

Our Fellowship and The Reforming Alliance

Some confusion has become apparent concerning our Fellowship, The Reforming Alliance and The Uniting Church.

Our Canberra Christian Fellowship in the Methodist Tradition was initially formed to provide support for people who had recently left The Uniting Church, who were disaffected by it or felt it was not meeting their needs. Our Fellowship is NOT a part of the Uniting Church although many people who are part of our Fellowship still attend the Uniting Church and / or continue as members.

The **Reforming Alliance within The Uniting Church in Australia** was formed by Uniting Church members, who disagreed with Assembly resolution 84, in response to the passing of that resolution. Its concerns however are not limited to just resolution 84. RA identified three strands which broadly encompassed its supporters. <u>Strand 1</u> was those people who felt they could work for Uniting Church reform within the current organisational structures. <u>Strand 2</u> was those who wanted reform but could not work within the existing structures. <u>Strand 3</u> was for those who were close to leaving or felt unable to remain within the Uniting Church. We, as a Fellowship, fall into Strand 3 although individually we may represent different Strands. The full RA name suggests that RA members (individuals and organisations) are part of the Uniting Church even though strand 3 people or congregations may not be. Our Fellowship has been accepted as a member even though we are NOT within the Uniting Church.

RA is examining options to lessen such confusion.

Our Fellowship **IS** a member of The Reforming Alliance.

Our Fellowship **IS NOT** a part of The Uniting Church.

An Evening Together

Despite rain that seemed to say 'stay home out of the weather', a considerable crowd (30 ish) gathered at Bradbury's on Wednesday 8-12-2004 for 'desserts'.

On Dangerous Ground – The place to be.

There was no doubt that Rev. Ross Kingham's sermon topic for our November service had an intriguing title.

His text was Matthew 2:13-21, the story of the flight of Jesus' family to Egypt and their return to Israel.

Ross spoke of times when events make life unsettled, difficult or dangerous. Mary, Joseph and Jesus had to flee to Egypt to escape the danger posed by Herod. We also must take appropriate actions to meet the circumstances in which we find ourselves.

Mary, Joseph and Jesus spent some, no doubt challenging, years in Egypt waiting for the right time to return to their homeland. We too have times of waiting that can also be times of healing and challenge.

Eventually God told Joseph that the time was right for them to return home. For us too, there comes a time to move on.

We are called to live our lives with an openness to God and a trust in Him whatever our circumstances.

Part of the work of the Spirit involves upheaval and the stripping away of things that get between God and His people. This may be unsettling to us but we can be sure of God's continuing love and care for us.

Ross closed with a quote from "A Gentle Thunder" (Word, 1995) by Max Lucado.

"There are many reasons God saves you:

to bring glory to himself, to appease his justice, to demonstrate his sovereignty. But one of the sweetest reasons God Saved you is because he is fond of you. He likes having you around.

He thinks you are the best thing since sliced bread

"... If God had a refrigerator, your picture would be on it.

If he had a wallet, your photo would be in it.

He sends you flowers every spring and a sunrise every morning.


Whenever you want to talk, he'll listen.
