Monday's first day of school in east Pasco County went off without a hitch

Summer vacations are over and students in east and central Pasco, who are included in the county's 74,198 schoolchildren at 96 schools, are back. The 2019-20 academic year for Pasco County, along with neighboring Hernando and Hillsborough, began Monday while Pinellas kids headed back on Wednes-

# **Zephyrhills Eagles Riders host Purple Heart Poker Run**

Rain could not dampen the giving spirit of more than 70 riders who showed their support

Bikers are renowned for their generosity and penchant for uniting in charitable fundraisers. On Saturday, more than 70 local and statewide motorcycle riders came together in Zephyrhills to lend a

helping hand to a veteran's organization.

The Zephyrhills Eagles, chapter 3752 off New River Road, was the start-and-finish line for the East Pasco Chapter of the Military Order of the Purple Heart Poker Run. There were five stops along the way, including an after-party at the local Eagles club, which followed a heartfelt stop at the Purple Heart Memorial Monument in Zephyr Park.

That site will soon include three flagpoles with LED lighting. Flags that will wave on those poles include that of the United States, POW/MIA and Purple Heart.

'It was inspiring to be a part of an event that's dedicated to helping the Military Order of the Purple Heart," said Guy Patterson, commander of the East Pasco chapter who led the ride in its early stag-

Aside from Zephyr Park and the after-party, other stops for the bikers included Ralph's San Ann Liquor and Lounge, lunch at Beef O'Brady's in Ridge Manor and the Zephyr AMVETS. The Zephyrhills Eagle Riders led the run.

The East Pasco chapter of the Military Order of the Purple Heart has had a monument in the park since 2015. The shiny, large headstone pays homage to U.S. military veterans who were wounded in combat. The new flags will continue an effort to honor veterans.

Awaiting the arrival of the riders at the monument were two Purple Heart recipients, eager to thank them for their generosity.

'It means a lot to us, because we've been waiting a while to get them up there," said Earl Angel, a World War II veteran and junior vice commander of the east Pasco chapter. "I think it's a wonderful thing. I can't believe those guys would go out and

## Saint Leo University ready to welcome record 1,001 new students

Move-in Day for new Lions set for Aug. 15, classes begin Aug. 20

There will be many new faces at Saint Leo University as the new academic year kicks off next week. Make that: There will be lots and lots of new faces. The university is expecting 815 new freshmen and 186 transfer students—1,001—when classes begin

University officials believe this is the largest incoming group of students in the university's 130-year history. Last year's incoming class totaled 689, with 561 freshmen and 128 transfer students. Saint Leo also will see an increase in international students, from 86 last year to 181 this year.

Notable characteristics of the incoming fall 2019 class include: 50 percent are from Florida; 31 percent are from out of state; 19 percent are from international countries; 24 percent are first-generation students; SAT scores increased from 1070 to 1182; and unweighted average GPA is 3.26.

'The university was able to not only enroll a new student class that increased by 45 percent over last year, but we also were able to significantly improve the academic quality of the incoming class through changes to our admissions policy to utilize students' unweighted GPA and our new test-optional policy," said Dr. Senthil Kumar, vice president for University Campus Admissions and Center for Global Engagement. "This is a compliment to the talented high schools and community colleges with whom we collaborate.'

### Moving in

International students will begin arriving at Saint Leo on Aug. 13, with activities planned for Tuesday and Wednesday, Aug. 14. Athletes also begin arriving on Aug. 13, while incoming biology students are introduced to their challenging program during Bio Boot Camp, which began Aug. 9.

Faculty and staff will greet students and help families move them into their new home away from home. Move-in day for first-year students begins at 9 a.m., and students may move in until 1 p.m., Aug. 15, at University Campus, 33701 S.R. 52, St. Leo, Fla. 33574.

Parents and families join students for the first two days of orientation and have a number of events especially planned for

them. From 9 a.m. to 3 p.m., Aug. 15, the lobby of the Tapia College of Business building will serve as a welcome/hospitality suite for parents and families, where they can cool down and get a refreshment.

Welcome to the Pride is set for 3-4 p.m., Aug. 15, in the Marion Bowman Activities Center gymnasium. "This will be a time to get everyone excited, pumped, and looking forward to the adventure that is to come," said Dawn McElveen, director of orientation and par-

ent/family programs.
A "family dinner" will follow from 5-7 p.m. in the Bowl area, next to the student community center, overlooking Lake Jovita. Students and families will enjoy a traditional Cuban meal and yard games, while having the opportunity to make new friends.

### All about the academics

Most of the New Student Orientation activities on Aug. 16, will center on academics. From 10 to 11:30 a.m., new students will explore their majors and learn about the three colleges. The three deans will address the students, and they will learn tips for being successful in their studies.

Classes will begin on Aug. 20. The most popular major for the incoming students is biology-biomedical and health sciences. 



councilman Lance Smith, passing unanimously. Only one business item was on the agenda for public hearing. Item 2.1 was a second reading of Ordinance No. 1384-19 - "an ordinance amending City of Zephyrhills Ordinance No. 1309-16 to modify the definition of the community redevelopment agency district, to modify the boundaries of the community redevelopment agency district, eliminating the automatic exemptions of transportation impact fees within the boundaries of the community redevelopment agency district, giving the community redevelopment agency commission the authority to waive or reduce transportation impact fees for new development within the boundaries of the community redevelopment district; providing for severability, repealer, codification and an effective date.'

It gives a bit more autonomy to the CRA with regard to setting or waiving transportation impact fees within its boundaries. No public comment was made and after a councilman Charlie Proctor motion and councilman Alan

In the Planning Director's Report, assistant planner Rodney Corriveau presented an interesting re-use project that proposes to convert an old place of worship into four 750 square foot apartments. The building in question is located on 11th Street near Stewart Middle School and Corriveau was requesting a zoning change from R-2 to a Planned Development (PD/PUD). Corriveau noted that the building had existing ingress and egress access points both on the first and second floors, making it conducive to splitting into four apartments. He also demonstrated that each unit would be provided with at least one parking space. While no action was taken on Monday, council members appeared to support the zoning change as it applied only to the spe-

Next, planning director Todd Vande Berg took the podium to discuss the final phases of Abbott Park. He outlined some adjustments made by staff, specifically with regard to phases 1A, 2A, 2B and 4B and asked for the council's approval. An initial motion made by councilman Knight and seconded by Wilkeson, was passed unanimously.

The City Manager's Report occupied much of the council session as it first introduced the 2019-20 Fiscal Year budget as well and a list of state appropriations requests. The 2019-20 budget set the millage rate at 6.35 mils and introduced a roughly \$67-million budget. There the budget. Wilkeson pointed out the lower cost of code enforcement mowing in the new budget. City manager William Poe noted that was

due to a number of vacant properties being purchased and now maintained by the owners/ Proctor noted the 3.5 percent increase in city employee salaries and wondered if it was suffi-

cient to keep pace with cost of living increases. It was brought up that a salary study will be released later in the week and would speak more One of the bigger items discussed was the

new fire engine. The new engine has a \$467,000 price tag and the city is still in the process of determining if they are going to contract with Pasco County for fire services. It was agreed on that the cost is something the city will have to pay as they made the prior commitment but that it will be a key negotiating item in further

No action was taken on approving the budget but the Aug. 26 regular meeting will be followed by a workshop around the 2019-20 FY budget.

Item 4.2 in the City Manager's Report outlined some of the major projects the city hopes to obtain state funding for. Three items topped the list, the project converting septic tanks to sewer lines, the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis Facility and the airport runway extension. Some of the details of each of the three projects were discussed by council members and staff.

More discussion ensued when the notion of including a road project dealing with the intersections of Pretty Pond Road and US Highway 301 as well as the intersection of 301 and Medical Arts Court. The council hopes to cover the roughly \$2.1-million project with a combination of funds from state appropriations, the FDOT, the Pasco County MPO and/or a federal Community Development Block Grant (CDBG).

Timing was the issue at hand. Committee meetings for the state legislature begin in September an the federal CDBG application can take up to 12 months. Two issues were having one application disqualify the other and that if the process took too long some of the applicants for parcels in the area like Aldi and Chik-Fil-A might find alternative locations. Eventually, it was decided unanimously to go ahead and include the road improvements along with the

other three aforementioned projects. In council comments, most council members praised staff for compiling a tentative draft on the 2019-20 FY Budget.

when she goes off to college with plans to someday run her own business.

"This helps a lot," said Thomas, who plans to attend Florida Gulf Coast University in Fort Myers.

We're about people helping people," Daff said.




