



Racecourse Chaplaincy - RacingCare Report Dec. 2010 - Rev. Bob Prior

Since my last letter I have continued to visit the courses in the mornings and occasional afternoons as time allows and all the race meetings in this area. It amazes me that I am still meeting new people every week. There is a large turnover in staff in the stables and always jockeys and trainers coming to meetings from all over country NSW as well as the Sydney courses. A new apprentice has said that he wants to talk to me.

However I seem to be getting more and more opportunities to spend time with individuals off the course and these are most rewarding times. For example I have been able to spend time with a trainer and his partner. The trainer attends meetings of an organisation called, "Victims of Crime". He has been able to talk about many issues he has had through past abuse and how this is affecting his view on life and many of those that work on the course. I have had regular opportunities to share the gospel with them and they have responded well to this. Please pray for me to have future contact with them and for them to respond to the gospel message and receive Jesus as their Saviour.

I have also had more opportunities to meet with the trainer who was having marriage problems. He is back living with his wife and two beautiful daughters now, however his wife is still struggling big time with depression and he too has some depression. Please pray that as I continue to talk with him that he will grow in his understanding of why his wife is acting as she is and will grow in his acceptance of her need for his TLC. Also pray that they will both come to Jesus in faith so that they can have His help in sorting out their health issues.

A 70yr old stable hand, that I had the privilege of helping get government housing sometime ago, rang and asked if I could come round to see him as he had something he need to talk to me about. As we talked it came out that he wanted to plan arrangements for when he dies. He needed help with his will. He wants me to take the service and he wants to be cremated and for me to arrange to get his ashes spread on the Canberra course. I commended him for his planning and then with God's leading I asked what plans he had for himself after his death. About an hour later he prayed and asked the Lord to forgive him for all his past sin and to come into his life to help him live the rest of his time here on earth for Jesus. I have seen him once since and he is "Over the moon" and cannot believe the peace that he has now about the future. He has also asked me for a Bible so I will take that to him on Wednesday.


A track rider who had gone through detox asked me to be his sponsor to help him stay sober and he had also asked me to share some "God stuff" with him and his flatmate who had also just gone through detox. I have been there twice now and the flatmate says that he is not a Jehovah's Witness but has been influenced by their teachings. After the first visit he rang and asked me to come and talk about the trinity, which I did.

After a discussion that was going nowhere I changed tack and took him through the gospel message using the "New World Translation". He came to see that eternal life is in Jesus (whether He is God or not) and that the only way to be saved is by getting rid of your sin by trusting Jesus and then by asking Jesus to come and live in your life to help you live God's way. Having said he understood this he asked me to come back this week and bring him a copy of the Bible that I use. I will be doing that tomorrow, Tuesday.

Another trainer and his partner whom I had visited out in the country have moved in closer to where I am and I am now seeing them each week. At a recent meeting in Cooma a jockey who is a single mum had a fall and I spent the afternoon at the hospital with her and her daughter. This has given me an opportunity to catch up with them since.

At a Canberra meeting yesterday I had several people from Moruya asking why I hadn't been down there for a while. Please pray that we will be able to find a chaplain for Moruya and Bega soon. The Carols at the Course will be on next Monday 20th of Dec. Please pray that that goes well.
