# Legislative Delegation meets with citizens, civic groups and non-profits

State representatives met with local groups to hear about funding requests as they prepare to head to Tallahassee

A standing-room-only chambers awaited members of the Pasco County Legislative Delegation at 9 a.m. on Sept. 1. 2022 is an early start to the legislative session. In fact, the deadline for filing bill claims has already passed on Aug. 1 of 2021. The regular legislative session begins Jan. 11, 2022. Legislative delegates Amber Mariano (House District 36), Ed Hooper (Senate District 16), Danny Burgess (Senate District 20), Wilton Simpson (Senate District 10) and Adrian Zika (House District 37) were all in attendance. It took just a few minutes for Burgess to be elected chair and Mariano vice chair and the meeting took off.

Many petitioners sought to retain current funding for their projects, some were requesting new funding and some were there just to make themselves known to the delegation. The first item of business, however, was approving a local bill expanding the dog park area at Anclote Key State Park. This bill was approved unanimously by the delegation.

Local government agencies were up first. Pasco Sheriff's Office Public Information Officer Chase Daniels requested a state appropriation of \$150,000 for an officer training program and device that can be taken out into the community.

Next was Colleen Beaudoin representing District 2 of the Pasco County School Board. She requested striking language out of statute 1001.6. Beaudoin stated that Florida Virtual School (FLVS) has a marked advantage over Pasco eSchool and that striking certain language from the statute would, "make us more competitive with FLVS."

Nikki Alvarez-Sowles, representing Pasco County Clerk of the Courts was next. She had no direct request but thanked the delegation for funding that provided,

# Patriot Day activities planned in east and central Pasco

Commemorative events coincide with 20th anniversary of 9/11 terrorist attacks that should never be forgotten

The Zephyrhills Museum of Military History has a 9/11 room with the uniform of a New York City Fire Department's emergency medical technician draped on a mannequin. Stephen Spelman, who wore that uniform, is a survivor of the World Trade Center terrorist attacks and will be a keynote speaker at a ceremony at Tampa Premium Outlets early on Saturday morning.

Several events, including a 9/11 remembrance with several jumps at Skydive City, planned to remember the 9/11 terrorist attacks in 2001 will take place that day throughout Zephyrhills and Wesley Chapel. They are more special perhaps than in some previous years since 2021 marks the 20th anniversary of a day of infamy in which nearly 3,000 lives were lost.

Patriot Day, proclaimed by President George W. Bush, commemorates the attacks from Al Qaeda on the Twin Towers of the World Trade Center, the Pentagon and a fatal airplane crash in a Pennsylvania field after dozens of brave souls fought back against hijackers.

Bob Hatfield, a representative from congressman Gus Bilirakis' office, is a longtime Zephyrhills resident and former teacher/coach at Zephyrhills High who also will speak at Tampa Premium Outlets.

"What's important is to remind everyone that no matter where we were virtually everybody was affected in some way with either family, friends or whatever," he said. "Remember 9/11 from 20 years ago and be very vigilant going forward."

going forward."

Cliff Moffett, the museum's president, echoed that sentiment: "We can never forget what happened on 9/11, we truly can't. We're vulnerable to attacks."

For Spelman, who will ring a bell to start a fun run/walk before Saturday morning's ceremony, forgetting is not an option. He retired in 2009, moved to Florida a year later and now deals with several health issues related to the fall of the towers.

# County prepares to clear the shelters

A national pet adoption campaign on Sept. 18 will include Pasco County Animal Services for a seventh straight year

Pasco County Animal Services will get a welcome boost when it takes part in an upcoming event being billed as clear the shelters. The local agency will be part of the Seventh Annual Pet Adoption Campaign that in six previous years has helped to find homes for 250,000 pets nationwide.

On Sept. 18, from noon to 6 p.m., adoption fees at 19640 Dogpatch Ln. in Land O' Lakes will be waived for dogs and cats. Pasco residents will be required to purchase a county license for each pet. Adoptions include spay or neuter surgery, vaccinations and microchipping.

A slogan on a sign on the wall of the shelter's main building reads:

The best things in life are rescued. Off to the sides of the waiting area and front counter are wings for canine companions and feline friends.

nine companions and feline friends.

"It's hugely rewarding to take in an animal that might have been homeless or living in the streets and now to know that they're loved," said Bridget Mire, the shelter's education and outreach coordinator. "our ultimate goal is to place it in a loving home. That's what we want for all animals to have."

Mire recently gave a tour of the kennel and said, "Most of our dogs come in as strays, so we scan every dog for a microchip. We'll do everything we can to contact the owner."

While there are various reasons for dogs and cats being brought to the shelter, the staff works diligently to find their owners with different tools at their disposal.

tools at their disposal.

"We stress the importance of microchipping," Mire said. "It makes it so much easier to reunite them with their homes."

While some animals are only around for a day or two, the average stay is just more than four days. The





"We all watched the second plane hit and we knew it was a terrorist attack," Spelman said of being on a street with several co-workers when a second plane crashed into the north

"We got across the street and searched vehicles after the collapse of the south tower," he continued. "We heard the explosions, then everything started shaking because (the north tower) was falling down.

Also on Saturday at 11 a.m., local military groups will have a ceremony at Veteran's Walkway in Zephyr Park. Rod Rehrig, commandant for the Marine Corps League Sgt. Maj. Michael S. Curtin Detachment 1124 of Zephyrhills, has helped organize many 9/11 ceremonies in the past and this year is no different.

'We don't want to lose sight of it," he said. "It's something you can't forget. On Pearl Harbor (Japanese attacks on a base in Hawaii), everybody remembered where they were. Then it was (the assassination of President) John F. Kennedy and still everybody remembered. Then it was 9/11.′

In the past, speakers at the 9/11 Memorial in Zephyr Park have included Zephyrhills Mayor Gene Whitfield and State Senator Danny Burgess. This year's speaker is former mayor Cliff McDuffie.

Lastly on Saturday afternoon, Music and Motorcycles, a Main Street Zephyrhills event that was cancelled last year due to the coronavirus pandemic, will undoubtedly take on a unified flair. Expected to be among the gatherers are plenty of military veterans, first responders and law enforcement representatives.

John Daff, president of the Fraternal Order of Eagles Aerie 3752, is a Navy veteran who figures this year's event will carry a special meaning since it coincides with Patriot Day for the first time.

"We don't want it to be forgotten," he said of the 9/11 attacks.







Mike Shumate, director for animal services, said what there is no one particular time of year for dogs being taken to the shelter. On the other hand, many kittens are taken in during the late spring and summer months.

Mire noted that the shelter has a 90 percent save rate, which in part is due to a strong relationship with partners such as the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals to go along with assorted rescue and foster programs.

"We know we couldn't do it by ourselves," said Spencer Conover, assistant director for animal services, alluding to the partnerships established over the years. "It really is a community effort and, to me, that's the nice part."

Animal services is about much more than adoption. Numerous county residents have opted to take their pets there for treatment, shots and vaccines. Among the reasons is a lower cost for services compared to private veterinarians.

"We're new to the area and there are so many varied opinions of vets, but animal services is a little more trustworthy and it's cost effective," said Stephanie Stamina, who along with Tim Schleich recently took their dogs — a shih tzu and Yorkshire terrier — in for checkups and treatment.

For the past three years, animal services and the shelter have been bolstered by an increase in county funds with this year's budget at \$4.9 million. While the shelter had just one full-time veteri-

narian on hand, now there are two, as well as two vet technicians. Still, Mire noted, "We're not a full-service veterinarian (clinic).'

"more stability" for court services that rely heavily on, "increasingly unstable" civil traffic citations.

Next up was Zephyrhills City Manager William Poe Jr. putting forth funding requests for the projects already arrived upon at city council meetings: the airport runway extension, the sewer and water main project and the improvements at Zephyr Park.

Next was Dade City Manager Leslie Porter. She listed four transportation projects as requests for appropriations, the extension of Morningside Drive among them. Porter touted the city's charm and revival of downtown but also highlighted the challenges of aging infra-

The last local government official was New Port Richey City Manager Debbie Manns requesting appropriations for increasing the city's cybersecurity.

Members of the local judiciary were next to petition the delegation. First up was State Attorney Bruce Bartlett. He did not have a specific request but he painted the picture of the 2nd District Courthouse being stretched to its limits. He spoke of the backlog of cases and workload issues with his staff and hoped the delegation could do something in the next legislative session to alleviate the pressure.

how Pasco County's drug court needed the delegation's support.

Next up were Public Defenders Sara Mollo and Lakeith Amir-Shariff. They touted a "Books Through Bars" program and hoped to receive legislative support in 2022.

Local college and university officials were up next. Only Dr. Timothy Beard of Pasco Hernando State College appeared in this section. Beard reminded the delegation of the 2022-23 legislative session requests already submitted and touted PHSC's \$25 million Student Sucess/Engagement Center.

Civic organizations and businesses were next to appeal to the delegation. Amanda Maggard, CÊÔ of Advent Hospital Zephyrhills painted a grim picture of what local hospitals are dealing with as a new strain of COVID-19, the Delta variant, is taxing the hospital's staff and facilities.

'We currently have three times the COVID patients now than in the previous surge," Maggard said. "We need help to prevent the spread and change the trajectory of this virus."

Maggard stated that staffing already faced steep challenges but that they are now at an, unsustainable level." She also asked the delegation to monitor price gouging of supplies and equipment.

Alan Wilkett and Laura Hamilton of Bridging Freedom were next. Bridging Freedom is a non-profit that provides services for

last three years.

Gail Armstrong of the PACE Center for Girls, an educational service provider was next. Armstrong stated that 113 girls were currently in the day program and that 98 percent complete the program and, "drastically improve their education." She mentioned specific students that had completed or at least began pursuit of their college education goals.

Evan Holler of the Alzheimer's Association of Florida spoke next. Holler pointed out that Alzheimer's is the sixth leading cause of death in the United States and that there are 580,000 Floridians diagnosed. Holler's request was for better training for staff, for the state Department of Health to provide more educational material and for the legislature to support programs like Brain Bust.

Karen Barfield of the Central Florida Behavioral Health Network (CFBHN) spoke. CFBHN is a substance abuse non-profit that serves 120,000 people and operates in 14 Florida counties. Barfield wanted to ensure that the \$3.5 million would be preserved in the next budget and that the delegation supported House Bill 945 (Children's Mental Health Bill).

Following that was Lorraine McBride with Step Up for Students. She asked the delegation to continue support of the state scholarship program that allows students to attend schools outside of their zoned public school. McBride brought in two families to share their experience with the program.

Joey Resnick of Premier Community Health Care, a non-profit providing quality, affordable and accessible health care services spoke of the 36,000 patients his organization cares for and how they, "don't turn anyone away." He also touted the 24,000-square-foot facility on the West side and 10,000-square-foot facility on the East side, in Zephyrhills, that are planned for construction.

Ray Watters from Film Florida, next appealed to the delegation. Watters lamented the loss of film productions in Florida to neighboring Georgia. He stated that Florida lost roughly 100 film projects to other states.

'Georgia had four billion dollars of direct spending by the film industry - we need to compete," Watters said.

Following Watters was Dr. Sandra Braham of the Gulf Coast Jewish Family & Community Services. She spoke of the 37,000 Floridians supported by her organization and the 1,200 noncustodial parents helped by programs in the organization. Braham also touted the \$7 million,

"returned to children" last year. She asked for the delegation to approve the \$250,000 from last year's appropriation.

Haley Busch of 1000 Friends of Florida was next at the podium. She touted some of the state's, "smart land use decisions" and asked for continued support of the 2020 Clean Waterways Act. She also asked that the legislature, "maintain momentum" in keeping the \$300 million in the next budget.

Next up was Don Peace representing the United School Employees of Pasco. Peace spoke of stagnating wages for veteran teachers and how some new hires can make as much as 15year teachers. He also spoke of how support employees like cafeteria workers and bus drivers are sorely neglected.

CEO Mark Wickham of the Youth and Family Alternatives, Inc. was next. Wickham spoke of the organization's 400 employees and 200 adoptions. He also cautioned about the 60 percent increase in people coming in for services. It has created a \$24 million budget deficit and, "strain on staff." Wickham also noted that wages at the organization have been stagnant

for the last eight years. Last of the group was Tammy Rabon-Noyce of CLASS Pasco, Inc.. Her 260-member non-profit works in Pasco County schools. Rabon-Noyce echoed some of the problems that Pease highlighted earlier, focusing on the bus driver shortage. She stated that some children had to wait for three runs before they could take the bus from school home.

A handful of Pasco County citizens finished out the meeting. Laurette Philipsen spoke of difficult situations and abuses in the county jail system. She requested that an oversight board be established to monitor the county jails.

Allen Johnson petitioned the delegation specifically for \$500 to accommodate petfriendly areas with signage on the west side of the island at Anclote Key. Some area residents spoke in favor of anti-tethering bills in the upcoming legislative session.

Melonie Monson of the Zephyrhills Chamber of Commerce thanked the delegation and touted the Chamber's support of small busi-

Wrapping up the meeting, Burgess thanked the petitioners and legislative staff on-hand.

These things were not put together easily or overnight," Burgess said.

And with that, Burgess closed the meeting and the delegates are off to Tallahassee with some significant priorities to manage.
