

Steve Lindner, chaplaincy, breakfast and the Order of Australia

We have been supporting Steve Lindner in his chaplaincy at Campbell High for some years now in various ways. We have prayed for him and the work with the school community, we have met with him for encouragement and prayer and we have provided some monetary support.

Recently three of us met with Steve at the school, chatted about the opportunities and challenges God is placing before him and everyday life working at the school.

As we were leaving Steve showed us the plaque awarded to the school by The Order of Australia Association in recognition of the activity of the Breakfast Club.

Steve has been running this for 2 days each week for a number of years to provide students who, for whatever reason, haven't eaten breakfast to have something to eat before lessons start. Students are more attentive and better able to learn if they have eaten. We have in a small way contributed to the Breakfast Club by providing money to enable Steve to purchase a special toaster that can meet the demands of high volumes of toast in a relatively short amount of time.

In a year roughly 8,000 breakfasts (cereal and toast) are provided.

Some School Chaplaincy funding is now provided by the Federal government through State and Territory governments. This funding only covers enough hours for almost two days a week. School chaplains will need church and community support if hours are to increase or if the funding is for any reason diverted, reduced or stopped.

A Campbell High chaplaincy support group has been formed to assist Steve in making connections with churches and the community.

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Sunday, 24th August - Rev. David McDonald - Why the Genealogy is the best news ever



David McDonald had an unusual text (Matthew 1: 1-17) for his sermon on August 24.

In the genealogy we find the key to what is important about Jesus. There is a pattern of 14 generations from Abraham to David, 14 generations from David to the exile into Babylon and 14 from the exile to Jesus. The period before Abraham (Genesis 3-11) was full of wickedness, except for Noah. The promises God made to

Abraham and subsequently to David that his throne would be established forever, seemed not to be true because the kings who came after Solomon were nearly all bad, and the Jews were conquered and taken into exile in Babylon.

So what happened to God's promises? The Persians conquered Babylon and let the Jews go back and rebuild Jerusalem. GOOD NEWS! God's promises were fulfilled. God demonstrated His faithfulness by the coming of Jesus, the Messiah, who rules over everything (Matthew 28). God has been at work throughout history and He has kept his promises. Trust Him. HΒ

Christians like to be noble people. What makes people noble? Nobility is not a result of appearance, wealth or social standing. Isaiah 32: 8 tells us "*But the noble make noble plans, and by noble deeds they stand*." It is plain that nobility cannot be judged by outward appearance but is a matter of inner quality. Nobility doesn't end with noble thoughts and plans but is accompanied by action.

When the disciples in Antioch learned of the need of the Christians in Judea, they made the noble decision to assist as they were able. The Christians in Judea were of Jewish heritage, in Antioch they

were Gentiles. The Judean church was the mother church, Antioch an outpost. The Judean Church would have had good financial resources. None of these considerations caused the Antioch Christians to waver. They had decided to help and they did.

The fact that this story is recorded in the Bible tells us that God regarded the Antioch Christians as noble. They made noble plans and put them into action.
