then fled." Pasco Sheriff's deputies apprehended Jones, 33, about 1 p.m. without any further resistance. Depu-ties reported that a verbal altercation occurred before a physical fight with the off-duty police officer. "Just the general condition of the individual when we finally made contact with him; hot, tired, sweaty, ready to be done," Sanborn said. "So there were no issues, there were no fights, there were no altercations." Of primary concern to law enforcement personnel was that no threat was posed to anyone in the community. Care of the officer also was a top priority. Sanborn made sure to make those points clear. Sanborn had high praise for Potts, who pursued the driver who fled even though he was not on duty. "The adage is that once you're sworn in you're always on duty," Sanborn said. "Certainly applaud this gentleman for not only his civic-mindedness but his attention to duty." Aside from being cited for driving on a suspended license Jones also was charged with narcotic possession after a search of the vehicle. He was found with 95.8 grams of marijuana, 2.5 grams of cocaine, 26.7 grams of methamphetamine and

First Church of the Nazarene hosts more than 300 high school seniors for brunch on final day of school

For the past four years, many 2019 Zephyrhills High graduates have sat down to eat in the school cafeteria. None of those lunches, however, united the outgoing seniors like last week's brunch on the final day of school as more than 300 students shared one last meal together.

"We all come together one final time, said Darrell McClendon, and honors graduate. "I enjoy coming out to this and getting with my friends." Although there was no brunch last year, sitting down to eat with Zephyrhills graduates has been a longstanding tradition. Pastor Nick Deford has been at the church, located a block south of the high school, for the past five years and fondly recalls previous brunches for the departing students.

"It's great being right next to the high school, just to be there for them," said Deford, who later was rewarded with a gift bag that included a commemorative plaque for the church group's effort to decorate and set up tables and chairs in the dual-purpose auditorium/gym.

Organizer Kim Shipley, mother of class president Madison Shipley, said she was "really shocked at the turnout," which nearly amounted to the entire senior class. "We weren't expecting the whole class. We had one of the highest turnouts in quite a while, so we were pleased. I had a lot of fun doing this."

The Elks Club's Feed the Kids Program runs from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Monday through Friday starting this week and running all the way through the first week in August.





The program extends beyond just serving hot meals. Families can pickup a bag of nonperishable groceries, kids can choose a toy from a treasure chest, there is even a small library of books to check out or bring home. Some days there is also a snow cone machine.

The program emerged five years ago as Moyer was talking with fellow community service volunteers Wade and Dianna Thomas, founders of Thomas Promise. The groups already teamed up with their backpack program that served as a community pantry for students to pickup groceries while they were in school. The Elks and Moyer picked up the program over the summer. The need was identified, the resources pooled and the program launched. Now, five years later, the program is the picture of a community at work.

The Elks buy most of their food, just like Thomas Promise does, but the funds for their program come from a grant from the Elks National Foundation, called an Impact Grant. The meals are prepared right there in the lodge's kitchen and the lodge puts together a menu that rotates every two weeks. On Monday, the program's first day, they served personal pizzas. The following day was a baked chicken casserole.

"We make sure they also get fruit, veggies, milk," Moyer said. "Last year, we noticed some kids not drinking the milk and we wondered

why. As it turns out, some of the kids couldn't afford milk at home so they just weren't drinking it."

Last year the Elks served 4,700 meals over the summer. They serve milk. They also don't do it alone. Members of the Zephyrhills police department often stop by to interact with the kids and even read with them.

"A lot of times these kids see police not in good moments but now they get to see them in a positive light, reading books with them, interacting with them," Moyer said. "We've had Captain Roberts and Chief Brewer here in the past."

Additionally, members of the Zephyrhills Fire Department stop by, oftentimes giving tours and demonstrations with the fire engines or ladder trucks. Those moments are nostalgic for Moyer as he served as a volunteer firefighter in Virginia for 35 years. The lodge brings in face-painters periodically, too and at the end of the summer, there's a big party. Last year's had a Hawaiian Luau theme to it.

"We all had a ball, even the police and firefighters were dancing," Moyer said. The lodge partners with Publix, Thomas

The lodge partners with Publix, Thomas Promise, Meals on Wheels and even the oneman show Robert Harper, affectionately known as, "Cowboy" who operates Harpervalleyson Food Pantry. Harper had a flatbed trailer with pallets full of bananas, flavored mineral water, 50-pound bags of potatoes and crates of corn. Harper distributes food to 600 families in

the Wesley Chapel area and teams up with the Elks Lodge to send families home with something to eat.

Harper's operation grew significantly after Hurricane Irma. He worked with the Red Cross and FEMA making sure emergency supplies got to where they were needed. Harper fills in the gaps, working as a freelance carpenter/handyman and hires out for rodeo work as well. However, his true calling is feeding the needy and it shows.

"I grew up in a poor family and things like this were not around," Harper said. "To see the look on peoples' faces when you give them a crate of food, what more could you ask for?"


