Teachers, administrators and school personnel prepare for returning students and newcomers alike

You might say that local teachers, administrators and school personnel are in the home stretch as they prepare for incoming and returning students. In the final week, all that was left was a bit of fine-tuning as the summer planning stage nears an end and the start

of the school year is just around the corner. The countdown is on with the first day of school being Aug. 12. According to the Pasco School Board, the number, there will be 75,600-plus students attending 96 public schools at the elementary, middle and high school levels. There also are more than 9,900 school employees for the 2019-20 academic year.

"I'm looking forward to this school year and want to make sure all of our students feel welcome," said Kurt Browning, Pasco County's superintendent. "Our teachers, administrators and staff are prepared to meet students' needs — academically, socially and emotionally. We made good progress last year and I know we'll improve on that this year.'

Matt McDermott, Wesley Chapel High's principal who formerly was an assistant principal, teacher and coach at Zephyrhills High, spoke on the importance of first impressions.

"We want to make sure our teachers are prepared to get our kids excited," he said. "You give (students) all the resources and tools they need to be successful in the classroom.'

At Pasco Middle, principal Danielle Johnson, a former teacher and standout soccer player at Zephyrhills High, spent last week welcoming sixth-graders

Explore Your World - Wekiwa Springs State Park

In this new segment of our summer Explore Your World series, The Zephyrhills News introduces readers to the host of natural springs in the region where you can beat the heat

Wekiwa Springs State Park has a rich and colorful history not too dissimilar to Rainbow Springs. Although, Wekiwa was never designed to be an amusement park, it's riches have been known to Floridians for decades. Known as Clay Springs prior to 1906, the area where 42-million gallons of crystal clear water flow from what's now called the Wekiwa Springs into the Wekiwa Springs Run had it's roots first in industry, then in outdoor recreation and eventually into tourism.

Located just 16 miles north of downtown Orlando and roughly 90 miles northeast of Zephyrhills, Wekiwa Springs State Park contains Wekiwa Springs, a second-magnitude spring that joins a run from Rock Springs to form the headwater of the 17-mile Wekiva River, a tributary of the St. Johns River.


The names Wekiwa and Wekiva often get misused together. The names both come from the Creek language, Wekiwa - meaning "spring of water" and



into a new sixth-grade academy at that school in Dade City.

"It's to make them feel welcome and put them at ease," she said of the academy moniker. "They're learning the ropes."



Wekiva - meaning "flowing water." It's no wonder that many displaced Creeks from the Creek War that ended in 1814 assimilated with existing native tribes to become Seminoles, found this part of the state ripe for settlement. Decades later, Florida proved its worth as an agricultural asset with abundant natural resources during the Civil War. It's no wonder that shortly after the war, mining and logging operations descended upon the state. Mining helped usher in development at Rainbow Springs and logging helped drive development at Wekiwa Springs.

The Wilson Cypress Company, which logged hardwoods in addition to cypress and pine, sold the land where present-day Wekiwa Springs is located, in 1941. The Apopka Sportsman's Club took over the property and constructed a series of hunting cabins, some of which are still standing and even in use today. In 1969, the sportsman's club sold the property to the State of Florida and is became Wekiwa Springs State Park.

The park breaks up nicely into two main parts, land and water. Let's explore that latter first.

Water:

First let me tell you first-hand that there is no better way to beat the Florida summer heat than to fall into a pool of 72-degree water. It's also crystal clear, so if you have your mask and snorkel you're in for a much bigger treat. We travelled to Rainbow and Wekiwa Springs in back-to-back weeks and while the snorkeling is a little better at Rainbow Springs, the swimming area at Wekiwa is much bigger. What's more, if you're about five-footten, there are many spots where you can put your feet down, unlike Rainbow Springs where you'd better either be a really strong swimmer or bring a floatation device. The swimming is just fantastic. Even when there are dozens of other people in the water, it still feels like you have some space to swim around.

There is a cavern where the headwaters spring forth from right near the closest entry point into the spring. It'll only take a couple minutes to dive down and look at it all but it's a sight to see. Jot down the number for the park as its proximity to the Orlando area means that, especially on weekends, it can get crowded if not cutthroat.

Like Rainbow Springs, Wekiwa Springs shuts its gates when it reaches capacity and does not allow waiting outside the park. The nightmare scenario of showing up there with your friends and/or family, leaving to get a bite to eat and then coming back and being denied entry is very real. Again, it's usually only a problem on weekends or holidays but plan accordingly if you want to visit the park during those times

want to visit the park during those times.

The swimming area is blocked off by a wooden bridge that is part of a nice boardwalk that divides the Wekiwa Spring from the Wekiwa Springs Run and Wekiva River. That is a whole new area of aquatic exploration. There are other outfits that rent canoes and kayaks to traverse the Wekiwa Springs Run and Wekiva River but the park offers those options as well. Rentals are available from the concession where you can also pickup any last second items, masks, snorkels, even commemorative stickers and magnets.

A link to the different points where one can put their canoes or kayaks in the river and run is right here: http://www.wekivawildandscenicriversystem.com/. There are runs of a mile to 10 miles. It's important to remember your time factor based on the weight in your boat and whether you're traveling up river or down river.

If you're an angler you are also in luck. There are spots along the Wekiva River and also in the campground at Sand Lake. A fishing license may be required and regulations pertaining to size, number, method of capture and season apply.

Land

Akin to Rainbow Springs, Wekiwa Springs State Park has both a day use and an overnight camping element to it. At Wekiwa it's a bit more convenient as the day use area is just shy of two miles from the one of two different campsite loops. There is a well-maintained foot trail that the park has packed with feathersoft sand that can be easily traversed with bare feet.

There are both tent and RV sites and while you give away a little bit in privacy, you make it up in convenience. The full restrooms, complete with bathhouses are always lit and always

within a few dozen strides from whichever campsite you've selected. Each site has a water and electrical hookup and some even have sewer hookups for RVs. Even if your site does not, there's a dump station on the way out of the camping loops.

Firewood is available for an \$8 donation at the Ranger Station but be sure to catch them before they close up shop or you could be stuck foraging for firewood, which is technically prohibited.

Civilization is nearby. There is a Publix and other stores within a few minutes drive and overnight campers are given a gate code to come and go after hours.

There are also other campsites, a Youth Camp complete with a dining and rec hall as well as three primitive camping sites, located a short hike from the Youth Camp. There are also a few primitive campsites located among the miles of trails in the park. Camp Cozy and Big Fork are located just off the main hiking trail. There are even a few sites that can be accessed only by water. Otter Camp and Big Buck Camp are located on the Rock Springs Run and are primitive, meaning picnic table and fire ring but no running water or

electricity. Those sites can accommodate up to 10 people.

Camping at Wekiwa Springs also accommodates the equestrian community. At the top of the paved road running through the park, is the Big Fork Equestrian Camping Area near Sand Lake. These sites will accommodate up to 10 people and there are miles of trails to tame.

All kinds of wildlife can be spotted among the miles of trails in Wekiwa Springs State Park. We spotted a family of both turkeys and deer on our short hike to the spring but Florida black bear, white tailed deer, bobcat, gopher tortoise any many other species of wildlife can be spotted.

The longest trail is the Main Hiking Trail at 13.5 miles. Next is the Volksmarch Trail at 5.3 miles. The Equestrian Trail runs eight miles and the Bicycle Trail is 7.8 miles. The trails are very well marked but it's always a good idea to bring a map, compass and plenty of water. On the trails that are mixed-use, be on the lookout for horses or bicycles. Trail maps can be obtained at the Ranger

There are some picnic areas available with grills, playground, volleyball court and horseshoe pit near the spring area. Two pavilions are available for groups up to 100 people and have electricity and water and can be had for \$75 per day. There is also a modest Nature Center near the main spring that has a few live

animals but it is more informational than hands-on.

The options are limitless and you don't have to travel to the middle of nowhere to enjoy it. Get out there and explore your world.
