Ron told us he had always believed there was a God, even though he didn't always know Him well. His mother died when he was 14. That didn't make sense to him, but he did what he was told by his father.

One Saturday he watched an enthralling rugby match against Fiji. The result was a draw. The following day he saw a choir formed by the Fijian team at church. God was trying to get his attention.

Pre (before) **venient** (come). Prevenient is preceding / preparation. God calls us - we respond. God is watching over us, protecting us even before we are aware of it.

Prevenient Grace is with us from birth, preparing us for life with Christ - we love Him because He first loved us.

The Fijian rugby team encounter Ron saw as God speaking to him saying 'I love sport too, we have a common interest'. God was making the first move in their relationship.

John Newton had lived a wild un-Godly life but God 'found' him.

C.S. Lewis said he came into Christianity 'kicking and screaming'. It wasn't his intention but God's.

God always makes the first move, not us. He prepares us for his approach and we can then accept or reject.

Ron worked as a missionary in Papua New Guinea for a period. He was helped in that work by the natives understanding that their ancestors had thought about a 'bigger spirit' and that sometime someone would come to tell them about that spirit. God had prepared them too.

Afternoon to will follow or the Chirol Hall


