# <u>Visit to Brindabella Christian College of the Children's Choir from Sekolah</u> *Pelita Harapan* (Indonesian)



On 4<sup>th</sup> April we were invited to attend a performance of the choir from Sekolah Pelita Harapan at Brindabella Christian College in Lyneham. Selokah Pelita Harapan is a Christian School situated about 30 kilometres from Jakarta, Indonesia, and Jillian Purdey, the granddaughter of Ruth and Howard, has been a teacher of 2<sup>nd</sup> grade primary students there for almost two years.

Just over 40 children from grade 3 upwards were in the choir or playing traditional instruments which included very large xylophone type of instruments and bamboo chimes. We greatly enjoyed the singing by the children and the demonstration of their instruments including some of the Brindabella children being shown how to play on the bamboo rods by vibration!



Following the performance we were all invited to join with the Indonesian children and teachers for lunch. It was an interesting and enjoyable time for us all and we were invited to return to Brindabella school at some later date and be taken on a tour of the school. # News from Dominica, Vince and Antoinette in the UK


Several emails have been received from the Lorimers telling us of their travels and some extracts are listed here:

When the plane touched down in Aberdeen we had to then think about how we would travel up north. We checked out the flights to Orkney – however they were just too expensive, so we opted for the 'scenic' option by first getting a bus to Inverness, then another bus the following day to the top of Scotland. It was so cold that it was snowing quite heavily, which of course thrilled Antoinette no end. We then hoped to bus it to Scrabster and catch the ferry to Orkney – but the conditions were too harsh, so we were forced to spend a night in Thurso, before getting a ferry to Orkney.

On Easter Monday we will be heading south. ... We start by boarding a ferry from Kirkwall (Orkney) at 11.30pm on Monday evening – docking in Aberdeen at 7am, from there we pick up a car and drive to the Roman Army Museum near Greenhead (England). We will then visit a Roman fort at Houseteads, before driving on to Hexham ... then will drive from Hexham to York before heading on to Oxford. We should be staying at a B&B only 5 minutes walk from the colleges (although Vince has said that in fact it will be a 15 minute walk to Pembroke College). There we will be staying for 4 nights – each day going off to see different sites. ... When we finally leave Oxford (on the Saturday morning) we will drive to Keswick Lake District ... then head from Keswick to Oban, where we shall cross over to Mull, and then on to Iona. ... Wednesday morning, work our way back to Oban (which takes a while), then we will head over to Inveraray. It is here that Vince has instructed me not to mention if we support the Campbells or McDonalds! On the Thursday we will be staying at a farm near Loch Ness (as a bit of a surprise for Antoinette – although she doesn't know about it yet). Then eventually we will drive up to Thurso (yes – another long drive) and stay there on the Friday night, before boarding a ferry to take us back to Orkney on the Saturday. ...

We wish everyone at Campbell a wonderful Easter and we shall be in touch soon.

# <u>Love Your Aliens</u> 25 March 2007 – Rev. Kevin Kim

### Cassava / Cyanide

We were pleased to learn Howard Bradbury had been recognised, for his work in measuring the concentration of cyanide in the staple food cassava, with the bestowing of Membership of the Order of Australia.

In order to support him in this important work, our fellowship was pleased to make a contribution towards the care of those who had developed Konzo (an irreversable paralysis of the legs that results from eating cassava with too much cyanide).

# **Bible Society Report**

The Bible Society afternoon held at Hughes Baptist Church was a very informative afternoon. The presentation by the Bible Society CEO, Daniel Willis, showed us in detail where the work throughout the world is being carried out. The main work from Australia is to our nearest neighbours such as the Philippines etc.. Probably the most exciting

work at the moment is being done in Cambodia with the new ZVOX solar powered audio players for rural communities where literacy rates are low. The ZVOX is a device with 500 hours of practical health and hygiene advice as well as the Bible and Bible lessons stored on it. In doing this it provides physical and spiritual aid to victims of war, poverty, natural disasters and disease. When new translations of the Bible come through in countries such as Cambodia with the same problems, the Bible Society, working with other organisations, will be able to use this method so very successfully. The ZVOX can be given to 1 or 2 village leaders who can reach many others with this 'vocal' machine – whereas



with traditional Bibles being so few for so many it is so difficult for all to have access. Many times the Bible Society would witness 2 Elders walking miles just to copy 1 page from the Bible to take back to their villages.

It is wonderful work the Bible Society is doing – indeed as our Lord instructed – taking God's Word to every corner of the world.

God has truly blessed our fellowship with the quality of preaching and teaching brought to us by the many people who have filled our pulpit. I have felt this particularly this year as week after week God's Word has been presented to us so clearly. I am sorry that I cannot print summaries of all those sermons here because they all deserve a second round of attention.

# A New Day, New Tasks 15 April 2007 – Rev. Paul Dudley – John 20: 1-16

There are times when we have a bad day. Sometimes things aren't right. After God created the world he saw that it was very good, but then in Genesis chapter 3 we read about the brokenness of man. In Romans chapter 8 Paul talks about the world groaning for a new day.

We think about the disciples at Easter. Great darkness came over them as Jesus died on the cross. Would tomorrow be any better?

On the first day of the week while it was still dark Mary arrived at the tomb and found that it was open. She ran and told the disciples. Peter and John ran to the tomb and saw that Jesus' body was not there. They went away but Mary stayed and saw two angels inside the tomb. She spoke to someone who she thought was the gardener, but it was Jesus.

Jesus is alive! God's kingdom is breaking in. A new day!

- 1. It is all about life. Lazarus coming back to life pointed to the ultimate sign of Jesus' resurrection. Jesus has started the kingdom.
- 2. The new day is about the Spirit. God will pour out His Spirit. John 20: 22 looks forward to Pentecost.
- 3. Restoration of the temple. In John 2: 13 we read of Jesus cleansing the temple. Jesus said that He would build the temple again in three days. They thought that it referred to the temple in Jerusalem which took 46 years to build, but Jesus was referring to the temple of His body.

Jesus, the true God and the true man is the true temple. We are the new temple, God and us meeting together.

Thomas was not present when Jesus appeared to his disciples and he said that he would not believe. But Jesus appeared to them again with Thomas present and he believed and said "My Lord and my God." Are you a believer or a non-believer? We need to be believers. May we go out to tell others the good news.
