





Sunday, 5th November – Pastor Opi Nduati - The Good Samaritan

We first met Opi Nduati when he visited us and preached in June 2008. At that time the work with street kids in Nairobi, Kenya had just begun and the resources available, (manpower and property), were very limited. Since then more staff have joined the work and the facilities available have grown from a rented house to a five acre property.

500 years and 12 days since Martin Luther nailed his Ninety-five Theses on the door of the Castle Church, Wittenberg, Germany meant that the start of the Protestant Reformation was on the minds of many of today's Christians.

One of Luther's arguements was against the concept of purgatory - a place where souls supposedly went after death for a period of purification before moving on to heaven. After 500 years we might expect that that heresy would no longer persist. Unfortunately David was able to provide an example of such mistaken thinking by a media personality who had come back to faith recently.

The question of how we can be right with God is important. The temptation to ask have we done enough to get into heaven can easily come to us. The answer to that guestion is of course, NO WE HAVEN'T AND NEVER COULD.

A better question to ask is 'Is my faith in Jesus well founded and will that get me to heaven?' That question provides a resounding YES!

We are saved by faith alone. We can trust that Jesus completely paid the price for our sin.

Trusting in ourselves or Jesus - that is what the Reformation was all about.

There are churches today that could benefit from 95 theses being nailed to their doors.

Sunday, 10th December – Rev. Bob Prior - The gift we may all give at Christmas

As he speaks with people, Bob often hears comments along the line that God doesn't exist or He has died or has lost interest in us - 'How can bad things keep happening? Why do good people die while evil continues?'

Psalm 94 shows that such thinking has been around for a very long time. God can seem inactive and unconcerned however the Psalm also recognises that God does take note of human actions and punishes the wicked.



These days many people proudly profess that they have no religious beliefs however those who disregard God, usually admit that this world would be a much better place if everyone simply obeyed the ten commandments.

Humanity's sin and disregard for God brings with it the consequences of sin however God's unfailing love supports those who honour Him and He becomes their refuge.

God's punishment always leaves open the opportunity to turn back to Him.

- God's desire is not to destroy us but to save us which is achieved through faith in Jesus. "For God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but to save the world through him. Whoever believes in him is not condemned, but whoever does not believe stands condemned already because they have not believed in the name of God's one and only Son." [John 3: 16-18]
- "'Evervone who calls the name of the on saved.' How, then, can they call on the one they have not believed in? And how can they believe in the one of whom they have not heard? And how can they hear without someone preaching to them? And how can anyone preach unless they are sent? As it is written: 'How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!" [Romans 10: 13-16]. That is a message for us as is "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." [Matthew 28: 19,20].
- God is able to use us this Christmas, and at any other time, if we simply speak about our own experience of faith and the journey to it. "Very truly I tell you, we speak of what we know, and we testify to what we have seen" [John 3: 11]. We can be honest in our testimonies. We are not 'good' people we are forgiven people.

'12 Days of Christmas'

There is one particular Christmas song that seems quite nonsensical. What do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge that won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas?

On the First day of Christmas my true love sent to me a Partridge in a Pear Tree.

This cumulative song has been used as a 'forfeit' game. The first player says / sings the first verse, then the next player repeats the verse adding an extra line. This continues for each player and forfeits occur when the verses are repeated incorrectly. Forfeits may be predecided but could take the form of a sweet or a kiss.

One explanation of the lyrics' origin, not accepted by most scholars, suggests the song was intended as a catechism song to help young Catholics learn their faith, at a time when practising Catholicism was criminalised in England (1558 until 1829). Each gift has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning. Each element in the song has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.

- 1. The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
- 2. Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.
- 3. Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.
- 4. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
- 5. The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.
- 6. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
- 7. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.
- 8. The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
- 9. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- 10. The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.
- 11. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.
