### 24<sup>th</sup> April Service – Mr. Alan Melmoth

Alan Melmoth mentioned that he, as a farmer, is more used to yelling at sheep than preaching, but then gave us a great deal to think about in his sermon on prayer.

He started with a possibly apocryphal story about a small town that boasted two churches and a distillery with an atheistic owner. The church people believed the distillery was harming their community so gathered together and prayed that it would be shut down. A short time later a storm hit the town, lightning struck the distillery and it was burnt down. The owner claimed the church people were responsible for his loss as a result of their prayer meeting and sued. The church people denied any responsibility. In his verdict the judge mentioned his confusion at having an atheist distillery owner professing a belief in the power of prayer while committed church people were denying any connection between their prayers and the demise of the distillery.

What do we believe about prayer?

Jesus assumed prayer was normal. Prayer is an integral part of even a "base model" christian. The Disciples asked "Teach us to pray".

Alan suggested we should pray and not give up praying.

- 1 We shouldn't worry but pray Worry is like a rocking chair. It gives us something to do but it doesn't get us anywhere.
- 2 We shouldn't quit praying, but pray persistently. We can see in the Bible that David was an "all day" prayer.
- We shouldn't doubt but pray positively.
  We should expect God to answer our prayers.
  We should pray to God in faith and not doubt (James 1: 6,7)
  We can approach God with confidence (I John 5: 14)
  If prayers are not answered, look for a reason:- a wrong question; unconfessed sin; wrong timing.

God answers prayers in different ways:

- Quickly A lady looking for a dry parking spot in teaming rain prayed for God's help. Immediately the perfect parking spot became available right in front of her. God had answered but her prayer continued 'Don't bother, I've just found a spot myself'.
- Later God's timing is impeccable
- A better way God sometimes has something even better in store for us than what we are requesting.
- No We shouldn't stop praying until we receive a clear NO from God. Prayer is a request, not a demand.

Alan concluded by stating that listening to sermons on prayer is not as valuable as actually praying.

## 8<sup>th</sup> May Service – Dr. Ted Dennis

Christian Charity was the topic of Dr. Ted Dennis's sermon on 8<sup>th</sup> May.

Ted pointed out the way we do things should be in line with what is taught in the Gospel.

We call ourselves the "Canberra Christian Fellowship in the Methodist Tradition". Ted questioned what Methodist traditions we are trying to keep alive. The answer he sees is to Preach the Gospel, i.e. that we are saved! Justified by the blood of Christ.

Social justice matters do not become an add-on to our faith but are in fact a natural consequence of our faith. We should help the poor and needy in the context of preaching the Gospel.
