*Tribute paid to fallen heroes and* victims at Veteran's Walkway in Zephyr Park

Only once has a local tribute to fallen heroes and victims of the 9/11 terrorist attack in 2001 been cancelled. That came in 2017 when Hurricane Irma struck Florida. It nearly happened again, but Hurricane Dorian spared our part of Florida last week

when it skirted up the state's eastern coast.

That meant the tradition could go on with a somber ceremony taking place on Sept. 11 at precisely 11 a.m. at Veteran's Walkway in Zephyr Park. Rod Rehrig, past commandant of the Marine Corps League Detachment 1124, was not overly concerned about the recent hurricane affecting plans.

"I never even thought about it," he said. "I figured it would've blown over by now."

At this year's ceremony, as has been the case since the Marine Corps League's local detachment adopted him in 2003, Sgt. Major Michael S. Curtin was fondly remembered for his bravery and courage. As a member of the New York Police Department, the former Marine perished in a rescue-saving effort when the

## "Compression" dominates discussion at city council meeting

Decisions on how to address compression within the Zephyrhills Police Department continue to take the spotlight

What exactly is meant by "compression" anyway? Compression is when employee wages in a certain bracket become compressed, meaning their annual salary or hourly wage bears out little distinction between a new hire and a multi-year vet-eran. This appears to be an emerging issue in the Zephyrhills Police Department. As reported previously by *The Zephyrhills News* and in the prior city council meeting, K9 Officer Lorenzo Limoges spoke on behalf of ZPD officers for a resolution to the problem.

ed but the spotlight opened up during the Citizen Comments section as two signed up speakers affiliated with ZPD deferred their time to Limoges. The council chambers were crowded with ZPD members in plain clothes. At the podium, Limoges expressed frustration that the city had promised to do something to resolve the issue of compression within the department, the year prior, and that now it seemed as though the 2019/20 FY budget is being passed without addressing the problem.

"We promised the police department we would do something - we didn't, we promised we would come up with a step plan - we didn't," councilman Alan Knight said to Limoges. "But I want to assure you we are going to do everything we can. There isn't one of us on this council that doesn't want all

of you here." The comment came at what had been winding up to be a tense exchange between Limoges, city manager William Poe Jr., Knight and other council members. At one point, Limoges even said, "if you can't pay us, let us go" alluding to the road that the city fire department appears to be on as being assimilated by Pasco Fire Rescue and to the flow of experienced patrolmen with the police department transferring over to the Pasco County Sheriff's Office (PSO). The exchanges were impassioned to a point that ZPD Chief Derek Brewer gave a gentle

# Eagles plan to relocate to downtown Zephyrhills

Charitable group's former site at New River Road in Wesley Chapel closed Aug. 31

The Zephyrhills Eagles have long called a Wesley Chapel address home. Soon, they will be in downtown Zephyrhills.

A banner is up behind a fenced parking lot touting the Eagles Nest as the future home of the Fraternal Order of Eagles Aerie #3742. They are relocating from 4149 New River Rd. in Wesley Chapel, near the New River Branch Library, to an old bank building at the northeast corner of 5th Avenue and 7th Street. The address is 38412 5th Ave.

"I'm absolutely excited to death," Pat Hochstetler, conductor of the Zephyrhills Eagles Auxiliary, said of the planned relocation.

The Eagles actually were in Zephyrhills city limits when the local chapter was formed more than 50 years ago, but that property was since annexed into Wesley Chapel.







World Trade Center's twin towers crumbled one after the other in New York City.

one after the other in New York City.

That 2001 attack by terrorists in hijacked airplanes included planes crashing into the Pentagon and in a Pennsylvania field as well.

Since Curtin was selected by the detachment some of his family members have come to Zephyrhills from up north in New Jersey and Pennsylvania to share in the commemorative gestures.

"That was very rewarding; the fact that the family took time to come down here and share the dedication with us," Rehrig said. "It felt good for us because they were so proud of their hero. They came down and shared the moment with us."

As usual, two prominent people from Zephyrhills spoke eloquently at this year's dedication. Mayor Gene Whitfield and Danny Burgess, executive director of the Florida Department of Veteran's Affairs, were the guest and keynote speakers, respectively.

keynote speakers, respectively.

"By this time a little after 11 a.m. 18 years ago all the world knew what had happened. There had been an attack on the United States of America," Whitfield said. (Curtin) responded with bravery and courage, and without hesitation. He exemplified courage and heroism. It was noted that he saved many lives. Sgt. Curtin's sacrifice was immeasurable.

For Burgess, a former state representative who also serves in the Army Reserves, the event was especially moving. He recalled being a Zephyrhills High student and watching the twin towers burning on a school television.

Addressing today's younger generation

Burgess spoke of the importance of them realizing the magnitude of those terrorist attacks. He recalled being a sophomore at Zephyrhills High when the catastrophic events occurred, saying it is incumbent on other generations to give the next generation a historical perspective.

next generation a historical perspective.

"This is about very meaningful events," he said. "In the same way that Pearl Harbor impacted the greatest generation, 9/11 was the moment for my generation. That will be the moment in time that stays with me till the day I die."

Born in 2001, 2019 Zephyrhills High graduate Kaleb Lovings came back for Wednesday's memorial. He is a private first class in the U.S. Marine Corps.

"It feels unreal that I'm able to come back and support our community," he said.

reprimand to Limoges for talking over Knight.

The tension was quickly dispersed by a heartfelt apology from Limoges but Limoges' talking points remained. How indeed does the city council address compression within the police department? It's important to understand some of the nuance. The problem is not with a patrol officer's starting pay. In the new budget and at the recommendation of the CLA, the base salary for a patrol officer actually went up from \$43,261 annually to \$44,518. However, the maximum annual salary actually went down from \$66,623 to \$62,325. That will actually make compression worse. What the department lacks is a good step plan, a plan to provide bonuses at one or two or five-year increments. That would allow ZPD police to advance more quickly through the pay range and not plateau, compressing down to entry-level patrol officers.

"You've got guys that have been here 13 years and new hires come in and they're (wages) are just so close," Limoges said. "How do you get officers from the starting pay to the top? The Pasco County guys got nine percent raises this year."

It's important to point out that the city recently increased their

annual pay increase for all city employees from 3.5 percent to 4 percent but without a step plan, it would take 10 years for a ZPD Patrol Officer to advance to the top of the pay scale assuming a four-percent raise is given annually. Naturally, one might assume a patrol officer would ascend the ranks in 10 years but with a small department, that opportunity doesn't always exist. There are only eight positions above patrol officer in the department, four sergeants, two lieutenants, a captain and a chief. It's not often that those positions experience turnover.

Comparisons were made to other departments and indeed Pasco Sheriff's Office has a two-year step program but as some council members pointed out, other departments aren't always apples to apples comparisons.

Councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson pointed out some glaring differences between ZPD and PSO. For instance, a captain at ZPD supervises 24 officers while one at PSO supervises 200. Wilkeson also pointed out that PSO patrolmen have to be trained in a number of technologies that ZPD simply does not have.

The bottom line?

"No one wants to let anyone go, we all want to work it out,"

There is nearly \$600,000 left in the City's Contingency Fund for the 2019/20 FY Budget and Limoges stated that implementing a step plan could cost as little as \$161,000 but the city also has to be very careful about how contingency funds are spent, especially as early in the fiscal year as it is. The city will certainly have its work cut out trying to combat compression within the police department, while trying to be fair to city employees in other depart-

However, it was Knight that expressed the difference between

other city departments and ZPD. "They (ZPD) risk their lives," Knight said.

The meeting did kick off on a positive note as a couple of proclamations were made. The first was a presentation to the Daughters of the American Revolution in their commemoration of the 232nd anniversary of the ratification of the United States Constitution. The week of Sept. 17 through the 23 will be observed as Constitution Week.

The next proclamation recognized the East Pasco Stars Special Olympics softball team. The team won a national title and gold medal on Aug. 18 and were recognized for their accomplishment



Bill Burgess, a city building official, acknowledged that renovation and other permits have been pulled for the new project that will replace a building that has been vacant for about a dozen years.
