

But for too many of our unemployed neighbors or those with low wage jobs, life is a daily struggle to pay for housing, food and other basic family necessities. When the stress of illness is added to that burden, just surviving can feel like an ordeal. For many in that heartbreaking situation, Moore Free & Charitable Clinic has made

Since 2004, Moore Free & Charitable Clinic has been providing medical care to Moore County residents who are not fortunate enough to have jobs that offer affordable health insurance. ## Volunteer Spotlight: Dr. Michael Antil

**Compassion.** This trait motivates Dr. Michael Antil to serve Moore Free & Charitable Clinic as a volunteer physician. Since 2008, when the Clinic was seeing patients one night a week at the Health Department in Carthage, Dr. Antil has faithfully worked his evening shift.



An Ohio native, Dr. Antil came to Moore County in 2005 to practice Internal Medicine at Pinehurst Medical Clinic. He became aware of Moore Free Care Clinic's mission to serve low income, uninsured residents. He felt it was an opportunity to continue working with underserved populations, begun during

his residency in a public hospital in Atlanta. As he says, "When you look beyond social class, ethnicity and neighborhood, we all have the same needs and hopes. I give my MFCC patients the same care and respect I give my other patients. They all deserve my best."

The reason Dr. Antil was drawn to primary care was the opportunity to build long term relationships of trust with patients. Even with that foundation of trust, Dr. Antil knows that preaching about healthy lifestyle changes won't work with most patients. That is why he is a big believer in showing rather than saying.

An avid outdoorsman and skier, he models good health habits for his patients. More importantly, he models compassionate concern for others with every individual he encounters. "*Be the change you want to see*" is his guiding principle and the lesson he hopes to impart to his three children, Olivia, Caroline and David. "I have been privileged in my life and feel a duty to give back in the best way I know how." 

## MFCC Awarded Patient Centered Medical Home Certification



A positive aspect of 2020 was MOORE Free & Charitable Clinic's national certification as a patient centered medical home (PCMH). This is an advanced care delivery model that focuses on meeting the needs of our individual patients. A PCMH has special features, including (1) an ongoing relationship with a personal provider for continuous and comprehensive care; (2) a team approach to care; (3) whole-person focus; and (4) coordinated care across the entire health care system and the patient's community.

As a PCMH, MFCC establishes and maintains a comprehensive relationship with our patients. We coordinate a broad range of health services through strong partnership with our community

medical providers, providing follow up and continuing care. Our leadership monitors patient outcomes in key measures annually and our clinical staff follows best practices in delivery of chronic disease care. We know that health problems can be magnified by our patients' living situations. That is why we respectfully ask all patients about any needs such as housing, food security, transportation and other social determinants of health. We then refer patients to our many community partners, such as the Sandhills Coalition for Human Care, the Department of Social Services, area food banks and housing agencies.
