


Sunday, 18th May (10th Anniversary Service) – Rev. David McDonald – Who are we?

Sunday, 25th May - Mr. Robert Nicholls - Seek Justice

Christian Blind Mission (CBM) are working to end the cycle of poverty. Their work spans treatment, intervention and education.

Robert mentioned a mother in Lusaka, Zambia. She had been deserted by her husband and was in desperate circumstances. Family lived just across the road but offered no assistance or sympathy. Cheshire Homes (a CBM associate organisation) did help. The family claimed to be christian but their actions said otherwise. Isaiah 1: 15 came to mind:



"When you spread out your hands in prayer, I hide my eyes from you; even when you offer many prayers, I am not listening.

Your hands are full of blood!"

Signs of and actions pointing to God's holiness have on many occasions been turned into empty rituals. God's justice is concerned with how we relate to each other.

Robert mentioned a murderer who had been sent to prison. He was a hard man who displayed little emotion. He needed ongoing medical treatment so over time got to know the prison doctor. The doctor, unknown to the prisoner, knew the victim's family well. After two years he informed the prisoner the family forgave him, as he had been asked to do 'at the right time'. This forgivness offered by the victim's family had a massive impact on him and totalled changed him.

Justice the world offers is imprisonment. God offers justice and forgiveness.

I arrived for the service a few minutes early, was warmly welcomed and went to the seat I usually occupied when attending Reid Church. Moments later a helpful


church member suggested I move to the opposite side of the church where translation

After the sermon, visitors were introduced and given small gifts. A new member was accepted into the congregation and the service ended. We were assembled outside the church for a photograph and then everyone moved over to the large hall for lunch to which I was invited.

I was able to chat to several of the Koreans and in particular the new member who had earlier been welcomed.

It was a special day for that church and I was pleased I could represent our Fellowship at their celebrations. Their contribution to our activities over the years has been appreciated and it has been a joy to join with them every so often as well.




Sunday, 15th June – Rev. Bob Prior – Jesus wants to take you home

Jesus is God

Who is Jesus? He is God!

That may seem self evident to us but how do we show that to others who don't have our Christian background.





We easily quote Genesis 1: 1 which says "In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth." but rarely continue to verse 2 which ends "the **Spirit** of God was hovering over the waters." Genesis also records "Let **us** make mankind in **our** image" (v. 26)

John 1: 1-4 reads "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. He was with God in the beginning. Through him all things were made; without him nothing was made that has been made. In him was life, and that life was the light of all mankind." From that, together with John 1: 14 "The Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." we get another indication of the plurality of God.

Jesus will come back

Jesus left heaven to be a part of this world. Here He suffered and died, rose from the dead and ascended into heaven. The Bible teaches He will come back again. 1 Thessalonians 4: 16 tells us "the Lord himself will come down from heaven, with a loud command, with the voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God" That is not all. "the dead in Christ will rise first. After that, we who are still alive and are left will be caught up together with them in the clouds to meet the Lord in the air. And so we will be with the Lord forever." (1 Thessalonians 4: 16,17)

Why did Jesus die?

God loves us and wants us to be with Him, but we are just not good enough. "Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures" (1 Corinthians 15: 3). "By this gospel you are saved" (1 Corinthians 15: 2).

Who will go home with Jesus?

John 3: 16 tells us "God so loved **the world** ...". It doesn't say "God so loved the rich, the poor, the educated or criminals ...". Does this mean Jesus is coming back for everyone? John 3: 16 goes on "... whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life." It is believers in Jesus who will go home with Him - those who have already 'fallen asleep' and those still alive at the time of His return (1 Thessalonians 4: 16,17). "God has given us eternal life, and this life is in His Son. Whoever has the Son has life; whoever does not have the Son of God does not have life." (1 John 5: 11,12).

Campbell High School Chaplaincy and Steve Lindner

We have been supporting Steve Lindner in his chaplaincy at Campbell High since 2008. This has meant praying for him and his work, supporting Scripture Union which oversees the chaplaincy program and visiting him at the school every so often for a time of sharing and prayer. These visits suffered a lull for quite some time recently but have now resumed. We have arranged to meet Steve at the school usually on the third Thursday of each month at 3-15pm. Please let lan know if you would like to participate in these meetings even if only on an occasional basis.

In addition to his chaplaincy work, Steve is employed by the school to fill other roles. He will be visiting China in late June, early July as part of his work with international students.

Many students turn up for school not having had any or sufficient breakfast. On Tuesdays and Thursdays Steve organises breakfast for whoever wants it. Approximately 60 to 80 students turn up. Breakfast provides Steve with a chance to mix and get to know students better.

A Wednesday lunchtime group is run for Christian students with the help of Steve Prior. This group is quite variable in attendance.

The Thursday lunchtime group sometimes has up to 20 attending but is adjusting to a change of leadership. The former leader is unable to continue as he is becoming a chaplain himself elsewhere and Ben has just taken over. This group has an activity focus and includes a "God spot".

Steve is preparing to run a "Seasons for Growth" course which deals with grief and loss. This course caters for around 8 students. A female student died several days ago, shocking the school community, which has meant a busy time for Steve. This sad event also points to the value of such a course.

Steve sees his role as being someone at the school who is trusted, not judgemental, supportive and approachable.

He requests prayer for wisdom, the best usage of his time and discernment as to how best to interact with the school community. He would welcome more opportunities to speak about matters of faith but must work within restrictions that limit the way such discussions can be initiated.

Several weeks ago, Scripture Union (Qld.) organised a chaplaincy support meeting. Part of the evening was to provide information to supporters of school chaplaincy but another goal was to initiate the formation of support groups for each chaplain to act as a go-between between the chaplain and local churches and the wider community. Chaplains are only employed for 2 days each week so have little time to create or maintain such links despite their value. The support groups will probably meet 3 or 4 times a year. People from Steve's church are keen to create such a group for Steve.

Chaplaincy funding was included in the budget however there is a funding shortfall of \$2,000 for each chaplain. Funding was only made available for the existing number of chaplaincies however additional schools also want to get chaplains.

Since then the High Court has upheld an appeal against chaplaincy funding so some changes are likely. We don't yet know what they will be but chaplaincy will probably continue for now. Funding arrangements will have to be modified.
