## School Chaplaincy is under attack

A High Court challenge threatens the existence of many of the 500 chaplains in state schools across Queensland... as well as the future of more than 2500 other school chaplains across Australia.

Australia's School Chaplaincy program is facing a constitutional challenge in the High Court as a Toowoomba man opposes the Commonwealth funding of chaplains in state schools.

This will have a direct impact on the care of kids in schools.

SU QLD, its school chaplains and supporters will fight this High Court challenge over the coming months.

#### What is the plaintiff's case?

The Plaintiff's arguments fall under three broad types:

- 1. That there is no federal constitutional power under which the Commonwealth has, or can, make payments for school chaplaincy. The argument is put several ways that there is no specific federal power, that it is something within the power of the states and that chaplaincy does not involve an issue of national importance requiring national action.
- 2. That school chaplains funded under the National School Chaplaincy Program (NSCP) are "officers of the Commonwealth" and that therefore the Commonwealth has imposed a religious test qualification on a Commonwealth officer, in breach of the constitution. Central to this is the requirement of the NSCP Guideline requiring "formal ordination, commissioning, recognised qualification or endorsement by a recognised or accepted religious institution or a state or territory-approved chaplaincy service".
- 3. That the parliamentary acts appropriating funds for chaplaincy are not worded widely enough to cover payments under the chaplaincy policy (ie a deficiency in the wording of the acts).

The Plaintiff is seeking declarations that the funding agreement is void and of no effect, that the appropriation acts did not, and cannot, authorise payments under the NSCP Guidelines and that the administrative authorisation for payments made to SU QLD are of no effect.

The Plaintiff is also seeking injunctions restraining payments to SU QLD under the funding agreement or NSCP Guidelines, restraining the Commonwealth from giving effect to the funding agreement and from entering into further such agreements. The case relates only to the Darling Heights State School near Toowoomba. However, it may have implications for SU QLD's other agreements with the Commonwealth and for other school chaplaincy employers.

Importantly, the case says nothing about chaplains' access in schools. It concerns only whether the Commonwealth may fund school chaplaincy under the terms of the current NSCP Guideline.

#### Process and timing

- The Commonwealth and SU QLD will have until 25 February to file their defences to the claims made.
- After that the Plaintiff will have two weeks to file a response to the defences (ie until 11 March).
- The Commonwealth will then prepare and file, by 23 March, a draft special case for the full High Court to consider and rule on.
- The High Court has set aside May 10, 11 and 12 to hear the case.
- The decision of the High Court may not be known until late 2011 or early 2012.



# Sunday 17th April - Rev. Kevin Kim - Two Aspects of Hosanna (Luke 19: 28-44)


As he has on a number of previous occasions when he has preached, Kevin sang for us before he began his sermon. This time he sang "Dying with Jesus".

Race course chaplains are needed in Moruya, Goulburn and Wagga Wagga.



## Sunday 24th April (Easter) - Rev. Bob Prior - The Most Important Truth of Easter

The Easter message is not one of death, burial or resurrection, but of all three together.

How do we know the events we remember at Easter are true?

Roman soldiers, familiar with crucifixions, not Jesus' friends, reported Jesus as dead. This was confirmed by a centurion sent to make sure. Jesus was speared in his side for added certainty.





What did Jesus' death achieve? God's standard is absolute perfection and noone but Jesus has achieved that or even come close. We are MADE perfect through God's grace when we trust Jesus to take our sin. Jesus' death was a sacrifice of atonement. His blood bought our salvation just as the blood of sacrificed lambs on doorposts saved the Jews in Egypt from death at the passover.

What about His resurrection? Unlike other religious leaders who have died and stayed dead, Jesus came back to life on the third day. We have a living God! The resurrection was a victory over death. We can enjoy a daily living relationship with a loving God. We are not alone. In giving us the 'great commission' (Matthew 28: 19,20) Jesus said "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age.". We are not sent out to fend for ourselves in God's service, God takes us out.

The promises of Jesus are available to everyone but realised only for those who trust in Jesus.

Easter has brought us into a new relationship with God. "<sup>34</sup> Who is he that condemns? Christ Jesus, who died— more than that, who was raised to life— is at the right hand of God and is also interceding for us. <sup>35</sup> Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? <sup>36</sup> As it is written:

'For your sake we face death all day long; we are considered as sheep to be slaughtered.'

<sup>37</sup> No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. <sup>38</sup> For I am convinced that neither death nor life, neither angels nor demons, neither the present nor the future, nor any powers, <sup>39</sup> neither height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God that is in Christ Jesus our Lord."

We enjoyed a visit from our Tongan Wesleyan Methodist friends at this service. They sang during the service and during supper got out the guitars again and sang another half dozen songs. One song I felt was particularly meaningful included the words "Forget about yourself, concentrate on Him and worship Him".

In this world there are many anxious and troubled people. The answer to anxiety and trouble is trust and faith, but trust and faith in what?

Jesus said "I am the way and the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father except through me." In the Old Testament, Exodus 3: 14, God identifies Himself as "I AM". In Jesus' statement, the Jews would have recognised Jesus' identification of Himself with God.

Mark 7: 13,14 tells us "Enter through the narrow gate. For wide is the gate and broad is the road that leads to destruction, and many enter through it. But small is the gate and narrow the road that leads to life, and only a few find it.". Jesus is that narrow way.

Jesus is the truth. In speaking with Pilate He claims "You are right in saying I am a king. In fact, for this reason I was born, and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth. Everyone on the side of truth listens to me." (John 18: 37)

Following Jesus leads to fullness of life - right now and in eternity.

Many people regard all the different religions as interchangeable, each providing a pathway to God. On examination this can be seen to be foolish. While each religion may have elements of good in them, they have contradictory claims, beliefs and goals.

God has spoken to us uniquely in Jesus. Jesus is "the way and the truth and the life. No-one comes to the Father except through [Him]".
