Family sells Winters **Mobile Home Park**

55-and-over community had been in the Winters' family for

five generations

For some members of the Winters family, now every time they drive past Winters Mobile Home Park it might be bittersweet and a bit melancholic. Five generations and nearly 70 years of family ownership will do that.

The park, which started as a tourist spot for travel

trailers and now has about 200 lots on nearly 30 acres, sold in August for \$7.5 million. According to the Pasco County Property Appraiser's Office it was sold to Keystone Winters LLC in Odessa.

"It hasn't really sunk in yet," said Helen Winters, the matriarch of the family. "I'm very happy. This probably should've been done before."

Perhaps, but for Bob Winters, the timing was right. "There were a lot of factors — age, the coronavirus situation. it's a brave new world," he said. "It was one of those necessary evils. I'm in my 70s, but I still like to work and do stuff."

"It was a sweet and sour meatball," said Dade City attorney Charlie Waller, who assisted Helen and the

City council handles business with budget, millage and tennis center

Monday's city council approved details regarding the SVB contract and the budget, among other things

The meeting started off on a light note. The Daughters of the American Revolution were issued a proclamation by Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield proclaiming the week of Sept. 17-23 as Constitution Week. It was noted during the presentation that Sept. 15 was the anniversary of the writing of the Star Spangled Banner by Francis Scott Key in Baltimore Harbor during the War of 1812.

The meeting moved quickly to six different consent agenda items. A motion was made by Councilman Alan Knight and seconded by Lance Smith to approve all six items. The motion passed 5-0.

Item 2.1 simply approved meeting minutes from Aug. 24.

Item 2.2 approved minutes from an Aug. 31 budget workshop.

Item 2.3 requested council approval to provide city water services outside of corporate limits with Principal Partners, LLC. Residents at 6048 Skipper Lane had their well collapse and looked to the city for help. The cost of the project is \$2,673.78 and the funds will be paid back to the city in seven monthly in-

Item 2.4 executed the FDOT funding agreement with a state appropriation of \$2,300,000 for the Pretty Pond/301 Project.

Item 2.5 set some schedules for the project that included a project close out date of Oct. 21, 2021, a construction completion date of June 30, 2021, as well as a few other details pertaining to the FDOT, state and local partnership on the project.

Item 2.6 awarded the Carriage House bid of \$185,853.55 with a \$30,975.59 contingency included to Kerns Family Construction.

Local Republicans meet again face-to-face

The East Pasco Republican Club had not met in person for six months before Tuesday at the Golden Corral

Not since last February has the East Pasco Republican Club collectively met at one location. That changed on Tuesday night at the Golden Corral in Zephyrhills.

The six-month hiatus of face-to-face meetings ended when more than two dozen people gathered at the restaurant in a back room, with a few others in another room and looking on through a glass window. The club had been meeting monthly online, due primarily to health guidelines and state mandates stemming from the coronavirus pandemic.

On the same day Vice President Joe Biden brought his presidential campaign to Tampa and Kissimmee, several club members spoke positively about being able to meet in person once again.

"For me, it's kind of a rewarding blessing," said Debbie Murray, the club's president since 2012. "People make a difference.'

Count Bob Hatfield, a staff member for congressman Gus Bilirakis who formerly taught history and coached golf at Zephyrhills High, among them. Hatfield touted the importance of the upcoming election, which includes local and state races as well as Donald Trump vying for a second term in a quest for Florida's 29 electoral votes.

"From the White House to the courthouse," Hatfield said, touting a party slogan.

The two guest speakers via Zoom were Brian Corley, Pasco County's elections supervisor, and county commissioner Jack Mariano.

Corley discussed mail-in and in-person voting, noting that there also will be ballots available outside of the voting sites. He also addressed the polarization of the people and their respective parties.

"I'm a little concerned about the lack of civility and how polarized we are as voters," he said.

Corley also warned of the dangers that outside influences could pose in the upcoming election, saying, "It's unanimous. The Russians did meddle with us (in the 2016 election)," he

said. "How? Through social media."
For his part, Corley would like to see the nation come together and brought up 9-11, recalling how members of Congress joined as one, regardless of party affiliation, to sing, "God Bless America."

'We needed that unity," said Corley, telling people not to hold grudges. "Just remember, we'll all get through this together. If there's anything worth waiting for, it's voting.'

Corley added that nothing will be official on election night, especially in light of the recent controversy about cutbacks with the United States Postal Service and things like the U.S. military overseas having 10 days after election day to get their ballots back.

Next up was Mariano, a county commissioner since 2004 who is bullish on the county as well as east Pasco.

"I hope you like the State Road 56 extension we put in last year," he said, alluding to a four-lane stretch from Meadow Pointe to U.S. 301 in Zephyrhills that parallels SR 54 in an effort to reduce east-west traffic.

Mariano credited city councilman Lance Smith for pressing hard on four lanes rather than two now and two later. He also lauded Danny Burgess, a former State Representative who is running for a State Senate seat, with streamlining the process.

Additionally, Mariano mentioned expansion at the Zephyrhills Municipal Airport, new developments in the area and an Overpass Business Park to be built near Interstate 75 and SR 54. He also cited new jobs that come along with those projects.

Also in attendance was Cliff McDuffie, the city's former mayor. He lambasted the national media for not having on when he was watching television the president's signing of a normalization agreement between Israel and two Arab countries, the United Arab Emirates and Bah-

Perhaps Mariano summed it up best when he said, "This, I think, is the most important election that this country ever had. And I think we've all got to get fired up for Danny Burgess, our future state senator."



In Business Items, the first reading of Ordinances 1404-20 and 1405-20 took place.

Item 3.1 affirmed the city millage rate staying at 6.35. This was neither an increase nor decrease from last year but is slightly more than the suggested rollback rate of 6.0925.

The motion was made by councilman Ken Burgess and seconded by councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson and passed 5-0.

Item 3.2 dealt with some minor changes to the FY 2020-21 Budget. It highlighted two primary changes, the first being an additional \$4,000 being added to the line item Youth Sports Grants with a new total of \$14,000. The second change was to increase the total budget by \$500,000. This comes from a bookkeeping error that entered \$1,800,000 as the amount of the state appropriation for the Pretty Pond/301 Project, when the amount is actually \$2,300,000. The city's share of the project remains at \$500,000. Item 3.2 also passed 5-0.

Item 3.3 added some zoning changes to property at the Sarah Vande Berg Tennis & Wellness Center, changing Residential Suburban to City Recreation and Open Space. There was no public comment on what Wilkeson called a "housekeeping item" and it passed 5-0.

In the City Manager's Report, Item 4.1 amended some of the terms of the 2017 SVB Tennis Center Management/Operations Agreement. There were actually a number of changes to the contract. They are: proposed contract repeals and replaces the previous agreement dated Oct. 9, 2017 and amended Nov. 13, 2017; the beginning date shall be Oct. 1, 2020; the expiration date is Sept. 30, 2040; Two subsequent, 10-year renewal options with six month notice; property address and Parcel ID number; the city is allowed to utilize the facility for special events at no cost (ex. MAP meeting, Economic Summit, or Christmas Party); material alterations must be approved by the city contractor must provide audited financial statements at the end of each fiscal year; alcohol may be sold on premises as long as gross sales do not exceed 49 percent of total food and beverage sales; contractor will provide restaurant equipment, benches, and padel courts; contractor is responsible for all landscaping and sod maintenance; the salaries of each equity owner shall be \$100,000 for the purposes of calculating the net income. Any salary above \$100,000 may be paid to each equity owner, but will be considered net income and the according percentage shall be paid to the city; alcohol sales, retail/merchandise sales, and advertisement sales will not be included in the revenues due to the city; all other sales, which currently include food sales, academy tuition, lessons, rentals, and memberships are included in the revenue calculations due to the city; we removed language regarding anticipated construction completion dates; all proposed partnerships with contractor and a third party must be approved by the city; all partnership agreements are bound by this agreement; Pascal Collard must retain at least 51 percent ownership of Tennis Pro Florida, LLC; and the measure passed 5-0.

In the Citizen Comments, Martin Harm addressed the council regarding his property at 4th Avenue and 10th Street. Harm noted that traffic being pushed off of 5th Avenue is flooding onto 4th and he requested a stop sign be placed at the intersection of 4th Avenue and 10th Street. Harm also brought up a number of code violations with regard to discarded furniture and mattresses.

Collard was in attendance and spoke briefly to give an update on SVB. He stated that the facility will open on Sept. 21 and have a grand opening on Oct. 17. He mentioned that there are now 36 employees, 12 children in the academy - five of whom are from Zephyrhills - three soccer students and one tennis student already enrolled. Collard also made a pretty big announcement, stating that a \$25,000 grand prize women's tennis tournament is being organized for the third week in Janu-

"People will come from all over the world to play in that tournament," Collard said. Collard also said that SVB is working on a men's tournament as well.

In the City Manager's Comments, William Poe Jr. noted recent ZPD training classes, design improvement plans for the local YMCA, and a breakdown of rate increases from TECO. City attorney Matthew Maggard announced the arrival of a new child, "any day" and that there was a 50-percent chance the baby could come during the SVB opening. Councilmembers were complementary of Collard's effort at keeping SVB on track and expressed excitement that the project is finally coming to fruition.

- On Oct. 4, 1861, President Abraham Lincoln observes a balloon demonstration near Washington, D.C. Both Confederate and Union armies experimented with using balloons to gather military intelligence, but they proved to be dangerous and impractical.
- On Oct. 3, 1917, the U.S. Congress passes the War Revenue Act, increasing income taxes to unprecedented levels in order to raise more money for World War I. While only 5% of the U.S. population was required to pay taxes, U.S. tax revenue increased from \$809 million in 1917 to \$3.6 billion the following year.
- On Sept. 28, 1941, the Boston Red Sox's Ted Williams plays a double-header against the Philadelphia Athletics and gets six hits in eight trips to the plate, boosting his batting average to .406.
- On Sept. 30, 1962, in Oxford, Mississippi, James Meredith, an African American, is escorted onto the University of Mississippi campus by U.S. Marshals, setting off a riot that left two men dead. The racial violence was quelled by more than 3,000 federal soldiers.

family with the sale to the new owners.

Winters Mobile Home Park, family-owned and operated for decades, lies adjacent to Zephyr Park and is just one of 102 mobile home parks in Zephyrhills. The 50-and-over adult community features a clubhouse, shuffleboard courts and a library, along with activities like bingo, dances and coffee hours.

City manager Billy Poe acknowledged the sale and is hopeful that Winters sticks around.

"We heard rumors, but I don't know the details of it," Poe said of the sale. "Bob Winters has been involved with the community for decades. Hopefully, his plans don't include leaving Zephyrhills and he stays around. He's been a big part of the community."

Winters, who has spent time on the city's police and fire departments, reassured Poe and others in the community that he and other family members are not going anywhere.

"None of us are leaving town," he said. "We're all staying right now." Community activism has been as much a part of Winter's life as managing the park since he was a student council president at Zephyrhills High in 1965. Like many people in the community, Cliff McDuffie, the city's former mayor, spoke highly of Winters and his involvement on the local scene.

"He's a very, very community-minded individual and he always wants to get involved," said McDuffie, who recalled Winters being part of a group of local people that used to meet for morning coffee at the old Neukom's Drug Store downtown and later at Barb's Restaurant. "He was very helpful in getting things done to benefit the city."

McDuffie recalled how Winters played an instrumental role in organizing an air show that formerly took place at Skydive City and helping to get a Celtic Festival in Zephyr Park off the ground. That latter event was relocated to Pioneer Florida Museum in Dade City, but did not last at that location ei-

McDuffie said there has been some discussion about bringing back the Celtic Festival, noting that Winters "is one of the guys that wants to get it go-

Bob Hartwig, the retired fire chief of Zephyrhills, spoke fondly of the family and their community involvement.

"I think it's a landmark in the city," he said of the park, adding, "I only hope the new owners can be as community-oriented like Bob and Gordon (Bob's late father) were.'

Waller noted that the new owners "plan to keep it just like it is. This is not the only park they own, so they know what it's like."

That makes Melonie Monson, executive director of the Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce, happy.

"We love it when we have our family-owned business that we know, but it's okay for families to move on," she said. "We look forward to building a new partnership with the new owners."
