Main Street Zephyrhills upholds tradition by hosting 15th Annual Music and Motorcycles

A longstanding tradition continued last Saturday with motorcycles of all colors, shapes and sizes on display on 5th Avenue. Food and other vendors hawked their wares on the downtown streets and a popular band provided musical entertainment at the Eiland Bandstand to the delight of thousands.

The fun-filled festivities, which typically draws people from numerous locales to the downtown corridor, were part of the 15th Annual Music and Motorcycles hosted by Main Street Zephyrhills. Best of all, admission and parking were free.

Estimating last year's attendance at more than 5,000, which included about 2,500 motorcyclists, Anna Stutzriem, coordinator of Main Street Zephyrhills, figured Saturday's crowd equaled of even exceeded that number. Read to Rover encourages children

Pet therapy dogs utilized in interactive library program for little boys and girls

It wasn't quite clear who had more fun during Wednesday morning's Read to Rover program at the Hugh Embry Library. Was it the children who read along or the owner of a pet therapy pooch? Perhaps it was Lou, the 9-year-old Chihuahua-Shih Tzu mix who seemed to relish the company of chil-

Either way, there were plenty of smiles — not to mention tale-wagging — at the library. That scenario has become quite routine in a program that once was on the monthly schedule and now takes place every other week at the library off 4th Street in Dade

City.

"They enjoy it and the humans enjoy it, that's how it should be," said Mary Eversmann, who interchanges Lou and Rosie, a 7-year-old Shih Tzu in the library program.

The pet therapy dogs foster good reading habits, according to Eversmann and Angelo Liranzo, regional branch manager of the Hugh Embry Library. Both said the dogs tend to be easier to read with than kids having to practice their reading skills

They like to pet the dogs, that's kind of the whole point," Liranzo said. "If they're embarrassed to read to an adult they're not judged in any way (by a dog), so it's a wonderful program for reluctant

"It's to get the kids to read to the dogs, to improve their skills because dogs don't judge" added Eversmann, a retiree who lives in close proximity to the library. "Some little kids don't read, they just tell the dogs a story. Some little girls even performed a

Zephyrhills resident Candy Derolf brought her grandchildren, 8-year-old Eli Breton and 9-yearold Annelise Breton, to the library on Wednesday so they could read to Lou. Eversmann propped the dog up on her lap with his paws on the table so the

pooch could look at the children while they read.
"I like it," Derolf said. "They get to interact and it gives them more incentive to read better when they're reading to someone else.

In this instance, that would be reading to a dog. Lindsey Draft of Dade City picked out a book for her 2-year-old son Bennett to share with Lou.

Standing-room only crowd enjoys bromeliad workshop

The room was crowded with plant experts and plant neophytes hoping to glean some valuable tips

Did you know that there are over 15,000 cultivars (strains) of bromeliads? Did you know that pineapples are bromeliads? What about Spanish Moss? Did you know that through selective cross-pollination that experts have bred out the teeth or serrated edges of the leaves of the pineapple plant?

All of this knowledge was revealed in just one hour of a workshop hosted by the New River Branch Library in Zephyrhills. It was an event sponsored by the Pasco County Libraries

and by the UF/IFAS Extension.

Florida Master Gardener Volunteer Corrine Goodman gave opening remarks and then introduced Hillsborough County Master Gardener Eileen Hart, who specializes in bromeliads. On the table in front of her, she had at least a dozen different varieties that she used as examples during the hour-long workshop. Bromeliads are native to both North and South America and are part of the family bromeliaceae with eight different sub families. Most are what are called epiphytes, meaning they grow by attaching to trees.

Hart then went through a number of different bromeliad species that she had on hand and that workshop attendees eventually took home with them. She spoke about the pros and cons of each of the species. For instance, the aechma species, has blooms that last a very long time - from

The subject will be "The Importance of Native Plants," presented by Craig Huegel. 

six to nine months but they also have thorns or little teeth along the edges of their foliage. Billbergias have spectacular blooming seasons that last from September until Christmas time. Hart said that she enjoys giving blooms from billbergias as Christmas presents. The con? The blooms themselves only last for one or two weeks. Cryptanthus bromeliads, commonly known as earth stars, are one of the few species that are not epiphytes.

Questions popped up throughout the workshop and Hart answered them promptly giving the workshop a feel more like and exchange than a lecture. It was warranted as many of the attendees were master gardeners themselves. Adah Weitzel, a 14-year Pasco County Master Gardener from Zephyrhills, provided some of the exchange and even learned some things on Tuesday afternoon.

"Workshops like this are how you keep abreast of everything that's going on," Weitzel said. "It's important to learn more and never stop learning."

stop learning."
Fellow Pasco County Master Gardener Jessica Keith was on hand as well.

"I'm new to bromeliads and I wanted to learn more," Keith said. "Whenever you bring a new plant home, you Google it but when you learn from a master gardener, what you get is fact-based. Our job as master gardeners is to extend the research by UF/IFAS. We are the link between the research and the general public."

The general public certainly got their fill of knowledge on Tuesday afternoon. David Johnson of Wesley Chapel had just bought his first bromeliad and decided to attend the workshop. "I didn't realize there were so many kinds

of bromeliads," Johnson said.

Hart continued to outline the pros and cons of different types of bromeliads. She taught the correct way to propagate them. Bromeliads are monocots or monocotyledons, meaning they produce only one seed leaf, as opposed to cotyledons, which produce two or more seed leaves. Hart actually dispelled some rumor about mosquitos laying eggs in bromeliads.

quitos laying eggs in bromeliads.

"There are people in south Florida that are ripping them out when the truth is that not only do the systems drain within two or three days but that most species of mosquito that lays eggs in bromeliads are the kind that don't bite," Hart said.

There were a few events that came up in conversation that related to bromeliads. The Bromeliad Society of Central Florida is hosting the 2019 Bromeliad Extravaganza this weekend, both Friday and Saturday at the SpringHill Suites by Marriott Orlando Theme Parks/Lake Buena Vista. Locally, there is the Gardening 365 Festival & Plant Sale on Oct. 5 from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. at San Antonio City Park.

The New River Library itself is hosting a live music event this coming Sunday at 3 p.m. where Blues musician Sarasota Slim will perform. The library will also be holding a major book sale as they prepare to close for renovation. The branch will close on Sept. 28 and be

closed until the summer of 2020. In that time, the library will get an enlarged meeting room with technology upgrades, a family restroom will be added, a cafe and vending area will be added as well as an outdoor classroom that will connect to the library's community garden, among other things.

The library's last event before closing will be a Veterans Healing Veterans craft program set for Sept. 27 at 10 a.m. It will continue at various locations on the fourth Friday of every month until the building renovations are complete. Most other library services will still be available during the remodel. Book holds and pickups can still be made at the adjacent Atonement Lutheran Church.
