

# Sunday, 6 December 2009 – 6<sup>th</sup> Multicultural Carols





Gifts were the subject of the message presented by Peter Nelson at the Carols.

The wise men who brought gifts to the baby Jesus gave Him good gifts and ones appropriate for who He was and what he would do.

One gift was gold. Gold is valuable and often given to kings. Jesus is King of Kings and Lord of Lords, so it was a very fitting gift to give Him.

A second gift was frankincense. This was often used in the temple during religious observances. Jesus was not just a man. He is God so again it was an appropriate gift.

Myrrh can be used as a deodorant and a perfume, and it is also a pain killing drug. Jesus was to suffer as He completed his life on earth. He was offered myrrh as he hung on the cross, but he didn't take it. The gift of myrrh perhaps foresaw his future role.

The gifts the wise men gave were good and thoughtful gifts, but they are insignificant when compared with the gift Jesus gives us. Jesus died so that we could become children of God. That is a wonderful gift. All we have to do is accept that gift.

Although an accurate count of people attending the Carols is close to impossible to get, best estimates suggest around 300 people, or just over, came this year.

## Sunday, 29 November 2009 – Rev. Peter Nelson – God's Amazing Grace



Grace is 'God's unmerited and undeserved favour' and it is the heart and at the centre of the Church. The hymn "And can it be ..." examines God's grace in the words

He left His Father's throne above-

Emptied Himself of all but love,

And bled for Adam's helpless race. ...

Ephesians 5: 1,4-5 tells us

"<sup>1</sup> As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, ... <sup>4</sup> But because of his great love for us, God, who is rich in mercy, <sup>5</sup> made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions— it is by grace you have been saved."

God has provided for our salvation through His grace. It has nothing to do with anything we have done. All we do is accept it. The parable of the workers in the vineyard (Matthew 20: 1-16) is not about industrial relations or what men might see as fair, but its point focuses on the master's generosity. He was extraordinarily generous particularly to the men he hired late in the day, giving them much more than they earned. We deserve nothing from God, but in His love and through His grace He wants us to receive salvation and so much more.

## "THE 700 CLUB"<sup>1</sup>

What, you may ask, is "The 700 Club"?

First let me tell you a good news story we heard on our last visit to see Steve Lindner, Chaplain at the Campbell High School.

He told us about a year 10 lad who was a student in the Special learning unit who suffers from Autism and depression and did not take part in daily class activities. Each day at school he would just sit in a corner, lay his head on the desk or play on the computer and not take part in class activities.

One night, while suffering from a bout of depression, he turned on cable TV and watched a program hosted by CBN<sup>2</sup>.

That program happened to be "The 700 Club". It is a live television program that airs weekdays before a studio audience from the Christian Broadcasting Network (CBN) broadcast facilities in Virginia Beach, Virginia, USA. The 700 Club is a mix of news and commentary, interviews, feature stories and Christian Ministry.

As lan reported in The Next Step No. 39 (Page 6), this year 10 student became a Christian after watching "The 700 Club". The change in this student was remarkable according to school staff. He regularly visits Steve asking all types of questions about the Bible and other issues such as investing ethically.

I have now watched this program a few times and it certainly has a powerful message. I can understand how the Lord is working in many different ways especially through the medium of television. Warren Clendenning

## CIT Dinner

A few weeks ago, Dominica enquired whether anyone would be interested in a visit to the CIT for dinner sometime. The suggestion met with approval. As a result last night 15 of us turned up at the CIT café for a meal. Although people unfamiliar with the CIT restaurant sometimes hint that placing yourself in the hands of hospitality students is taking your life in your hands, people with experience of eating there know you can expect a good meal for a reasonable price. Last night was no different. For a very low price we enjoyed a 3 course meal with a choice of 2 menu items for each course.

I chose French Onion soup to begin with and it was delicious, the best I've had. Those who had the risotto entrée option also said how good that tasted. I'm told the duck with potato and beans main course was particularly nice and the brochette (skewered chicken and vegetables) with pasta was by no means an inferior choice. The desserts were a yoghurty, mousse type of thing with raspberries or ice-cream on a cherry, coconut, biscuity base. Both received a high approval rating from those who chose them.

Thanks to Dominica for organising such an enjoyable evening. After dinner chatter suggests a return visit might be very well supported.


