Alphonso 19th, King of Spain was a good man who noticed that the young men who attended his banquets did not offer thanks to God before eating. He decided to teach them a lesson.

At the next banquet a beggar wandered in, ate his fill and then wandered off again. The young men were indignant that he had eaten from the King's table but not offered any thanks to the King. At this point the King pointed out that they had also not offered thanks to the God who had provided so abundantly for their needs.

Joyce used Psalm 34 for her text. It is a psalm that is filled with praise for God and highlights His goodness to His people.

The psalm ends "The Lord will rescue his servants; no one who takes refuge in him will be condemned." [Psalm 34: 22]

India Update

It is with heavy hearts we announce that on 15 March 2017, Compassion will formally end all program operations in India.

This is an extremely difficult decision that affects more than 147,000 children and 589 local partners in India. Our hearts break with yours as we think about what this

means for them—and for you, our sponsors and supporters in India.

However, we trust God and His plan in the midst of all this, even though we don't fully understand it now.

Why is this happening?

We have not been given a definitive response from the Indian authorities as to why they have chosen to restrict our funding and limit our operations—or why they have refused to lift their restrictions. We believe there are two primary reasons.

- 1. The current India government has placed increased scrutiny specifically against NGOs. Some of their concerns are that foreign aid comes with expectations, so they want to reduce their dependency on foreign funding. In the past 12 months we have seen many NGOs, big and small, faith-based and secular, affected by the government's restrictions.
- 2. We also believe their decision not to lift the restrictions is, at least in part, religiously motivated. We are a Christ-centred, child-focused and church-based organisation that seeks to serve children living in poverty as a response to our faith and Jesus' call to care for the poor.

But it's important to note that Compassion accepts and serves children and communities of all faith backgrounds (or no faith background), and categorically does not require or force conversion to Christianity at any time. Our support for children and their families is in no way linked to their religious affiliation or beliefs.

Compassion's primary mission is to release children from poverty, not convert them.

Hope for the future

This news is not what we have prayed for over so many months. Yet we know and accept that working in India, and all countries where poverty is so extreme, comes with many different challenges. We're so grateful for your continued partnership in all seasons, but especially during times like these.

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In the meantime, please join with us in prayer for India. Here are updated requests to join us in praying:

- Please pray for your sponsored children and their families. Pray that they will draw comfort from God's presence and find their security in him. Pray that children will not lose the sense of safety, protection and belonging they found through Compassion's local partners, the program staff and their friends. Pray that God will continue to lead the children, develop them, and call them on to great things.
- Please pray for the local partners in India who will continue to serve children without the funding Compassion has historically provided—pray for wisdom and creativity as they seek the resources they need and the best ways they can minister to their children.
- Please pray for our Compassion India staff as they make difficult decisions during this time.
- And we at Compassion are praying that sponsors and supporters like you will continue to advocate for children living in extreme poverty through this turbulent time.

Thank you for standing with us to release children from poverty in Jesus' name.

<u>Sunday, 12th February – Rev. Phil Anderson – Living life to the fullest</u>

When people discuss life, what are they talking about? Life is more than just biological living. People are sometimes described as 'full of life'. In that context life incorporates a certain quality, vitality and enthusiasm.

How do we go about choosing life?

To really obtain life we should embrace God's laws. Psalm 119: 1-8 talks about God's laws and decrees, and states that those who follow them are blessed.

Worldly wisdom suggests that feeling good is an end in itself but the good life by itself lacks meaning.

A life worth living includes the ability to connect with others in a meaningful way and that requires a capacity for selflessness. A pursuit of happiness brings misery but a life moulded by discipline, structure and morality produces fulfillment.

Results in any endeavour come at a price. A runner trains hard to succeed. Without the discipline of the training regime, success is just a dream. Things take effort and so it is with life.

God's law is more than a set of inflexible rules. We need to conform to the spirit of those laws not just follow them with blind obedience. In Jesus we see a life lived to the fullest. Jesus fulfilled the law.

Why should we do things?

We are instructed to love God and to love one another. That gives us ample motivation and guidance to live life as God wants us to and in a way which will give us fulfilling lives.

Anger, immorality and deceptive speech are not a part of that life but Godly living in thought, word and deed is the goal that will bring fulfillment.





Over the last few years a good number of our people have attended the Scripture Union Regeneration dinners and enjoyed good food, entertainment and inspiring speakers.

2017 has been no different.

Once again the food this year gave no reason for complaint and SCAT, a jazz band, did their job well.

The MC injected some humour into his comments and conducted a question and answer session with two young people who had attended a Scripture Union Zone 40 camp. This gave us a real insight into the running and value of such camps, covering topics such as activities, leaders, best aspects of camp, groups, etc.. The attendees are obviously fed well as 'the food' was mentioned as a best part of camp. When asked if camp was worth attending the answer 'Yes, as long as you don't go for the sleep' said volumes.

There were three speakers during the evening.

Ana Davey spoke about Scripture Union, not as an organisation, but as a diverse collection of God's people come together to do His work. She looked back at all that has been achieved in God's name through Scripture Union over the last 150 years SU has been operating in Australia and emphasised the need to continually look for the best ways to connect with the present day community so lives can be changed.

Guest speaker, Mark McCrindle, is a social researcher who was able to give us a fascinating summary of the way Australian society has changed in the last 150 years. The population has grown considerably, many new products and technologies have come into existance and the ways we interact have changed. We cannot avoid change and must adapt as society changes about us however we have a message that remains just as important for people today as it was for those 150 years ago.

The final speaker was a mother who attended a Scripture Union camp during her school years and has since been actively involved in a number of Scripture Union activities. She was eager to reach out to young people with God's love and found Scripture Union initiatives, such as SUPA clubs, a wonderful means to do that.

The Regeneration Dinner provided a very enjoyable evening, informed us of the value and potential of SU's work and I'm sure will have raised a good amount to support that work.
