# Sunday, 1st February – Mr. David Hay – Breaking the orphans cycle in South Africa

In early February David, Janenne and Rachel Hay came and told us about their pending move to South Africa. They will be working for SIM at Lily of the Valley and Makaphutu with children who have lost their families due to the HIV/AIDS pandemic which has had such a devastating effect in South Africa.



Lily of the Valley. Lily is a children's village that cares for approximately 120 children, infants through 19 years of age, who have been infected or affected by HIV/AIDS. Our mission is to love and care for these children, as well as the surrounding communities, with the love of Christ.

As well as serving at Lily of the Valley, we will also be serving at a sister village called Makaphutu. Makaphutu Children's Village is about 40km away from Lily, situated in a place of spectacular natural beauty – the Valley of a Thousand Hills! Yet this beautiful place is sadly in the opinion of the experts the epicenter of the HIV/AIDS pandemic in the world.


The Orphan Cycle looks something like this:

- A girl is vulnerable and seen as public property in her community.
- She doesn't have much value.
- At 12 she is raped.
- She is pregnant at 15 and contracts the HIV virus around the same time.
- By the time she is in her twenties, she is too sick to raise her child or get a job.
- The child doesn't go to school, lives totally unsupervised, and is often exposed to abuse.
- By the time the child is 9 years old, her/his mother dies and she/he is an orphan.
- Perhaps this child will sell her/his body.
- Pretty soon, the child will also have contracted HIV and, if a girl, will get pregnant with a child of her own.
- That child will probably have the same story she did.

This is where we come in. With a solution! With hope!

- We take in that 9 year old orphan,
- or that 2 year old orphan,
- or that 13 year old orphan.
- We bring them into a loving, happy home, that unconditionally offers support, care, and nurture.
- We feed and clothe these children, get them medical attention and counseling.
- We send them to school and tutor them everyday for 2 hours until we can get them into a better school.
- We let them discover their dreams.
- We provide role models that show them what responsible parenting and achievement looks like.
- These children will grow up knowing the love of Jesus.
- One day these children will:
  - graduate from highschool
  - apply for university
  - get a job
  - avoid contracting HIV/Aids
  - and become responsible parents when they are ready.
- Their children will have a new future and hope.
- And it will go on for generations.

Ian was able to make it to Elcho Island on Sunday afternoon despite some very challenging weather conditions. He had two passengers from two different homelands (Gawa and Mapuru) who were bringing in chainsaws and supplies. This was among the first of the aid to arrive to those communities.



While in Darwin we put together several food packages for the Yolngu families we knew best. Ian took these to their houses on Monday and the people he met were very grateful and very surprised and touched that someone had thought of their family in this time. Ian was able to talk with some of them about their experience and to check that their families were all ok. It was very special for us to be able to help in this personal and practical way.

Praise God for:

- protecting the people of Galwinku and of Arnhem Land- there were no fatalities or serious injuries!
- His hand over our house and the other MAF houses- two had trees fall on the roofs but no major damage done we are amazed that more houses were not destroyed or damaged!
- the contact we have had with some Yolngu families because of this event

- the clean up effort
- more opportunities to speak to Yolngu and help them see Christ in this event

# Sunday, 8th February – Rev. David McDonald – Partnership in the Gospel



In the Letter to the Philippians Paul talks about partnership and sharing. He talks about partnership in the Gospel [Phil. 1:5], sharing in God's grace [Phil. 1:7], sharing in God's Spirit [Phil. 2:1], participation in Christ's sufferings [Phil. 3:10] and of the way the Philippians shared with him in his troubles [Phil. 4:14,15].

As Christians we are united by sharing in the Spirit of Christ, what Christ has done for us and in us.

Are there practical ways we can share together? The Philippians showed us one way by sending aid to Paul when he was in need [Phil. 4:16]. Paul shows us another way. While in prison, he gave thanks to God for the Philippians and he prayed for them.

Charles Spurgeon, the famous 19th century preacher, when asked the secret of his success, replied that his people prayed for him. Prayer is powerful and praying is something we can all do.

We can pray about matters we know about and make our prayers specific. Sometimes that is not possible. Paul tells us his prayer and we can learn from it how to pray powerfully and helpfully without knowing details of a given set of circumstances. Paul prays for purpose "that your love may abound more and more in knowledge and depth of insight, so that you may be able to discern what is best and may be pure and blameless for the day of Christ" [Phil. 1:9,10]. He also prays for the end result "[so that you may be] filled with the fruit of righteousness that comes through Jesus Christ—to the glory and praise of God." [Phil. 1:11].

Dave shared with us a couple of items of interest.

- On a personal level, he and Fiona are travelling to Melbourne to see a world expert on the type of cancer Dave suffers from.
- The Stromlo Christian Church where Dave is Pastor has a welcome problem. There are around 130 children within the church however the church's children's worker has recently left which leaves a lot of work for others. Fiona is temporarily filling this position until someone else can be found.

# Sunday, 15th February – Mrs. Joyce Hall – The love of God

This is a world where there is constant change. One consequence is that many people find lasting relationships difficult. They crave loyalty and care but often what they get is indifference or rejection.

God is not like that. He doesn't reject us.

God gave everything for us. He IS love and we share in the love God gives.

Love is more than a pleasant emotional feeling that many people believe it to be. Love involves rightness and discipline.



Mary, Martha and Lazarus knew and loved Jesus and He loved them. When Lazarus fell ill, Jesus

appeared to fail his friends by not immediately going to them. When He did arrive Lazarus was dead. Martha and later Mary expressed their belief that their brother would not have died had Jesus been there. Jesus told Martha that Lazarus would rise again. He continued "*I am the resurrection and the life. The one who believes in me will live, even though they die; and whoever lives by believing in me will never die.*" [John 11: 25,26]. Jesus shared the emotion of His friends and wept, but then He called to Lazarus to leave his tomb and Lazarus emerged.

Why did Jesus act as He did? God often has a greater purpose than we can recognise. Jesus did not ignore the needs of his friends. He shared their sincere love and grief. By waiting as He did he was able to not only restore Lazarus to life but show everyone there something of the Glory of God.

In this story we can see God's love at work but we can also better see the extent of God's love. It does not end when we die, death is no barrier to Jesus and God's love.

## Sunday, 22nd February – Rev. Phil Anderson – The clash of the kingdoms - unseen made visible



Many people see science and faith as incompatible. Science tells us a lot about this world and how things operate, but faith too gives us insight into living. Both show us an aspect of our being. A fish inhabits a water world and is not aware of what lies beyond the water. A few creatures, like dolphins, catch a glimpse of what is beyond. Humans are a bit like dolphins in that they only catch glimpses beyond the physical world they know.

After John the Baptist was imprisoned, Jesus proclaimed the good news of God and said. '"The kingdom of God has come near. Repent and believe the good news!"'

It was a time of opportunity for those who heard him. Jesus challenged them to believe then understand which is the way of faith.

If we make ourselves available to God, He can use us. We would not choose deceitful Jacob, or David with his faults, or Peter with his impulsiveness or Saul / Paul who originally set out to persecute Christians to be great men of faith or leaders of God's people, but God did.

We should not live by this world's standards but by God's.

Science is good and can explain many things. It works by deducing answers after examining facts. Faith works differently and is less understood by people today. Faith comes first and then confirmation follows. Science and faith do not conflict but they do present different approaches and viewpoints to looking at this world and our place in it. ID




