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Rev. Peter Nelson - The One Thing Athletes Can't Understand

Athletes understand and learn a lot through their training.

Athletes understand sin. They train to achieve the highest standard in their sport and are very aware when they fail to achieve that goal. What may look a great performance to observers to them can contain a collection of failures to do the best they are capable of. Sin is our failure to meet our own and God's standards. It separates us from God. Athletes understand sin.

Athletes understand judgement. Their performances are scruitinised by the media, the public, their coaches and their peers. They are able to try again and improve after a poor performance but God's judgement of our performance is final. Athletes understand judgement.

Athletes understand suffering. The saying 'no pain, no gain' is well known. They even understand putting others first in a team environment, Their effort and suffering often benefits their team more than themselves. Jesus suffered and died on the cross, not for Himself but for all of us. Athletes understand suffering.

Athletes understand victory. When they win they experience the thrill and elation of victory, but that 'high' gradually fades. Only Jesus' victory over sin and death doesn't lose it's impact. Athletes understand victory.

Athletes **don't** understand grace. Grace is getting something for nothing. To athletes 'achievement never exceeds effort' but God's grace springs from His inexhaustable generosity. Even though we don't deserve it, Jesus gives us righteousness and eternal life.



Paul Noble's book, Noble Spirit

Paul's early days included a fair share of difficulties and upsets for him and his family. He was a 'guest' in several institutions on occasions.

Skipping to the end of the book, we find Paul pursuing Bible College studies and graduating.

In between we discover the events and people who helped bring Paul to where he is today.

Sunday, 22nd July - Rev. Dr. Campbell Egan - A Day in the Life of Jesus

Jesus' life is the best documented in ancient history.

There is much we can learn by examining His life. From Mark 6: 30-34 & 53-56 we can see

- Jesus was Popular. He attracted very large crowds. People came to hear Him teach and for healing.
- Jesus, like we do, needed times of quiet so He could renew His spirit.
- Jesus had compassion. When crowds came to Him, He recognised they were like sheep without a shepherd. He taught them about the Kingdom of God, fed them and healed the sick.

Why is all this important? Mark 1: 1 gives us a clue: "[this is] ... the good news about Jesus the Messiah, the



Son of God".
