Two Rivers community gets the green light



The intersection of U.S. 301 and State Road 56 surely will get busier as plans get under way for the Two Rivers community.

Pasco County Commission unanimously approves plans for large development in east and central Pasco

Two Rivers, a master-planned community encompassing large areas of east and central Pasco, has been given the green light. Last week in Dade City, the Pasco County Commission unanimously approved rezoning for the extensive development, giving the go-ahead to move from proposal and comprehensive plans to the

early stages of construction. "The motion passes 5-0," said Ron Oakley, the

commission's chairman.

The project, 12 years in the making, will be built along State Road 56 and extend from U.S. 301 to Morris Bridge Road, which clearly impacts Zephyrhills and the outlying areas to the south and east. Setting the stage for the development just south of the Pasco-Hillsborough line was the four-lane extension with additional turn lanes of SR 56 in 2019. Traffic signals are at Morris

Bridge Road and U.S. 301. It is earmarked for a 3,405-acre community that will include 6,400 residential units, schools (high, middle and elementary), 246 conservation acres with an extensive trail system and an 80-acre district park with spaces for multi-purpose fields, an aquatics center, playgrounds, a dog park, along with courts for tennis

Additionally, projected are numerous parcels for retail and industrial land usage. Additional plans call for a potential library and public safety site for the Pasco Sheriff's Office and Pasco Fire Rescue.

The acreage has primarily been zoned for agriculture but that needed to change for the developmental plans. Commissioners, following approval of county

Airport runway bid award, millage and budget final approvals at council

Monday's meeting saw the second reading of a litany of business items and moved ahead several municipal projects

The meeting began with a couple of proclamations, performed by Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield. The first was recognizing the first Friday in October as National Manufacturing Day. Representatives from Blue Triton, the current end of a list of corporate entities that have bottled water in Zephyrhills since

Council in general comments and the mayor himself spoke of Dan Robinson and his notion to bottle and sell water. Councilman Lance Smith and councilwoman Jodi Wilkeson both recollected when, as youths, they saw vacationers filling up jugs of water from a Zephyrhills water filling station off of U.S. Highway 301.

The next proclamation was one denoting General Aviation Appreciation Month (October). Airport Manager Nathan Coleman was on-hand to receive the certificate.

Consent Agenda Items, all seven, were bundled and passed together 4-0 with Council President Alan Knight absent from the dais. Ajax Paving Industries of Florida, LLC. Ajax was the lower of two bids received. Ajax Paving came in at \$3,119,752 and C.W. Roberts at \$3,130,000. Both bids were well under the Engineer's Estimate. This bid is for the rehabilitation of Taxiway A at the Zephyrhills Municipal

Approval of the Pasco County strategic plan for the city library. From April to August of 2021, the Pasco County Library team worked with consultant, Leon Donovan, to obtain community feedback through planning sessions, focus groups, and stakeholder meetings to cultivate the 2021-2024 Strategic Plan. In addition to the planning meetings and focus groups, two surveys were conducted. The findings of the surveys resulted in the Pasco County Library 2021-2024 Strategic Plan with a focus on three major areas: community, education and culture. Over the next three years, Pasco County Library team members will use this plan to develop programs and services that meet the needs of Pasco County residents

Update on SR 54 widening and signaling at U.S. 301

One project has just resumed, another is almost at the finish line

Over the summer, the widening of SR 54 between Curley Road and Eiland Boulevard was a constant obstacle. The intersection improvement and signaling change between Medical Arts Court and Pretty Pond Road on U.S. Highway 301, chewed up less road but nonetheless bogged down traffic. The SR 54 widening suffered a major setback when contractor D.A.B. Constructors, Inc. shuttered and left a number of projects in Pasco County

The bad news is that while bids for the project have gone out, as of Sept. 23, no new contracting bid had been awarded. The Surety, the bond holder, put an advertisement for bids out on Sept. 9 and expects to have some by the end of the month.

The good news is, work is continuing on the project



through subcontractors and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT). FDOT maintenance crews have repaired potholes throughout the project area and on connecting side streets. The Surety's subcontractor Southern Precision was on site in mid-September mowing, performing litter control and filling potholes. Emerald Striping, the subcontractor set to paint the traffic lines, is starting to install "school ahead" signs and flashing beacons. FDOT crews have been filling in washouts behind sidewalks. Driveways and side street milling was scheduled for Sept. 18 with paving shortly to follow.

Ås of Sept. 24, Emerald Striping installed the school entrance sign panels with the flashing beacons to be installed sometime in early November. Milling on driveways and side streets commenced on Sept. 18 and paving began on the 20th. The CVS, the Gym, McDonald's, Mowery Road, Brook Manor Drive, Hanbury Drive, New River Road, Loury Drive, Linda Drive, Ashton Oaks Boulevard, Riverside Crossing Loop, Fox Wood Boulevard, Ronnoch Boulevard, Meadow Pointe Boulevard, Smith Road and Wesley Chapel Loop were all completed by Sept. 22. Next up is for the FDOT to edge the curb line for overgrowth as the project

awaits bids. The project is moving. For anyone who has to commute through the area, it may seem like it's never going to end and indeed it has drawn out for a considerable length of time. It may be hard to see while driving but in taking the time to look at the project, the new road is just about down. There is significant concrete curbing already in place. The "road closed" obstruction at Eiland Boulevard and SR 54 is finally out of the way. It's still a long way off but it is moving.

On a lighter note, the Pretty Pond/301

Project is almost at the finish line. Project Manager and Zephyrhills Public Works Director Shane LeBlanc would not commit to a date, other than saying it was, "really close." It's plain to see just how close it is to the finish line. The new mast arm signals are up and flashing lights already. What LeBlanc refers to as a "burn in" alerts drivers to the new traffic signals. The signals at Medical Arts Court and Pretty Pond Road are currently blinking yellow for north-south traffic on U.S. 301. Those same signals are flashing red on the east-west side streets. The suspended light right smack in the middle of it all is still in use but not for long. The concrete median is already in place. Motorists already cannot go all the way across the intersection at Merchant's Square. It's strictly a right-in, right out from both shopping plazas. Once the two new signals are operational and the "suspended" signal will be removed, then drivers will be able to cross U.S. 301. It's close. It's very close.

"There's some sod work in the median, some striping and then a final lift of asphalt it's real close," LeBlanc said.

Pedestrians will also need to make note of the changes. Right now, the new crosswalk signals are wrapped in black plastic bags. Already there is no pedestrian crosswalk where it used to be, connecting the two plazas. There are crosswalk signals going in at the entrances of both plazas but they will only be to cross northsouth, basically the mouth of the shopping plazas. There are crosswalks and signals going in at Medical Arts Court and Pretty Pond Road that synchronize with the new mast arm traffic lights. Those will allow for east-west pedestrian travel between the two shopping plazas.

Just hang on. We're almost there.

and visitors. The plan is a requirement for receiving funding from the State Aid to Public Libraries Program, through the Florida Division of Library and Information Services.

The Zephyrhills Police Department's participation in the Street Narcotics Apprehensive Program (SNAP) with the Pasco County Sheriff's Office was approved. The purpose of this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) is to outline the combined mission, objectives, and responsibilities of the agencies participating in the Street Narcotics Apprehension Program (S.N.A.P.). This MOU will formalize policy, guidance, planning, and the objectives of participating agencies as it relates to the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program.

Task Order 2021-01 for American Infrastructure Development, Inc. (AED) was approved. The \$219,046.40 task order will allow American Infrastructure Development, Inc. (AID), and its Subconsultants, Quantum Electrical Engineering (Quantum) and Coastal Engineering Associates, Inc. (Coastal), to provide Professional Engineering Services to the City of Zephyrhills (City) for the design, permitting, and bidding of the aircraft parking apron and reconfiguration of the existing tie-downs at Zephyrhills Municipal Airport. The items include: constructing a new asphalt paved apron of approximately 146,000 square feet, reconfiguring and replacing the existing tie-down anchors, removing existing high mast light-

edge of the apron.

Approved was an FDEP (Florida Department of Environmental Protection) SRF (State Revolving Fund) Loan Agreement for the Reclaimed Water Line CR54/Wire to Otis Allen/Wire Rd. The city applied to the SWFWMD (Southwest Florida Waste Management District) Cost Funding Initiative and received approval for a 50 percent grant. The total estimated cost of the project is \$1,421,300 with the city's estimated portion being \$710,650 via SRF loan.

ing and installing two (2) high mast lighting poles along the south

Last two items approved were the Collective Bargaining Contract for Officers, Detectives and SRO's and the same for sergeants.

The business items were all second readings of ordinances read at the Sept. 13 meeting. All items passed 4-0 with no public comment. The first was an ordinance setting the city millage rate at 6.35. It was noted that while the rollback rate is 6.0279, the 6.35 rate remained unchanged since 2016.

An annexation of a 12.5-acre parcel of land west of Simons Road and north of Eiland Boulevard, near the SVB Tennis Center. Another annexation, was roughly 1.75-acre parcel of vacant land off Pretty Pond and Wire roads.

An amendment to the city's comprehensive plan that added specific language regarding property rights. New language is required by House Bill 59, which became law in 2021.

Another amendment to the city's comprehensive plan changing zoning designation for the parcel that was just annexed in above item. The change from county to city property follows the future land use from County RES-6 to City RU (Residential Urban) and zoning designation from County AR to City R4 (Multi-family

Next item was the same type of future land use and zoning change from county to city property. The 2.06-acre plot, adjacent west of the 1.74-acre property off Pretty Pond and Wire roads was another recent city acquisition and will most likely have townhomes built on it. The future land use changed from City RE to City RU and zoning from City ER to City R4.

Final item was another change to the future land use map and zoning change. It pertained to another annexed property near SVB. It changed the land use from RES-6 to City RU and the zoning from County AC to City PUD.

In the Citizen Comments Section, Jerry Dolinger, his wife Melinda and neighbor William Pena all expressed misgivings about rainwater drainage at their homes, located southeast of the intersection at Pretty Pond and Wire roads. The Terrace at Pretty Pond development, still in its nascent stages, will have as many as 50 townhomes when completed. Jerry Dolinger wanted some assurances that he would, 1 - get some kind of privacy fence near his property and 2 - have the city, county or SWFWMD remediate any issues with drainage and water retention on his property.

Ironically enough, in the City Manager's Comments, William Poe Jr. notified the public of a Stormwater Master Plan Workshop set for Nov. 1, 5-7 p.m. Poe also noted the Economic Summit Workshop, set for Oct. 13.

In closing remarks, councilman Lance Smith recognized the passing of long-time resident Sonny Maggard.



staff, giving the okay to rezone 3,405 acres is just the latest in a sequence of governmental approvals.

Clarke Hobby, a local attorney who spoke on behalf of the Eisenhower Property Group and Thomas family, noted that Bob Sierra had the site under contact as far back as 2008. There have been several other ownership groups along the way.

"We believe that this project has been done the right way," he said. "One of the biggest things you have to remember about Two Rivers is that it truly is a mixed-use project. It's been set up correctly from the get-go."

Hobby added that the site could potentially contain up to 2.6 million employment-generated usage.

"We're not short-changing it," he said. "We're going to create a log of jobs along the way in addition to making an overall great community."

Some county residents spoke at the commission meeting to voice their disapproval about growth and development, along with

school zones and traffic. Hobby, however, informed commissioners that "we'll make sure that there's adequate east-west connections."

While the project clearly is beyond city limits, city manager Billy Poe views it as a boost to the entire area, especially Zephyrhills.

"Higher end homes are being built along that 56 corridor," he said, adding that plans call for another subdivision near State Road 56 along the east side of U.S. 301. "As that growth comes this way we're hoping it will spread."

Two Rivers, Poe said, "is not in the city limits, but it's close enough that it will support all the businesses within the city. From 56 and 301 you can be downtown within five minutes. It's not inconceivable that when (future residents of those planned homes) come out of their subdivisions they can come into town and shop."

Poe also noted that rather than drive to Wesley Chapel for goods and services, people could come to Zephyrhills for restaurants, auto shops or places like the Zephyrhills Brewery. Another attraction to get people in Two Rivers coming to Zephyrhills would be the activities at the venue near the city's airport and events such as downtown parades.
