
Steve thought an anniversary would be a good time to 'take stock'.

Another topic of discussion was the proposed hymn festival at the end of July. It will go ahead and we will follow the service with a soup supper. There was support for the suggestion that our fellowship form a choir and sing as we did last year.

Sunday, 29th April - Rev. Peter Nelson - Citizens of two Countries

Bible Reading - Philippians 3: 17 - 4: 1

Paul really cared about the christians in Philippi. He wanted them to grow to christian maturity. He wanted them to follow the good example he and some others set in living a christian life, not copy those who just told them what they should do but didn't live it.

Christians are citizens of heaven and should live as such.

The Philippians were Philippian citizens but they also had Roman citizenship, just as Australians from Greece can be both Greek and Australian citizens. Dual citizenship may have some advantages

but it can lead to tensions. Which soccer team should Greek / Australian citizens support in a match between the two countries?

As Australian / Heavenly citizens, we can contribute to Australian society but we must maintain heavenly standards, being guided by the Word of God. Tensions between allegiances will arise. Sometimes you will feel like a square peg in a round hole. Peter explained that when visiting the Institute of Sport as chaplain he can feel that tension as he focusses on the eternal heavenly prize while the Institute's focus is temporal gold, silver and bronze medal prizes.

Some try to escape this tension by adopting a monastic life where they are cut off from worldly contact. This is escapism. Others attempt to blend in with everyone around them just claiming their faith as an added extra. This is a cop out. The tension between earthly life and our heavenly role will always be with us.

It can be difficult at times but we have some marvellous promises to fall back on.

Matthew 28: 20 "... And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age."

1 Peter 5: 7 "Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you."

Romans 8: 35,37 "Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall trouble or hardship or persecution or famine or nakedness or danger or sword? ... No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us."

2 Corinthians 12: 9 "... 'My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness.' ... "

John 14: 16,17 "And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another advocate to help you and be with you forever— the Spirit of truth. ..."

John 14: 27 "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid."





Chinese Mission

We were joined for this service (29/4) by Alfred Ng and his wife who have served as lay missionaries in China for 10 years. Alfred gave us a fascinating insight into some of the life, growth, work and witness of the Church in China.

The Chinese authorities welcome material contibutions to their communities so that provides one opening for the Church. A medical clinic was needed so an offer was made to provide one. The only proviso was that Jesus' name be given to the clinic. The authorities baulked at this but after some prayer the christians pointed out that the contributions of Rotary and other agencies were acknowledged in their projects. The authorities reconsidered. The clinic was built and is named the 'Jesus Christ faith, hope and love medical clinic'.


Only local people are permitted to discuss faith and beliefs with others. The local pastors have a very important role but often have a very low level of education or training. They need whatever assistance we can provide.

In Shang Zhen village an old man, about to die, had a significant and lasting witness. He was a christian and when the time came, wanted a christian funeral. In atheistic China this was just not permitted. He insisted and threatened to haunt his non-christian children if they went against his wishes. This worked as they with their animistic beliefs feared

haunting spirits. There remained a problem with the rest of the 3000+ community. They believed a christian funeral would trigger disasters within the community. They wanted a guarantee there would be no disasters for 3 years, and they considered some relatively minor events as disasters. The small christian community acting in faith gave that guarantee. The man died and received his christian funeral. There have been no disasters in the two years since that time and the christians are praying that there will be none in the remaining year. What a witness with the whole community waiting to see what will result from the man's final act of christian witness!

Alfred works in the Duan region of China, Guangxi province, among the Yao Zu people. The christians have a vision of starting more than 100 churches in 5 years. The number of churches is growing steadily already. Churches are small and often very young in faith but that faith is enthusiastic and eager to grow. God is at work!

Sunday, 6th May - Rev. Dr. Murray Earl - A Living Hope



Murray's sermon was a little different to normal. It was more a history lesson taken from 1 Kings 1 with a commentary on the passage from Murray as we read it.

The reading deals with the final days of King David: the actions of David's son Adonijar in seeking to succeed David as king; the intervention of Nathan the prophet and finally the annointing of David and Bathsheba's son Solomon as the new King.

To better feel the emotion and atmosphere of Solomon's anointing, we stopped to listen to Handel's music "Zadok the Priest and Nathan the Prophet" which was written about this event.

Murray drew three lessons out of what we read.

- God can and does use any of us for His work young people, older people, people with mixed motives, great men or ordinary people.
- God gives us time; time to fix things. God is patient but we should be warned, we must decide for or against Him eventually.
- God's plan is affected and effective. God works with us but He will work out His purposes with or without us. ID

Sunday, 13th May – Mrs. Joyce Hall –God's power made perfect in weakness



Joyce focussed on 2 Corinthians 12: 9 '... "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.' for her sermon.

Peter believed in his own strength, claiming he would never desert Jesus, yet he denied Jesus three times. It was after he recognised his weakness that Jesus commissioned him

Paul suffered from ' a thorn in the flesh'. Surely he would be less effective doing God's work with the 'thorn'. Paul discovered the opposite was true. If we are weak we see more clearly that what God achieves through us is God's doing, not ours.

Jesus laid aside His Heavenly glory, power and authority when He became man on earth. He retained weakness, submission and obedience to God. Satan was defeated through God acting through Jesus' weakness.

When we understand our 'nothingness' and hand it to God. He provides us with all we need to do all He requires of us.

"And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who love him. who have been called according to his purpose." (Romans 8: 28) ID

Sunday, 20th May - Rev. Bob Prior - Brokeness can lead to usefulness



Matthew 14: 6-33 tells us of the death of John the Baptist, Jesus' feeding of the 5,000 and His walking on water.

On hearing of John's death, Jesus withdrew to be alone, but found a large crowd waiting for Him. He did not ignore them but healed the sick. The crowd needed food so Jesus took the little they had, blessed it and distributed it. There was plenty for everyone. Later Jesus approached the disciples who were in a boat on the lake by walking across the water. Peter also walked on the water towards Jesus but began to sink when he took more notice of the water and the stormy conditions than Jesus.

The story tells us that God is concerned about our needs and can meet those needs abundantly. Jesus provided for the needs of the crowd even though he had just heard of the killing of his cousin John.

Another thing we can learn is that even small insignificant things can be used by and bring glory to God. The loaves and fish were just someone's lunch yet were used to feed over 5000 people.

Having earlier witnessed the feeding of the crowd Peter and the other disciples were out on the lake in a boat battling the wind and waves. Peter was filled with enough trust and confidence in Jesus to walk towards Him across the water however he allowed his concentration to shift away from Jesus and he began to sink until Jesus reached out and caught him. Changing circumstances should not be allowed to shift our focus from Jesus or our trust from God.

Jesus told us "No branch can bear fruit by itself; it must remain in the vine. Neither can you bear fruit unless you remain in me. I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in me and I in you, you will bear much fruit; apart from me you can do nothing." (John 15: 4,5). Without Jesus we can achieve nothing of lasting value but when we are with Him He uses us and even our failings to achieve great things.

Recently Bob visited a woman being held for trial over a criminal matter. Bob had known her some years ago when she was an up and coming sports woman. Unfortunately she suffered in an accident and needed strong drugs as part of her treatment. She became addicted. The addiction led to associations with other addicts and eventually to crime.

The woman was pleased to see her unexpected visitor. She asked.why she had experienced all that she had, but not in a complaining 'why me?' way - she recognised she had acted wrongly. She also spoke of her desire to help others avoid or journey out of the pitfalls she had experienced. Bob shared with her 2 Corinthians 1: 3,4 "*Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God.*" Her experiences enabled her to relate to and help those experiencing similar things. Good was able to come out from bad.

As part of his chaplaincy work, Bob was recently asked to act as an 'interview friend' for someone being interviewed by police about an horrific crime. Bob's role was purely that of an observer but the details of the crime made his stomach churn.

Bob asked that we pray that memories of the interview will pass from him and that in future he will have the wisdom to find out more about what is being asked of him and when to say no.
