

# Rev. Phil Anderson (Senior Chaplain Army Headquarters)

Back in May we were fortunate to have Rev. Phil Anderson come and preach for us.

We learned a little about his background through a short interview Ken McPhan conducted, discovering that he is a Canberra boy and finding out something of what is involved in becoming an Army Chaplain.

Phil's subject was 'Strength in Weakness' and he mentioned the importance of fellowship.

He drew our attention to the fact that over time various practices creep into worldly society and into the church. Such changes had in Biblical times sometimes brought Paul to combat them. Today we don't have Paul to come and pull us into line, but we can take heed of warnings he gives recorded in scripture.

Christians should live by the teachings of Christ, not by what the world says is popular.

In closing, Phil suggested we should think of the benediction not in terms of some theological understanding of the trinity but rather as a means of building up the community of faith.

## Fellowship Tea

May was one of those months that just happened to contain five Sundays.

In keeping with our decision to have a fellowship tea on 5<sup>th</sup> Sundays, a fellowship tea was arranged. As always food was plentiful and conversation equally so. We were particularly glad to welcome a good number of Gospel Chapel people who joined us for the evening.

We are all part of one flock with one shepherd.

Once again we were blessed with some wonderful music this time provided by our Korean and Fijian friends.

It was also pleasing to welcome so many of our Gospel Chapel and Chinese Methodist friends to the service and supper afterwards.

## Sunday 26 June 2005 – Rev. Ron Peters

What is vision?

Ron Peters produced two meanings for the word that were listed in the dictionary – the power of seeing with the eye and the act of perceiving what is not visible to the eye. He continued by speaking about "A vision for every church".

He suggested vision in a christian sense is a reflection of what God wants to accomplish through us to build His kingdom. God can see both the visible and the invisible, what we can see and what is beyond our sight. He can see what can be achieved through us without becoming narrowly focused on us.

Ephesians 4 provides God's vision for the Church. A two word summary of that chapter could be 'maturing and ministering'. Christ is the head of His body, the Church. He prepares His people to work in Christian service to build up the body.

Having established that we are to work to build up the Church, Ron explained that we need to take account of our circumstances. We all have certain talents and opportunities. It would be unwise to try and use talents we don't have to minister to people who may not be accessible to us just because a particular ministry works well elsewhere.

Paul wrote some of his epistles while a prisoner. Not great circumstances, but he made the most of the opportunities he had.

Ron provided another example for us to ponder. John and his wife were poor people and John was a little on the rough side. One day he was challenged – 'Will you leave your sins and go to heaven or will you keep your sins and go to hell?' John reformed his life. God continued to work in his life and eventually he became a very popular preacher who attracted huge crowds to his services. Unfortunately for John he was a non-conformist preacher at the time of the restoration of the monarchy (1660s). He ended up in prison for twelve and a bit years (over 3 different periods). Like Paul he did what he could in his circumstances and while in prison John Bunyan wrote 'Pilgrim's Progress' which has inspired and helped countless Christians ever since and is considered a milestone in English literature.

For those who may not have caught up, the treatment will last for approximately six months. Three weeks between each chemo course. Because of the particular drugs being administered all will be given at Randwick and Canberra Hospital will be used for weekly blood tests and emergency admissions in case of fevers etc.

Malcolm and Elizabeth Richards are returning to the Democratic Republic of Congo to work in the Diocese of Kindu.

In the Diocese of Kindu, Malcolm and Elizabeth will be involved in training pastors and lay leaders. This will mean working in a team to write a new syllabus for the rural Bible School and train the Bible school teachers. Once this is done they will teach in the Bible School and also travel throughout the diocese to provide ongoing training for pastors on location. Elizabeth will particularly be involved in teaching pastoral skills to clergy and lay people. "I am concerned for those affected by trauma associated with the war and hope to train suitable people in counselling," she said.
