



Biographical Statement

Alma Roberts is a Baltimore-based, second generation abstract expressionist artist. At the age of 62, she literally picked up a paint brush and began producing what has been described as "fully formed, energetic abstract

compositions" that belied the fact that she was, at the time, new to the medium. Her works provide an insight into her viewpoints on life and the issues and forces that impact it.

Alma's Father was a portraitist. He drew the faces of those fighting and yearning for a new way of life in this country and she tackles the same issues with her abstract paintings. She uses a broad pallet of colors to grab the attention of the viewer and then she adds splattering, markings, pours, and layering to get her messages across. She relies heavily on the use of circles and dots to represent humanity both living and past. Her work conveys her deep commitment to messages that are culturally grounded and focused on the struggle to undo racism and its traumatic generational impact on people of color in the U.S. Even as she engages in this continuous struggle, all of her work has some point of hope. "*The hope for change is what has driven my activism all of my life.* In the words of Poet, Amanda Gorman, I have tried to "see the Light" and I have tried to "be the Light."

For many years, Roberts' creativity was channeled through spoken and written imagery. In 1983, she founded an award-winning cultural arts organization (New Breezes, Inc.) that promoted the works of regional and national literary, visual and performing artists. She uses her visual works to connect to and to translate her life to those she lives with, and live for. "Even at this age, it is my intent to stay unapologetically woke and present through my art. I owe that to my Father, to honor the gift of his artistry that he passed on to me, and the sacrifices he made to give it. I also owe it to society to fight for what is needed to move our democracy to be the best that it was intended to be for <u>all</u> of its citizens."

Roberts is a self-taught artist who considers artists Alma Thomas, Jack Whitten, Norman Lewis, Sam Gilliam, Joan Mitchell, and Mark Rothko as influences on her work. She has had numerous exhibits over the years. In 2017, she had a successful solo exhibition at the City Hall Galleries in her hometown of Baltimore. She also has one of her compositions (A Vessel Full of Power, 2017) in the permanent collection of the James E. Lewis Museum at her undergraduate Alma Mater, Morgan State University (Baltimore). She is included in the Baker Artist Portfolios, and she is a Maryland State Arts Council *Grant for Artist* grant recipient (2022). Roberts is a founding member of the Joshua Johnson Council at the Baltimore Museum of Art. She currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Reginald F. Lewis Museum of Maryland African-American History and Culture, and is a Commissioner on the Baltimore Public Art Commission that oversees and approves the installation and maintenance of public art throughout the city.

Artist Statement

It is distinct from European art because it comes out of a distinct, although not monolithic, shared historical and sociopolitical reality, one that is unique to African Americans. But African American art cannot be totally divorced from what is known, as a broad category of art, African art. African art cannot be reduced to a monolithic category that can be easily separated from its expression in Diaspora. However, distinctions in the use of color, subject matter, the voice of the art (how the art speaks and what it says), and materials used may distinguish African art from African American art, from African Caribbean, African Haitian, or African Brazilian, etc. Even so, the rhythm of the art and the cadence of the beat will flow with a certain familiarity that is purely African in flavor and therefore unmistakable. This more true (I believe) of folk artist than it is of the trained African American artist. This I feel is especially true when the trained artist foolishly allows "a prefabricated technique," or European artistic imperialism to construct and dominate their work rather than natural creative curiosity. The truly gifted artist does not allow their gift to be ruled by simply a rote mastering of technology, but subjecting technology to their creative calling.

Artist Statement



David's first artistic talents became evident when attending Grape Street Elementary School in Watts, California. David's teachers discovered that he never drew "lollipop" trees or stick people like other kindergartners. His trees had branches and the branches had individual leaves. David is not what you call a formally trained artist. The only art courses he took were in junior high (Roosevelt Jr. High, Compton, CA) and High School (George Washington, Los Angeles, CA) where he was primarily interested in ceramics, sculpture and drawing.

My art is the result of my life experiences. I do the art; the art does not do me. What I am thinking about at any given time, may find its way into my poetry, paintings, drawings, sculptures, or photography. I like lots of colors with lots of vibrant, overlapping and intersecting images. I want you to stop and stare to discover what is hidden in the artwork. I want to make your eyes work at searching out the story.

What I do artistically is part of what I believe can be classified as a distinct genre in art, African American art. It is (I believe) distinct from European art because it comes out of a distinct, although not monolithic, shared historical and sociopolitical reality, one that is unique to African Americans. My art attempts to tell a story, my story, your story, and our story. But African American art cannot be totally divorced from what is known, as a broad category of art, African art. African art cannot be reduced to a monolithic category that can be easily separated from its expression in diaspora. However, distinctions in the use of color, subject matter, the voice of the art (how the art speaks and what it says), and materials used may distinguish African art from African American art, from African Caribbean, African Haitian, or African Brazilian, etc. Even so, the rhythm of the art and the cadence of the beat will flow with a certain familiarity that is purely African in flavor and therefore unmistakable. Technology can kill a "naturally-gifted" artist (It doesn't have to). It can improve one's technique, expand one's choice of creative avenues outside of the artist's normal purview. I have always craved formal training but I have not had the time to pursue it. Too busy painting.

It is the spirit of the artist that makes art truly live. Art that comes out of the "raw" spirit and soul of the artist is far more useful than that which is merely the technical manipulation of substances. African American art can therefore be copied technologically, but it cannot be fully reproduced outside of the womb of soul and psyche of those who have been "gifted" existentially with the call to speak with an artistic voice. Her work is eclectic and innovative. It is ancient while at the same time new-world and always changing. Ajanku's muscle as a visual artist spans from contemporary fine art to village inspired craft, and the performance. Her artistry is layered with... and entrenched in... indigenous folkways. Her work embodies research, identity, and the gathering of elements of African retention, in hopes of evoking intuitive memories that reach back into ancestral histories and stories that impact the here and the now.

Kibibi Ajanku's passion for art began early. She was nurtured by "grandma's hands" as she sat at the knees of a quilt making maternal grandmother and soon followed on the heels of fashion forward seamstress aunties. This fueled an artistic journey as an exploration and execution of an indigenous aesthetic. Ajanku is empowered by international training and workshops: adire fabric design in Osogbo, Nigeria; tapestries in Theis, Senegal; adinkra fabric printing and kente weaving in Kumasi, Ghana; mud cloth acquisitions from the Mali railway; embroidery work in Medina, Senegal; and Orisha attire in Havana, Cuba. Ajanku has traveled the African diaspora to study, teach, and perform with many masters, and each trip has included fabric and fibers. Ajanku believes that when presented properly, art is the perfect vehicle to move forward into greater intercultural awareness for the global community.



Larry "Poncho" Brown, is a native of Baltimore, MD. He started his first business at the age of 17 as a signwriter and he has been a full-time artist ever since. Poncho received his Bachelor of Fine Arts degree in graphic design and photography from the Maryland Institute College of Art, Baltimore, MD. His art, both fine and commercial, has been published nationally in Upscale, Ebony, Ebony Man, Essence, and Jet magazines. His art is featured in the UCLA Fowler Museum of Cultural History book entitled "Wrapped In Pride" and "Connecting People With Art". His popular works have been prominently featured on several TV shows including "A Different World", "In the House", "The Wire", "The Carmichael Show", "Star", and "Greenleaf". Movies featuring his art include "Avalon", "He Said,

She Said", and "Soulfood". His work adorns the walls of the likes of Camille Cosby, Dick Gregory, Anita Baker, Susan Taylor, Ed Gordon and Bernard Bronner just to name a few.

His original works are in the corporate and institutional collections of Coppin State University, the Charles H. Wright Museum of African American History, the District of Columbia Superior Courts, the Children's Hospital of Richmond at Virginia Commonwealth University, Howard University Hospital, and Yale New Haven Health Park Avenue Medical Center.

His earlier works were predominately airbrush illustrations. He evolved from a graffiti artist in his earlier years, to a classically trained sign painter and graphic artist. Poncho's early published works in the mid 80's like his "Black is Black" Series was the first to address the subject of colorism in the African American art realm. He was one of many artists often referenced as "The Popular Artists" who gained national recognition during "The Cosby Show" era and found commercial success between 1985-2000 during a period known as "The Golden Age of African American Art", by making their art accessible to the masses through direct participation in community art and cultural festivals, foregoing the traditional artist arrangement of artist representation, gallery representation, and art publisher distribution. At the height of this era his works were sold in 3000 galleries across the country, and on the walls of nearly 500,000 homes.

In pursuing his philanthropic goals, he founded Raising the Arts which has created over 70+ images to assist non-profit organizations and African American Organizations with fundraising for the past two decades. He also co-founded the Creative Quarantine which is a collaboration with other professional artists that dedicate the entire month of January to creating new experimental works. Poncho was awarded "Artist of the Year" by the African American Visual Arts Association in 2000, the "Heritage Arts Festival Palette Award" in 2003, and the "Save the Arts Award" as Museum's Choice in 2010, "The Jan Spivey Gilchrist Visual Arts Award" in 2013, the "Baker Artists Award" in 2021, the Curtis R. McClinton Jr. 3rd Annual Lifetime Achievement Award in 2023, and awarded "Best Visual Artist" by The Baltimore Times "Best of Black Baltimore" in 2023.

Admirers often site rhythm, movement, and unity, as favorite elements in his work. He primarily works in acrylic, although he uses a variety of mediums and styles to express his interests in Afrocentric themes, Ancient Egyptology, and dance. Poncho's unique style combines past and present art stylizations to create a sense of realism, mysticism, and beauty, which gives his art universal appeal.

"The African American art realm has been pressing onward because of the positive images that have become a narrative of our perseverance. My works attempt to capture SOUL while purposely depicting positive representations of African American culture. Art and imagery are the strongest forms to challenge the perceptions of African Americans in our society." -Larry Poncho Brown

Artist Statement

"My process involves a lot of slowly building up form, layer by layer, followed by the slow 'destruction' of it by distorting, rearranging, or combining it with other improvised elements. My process is very much an additive and subtractive 'What if I do this? Oh, okay. Well, what if I do that?' kind of method. There's a real push and pull quality to it. There's a lot that winds up never being part of the final image in the end. If I were a movie director, you might say there is a lot that winds up 'on the cutting room floor'.

I usually have an idea in my head of what I want the end piece to look like, feel like, and generally where I want it to go. However, there's a lot of experimenting and improvising along the way, and a lot of back and forth.

I want it to be able to evolve as I create it. I want it to retain a certain expressiveness. I want it to be the result of what I am feeling at that moment, and not necessarily stuck at the initial thoughts of its inception. This means that a particular image can really go on quite a transformative journey, depending on how long it took between inception and completion. The result rarely matches what I initially had in my head, sometimes to my delight, other times to my chagrin."

"Influence can be a tricky thing to pinpoint. I feel we are constantly being influenced by a variety of sources beyond visual art, without being consciously aware of it.

I would definitely cite music as being a huge influence on my work, perhaps because my art is expression driven, rather than primarily concept driven."

I'm in love with the animate nature of the stroke. Whether it be by brush or by knife. I believe its what separates the artist from the art.

In 2023 he also received the LIT in DC Award for the Arts. In 2019 he was awarded 2nd place in the Chroma International Juried art exhibition by Art Impact international. In 2017 Luis was honored with the NCIS Director's Coin by NCIS director, Andrew L. Traver. In 2013 Luis was selected as the winner of the East of the River Distinguished Artist Award. That year he was also a finalist for the District of Columbia 28th Annual Mayor's Arts Awards. These accomplishments preceded the presentation of the National Museum of Catholic Art and Library National Artist Award by Prince Lorenzo Maria De Medici in 2014, and his selection as the artist commissioned for the 2015 Beijing / District of Columbia Sister Cities Project. The latter project resulted in a panda statue painted by Del Valle that was given to the Mayor of Beijing as a state gift from Mayor Muriel Bowser. Del Valle is also the recipient of the 2015 National Museum of Catholic Art and Library Portrait Award.

Luis received his first commission from the fitness franchise Body by Jake after his 16th birthday. Since then he has been commissioned by other businesses, foundations, public institutions, museums and private collectors to create murals, portraits, sculptures, and paintings of various themes. Luis has exhibited his works at various museums and institutions including; NCIS headquarters, V.A., Vatican City, The Embassy of Italy, The Frederick Douglass National Historic Site, The Historical Society of Washington DC, The Vatican Embassy in DC and the Frederick Douglass Isaac Myers Museum in Baltimore, MD.

While her previous experience as a population health administrator lends to her expertise at the intersection of health and mental wellness, place, and racial justice, her Nigerian heritage and Southern upbringing lend to her love of stories and storytelling. As such, Yewande utilizes her work to celebrate, depict, and reframe narratives that have been inadequately or falsely delivered in the past. With a focus on traditional media and murals, Yewande is able to center the layered experiences of Black folks— most often women and children by taking a special interest in their narration as a source of inspiration and truth. Through her approach and various media, Yewande's work serves as a vehicle for community care by highlighting our connectedness, inciting joy, and creating space for healing. Yewande's work has been exhibited in Baltimore and throughout the DMV area, as well as in Florida, Georgia, and California.

Yewande Kotun Davis Artist Statement

Community care has always been central to my being and my life's work— be it through my first career as a healthcare administrator or my chosen career as a practicing artist. I believe that art creates space and opportunity for people and their stories to be seen and heard and utilize my work to highlight those who historically have not had their voices amplified, let alone their stories told. Through direct social and community engagement, which often informs my work, followed by a delicate dance between oil, acrylic, and water-based media, my work centers the layered experiences of Black folks— most often women and children— highlighting our joy, resilience, and shared humanity. Within my work, first-person narratives are married with vibrant colors, reimagined yet familiar imagery, and attention to naming in order to highlight our connectedness and drive meaningful dialogues that promote healing, incite joy, and help redefine the human experience.
