Christmas lights the minimalist way




Have you noticed that the lit up house doesn't have Father Christmas, reindeer or the common Christmas lights subjects (at least that I can make out), but does have a nativity scene with three wise men in attendance?

There are still some people prepared to proclaim the true significance of Christmas.

Sunday, 9th December - Mr. Roy Dallos - "What right do you have?": Jonah was angry at God

Over some months and quite a few sermons, Roy has taken us through the book of Jonah looking at God's dealing with Jonah himself and the Ninevites and at the lessons we can learn from the book.





The passage Jonah: 3: 10 - 4: 4 tells us God relented from destroying Ninevah when He saw how the people had changed. This angered Jonah. He knew the evil ways of the Ninevites in the past and wanted the destruction he had preached to take place. He knew God was loving and compassionate and anticipated God's mercy but believed the Ninevites past sins had earned them God's wrath and their repentance should not change that. God asked him "Is it right for you to be angry?"

The Ninevites had repented and called on God for mercy.but Jonah believed that it was just not right that God should change His mind and give it. Jonah despised God's mercy and misunderstood it. God had long been known to offer mercy if people repented of their sins and turned back to Him.

Jonah looked on the Ninevites as a lost cause yet they responded to his preaching of God's message in a matter of days, something the Israelites failed to do after years of his preaching.

Like Jonah, we have no right to determine what God should do..

Sunday, 16th December - Rev. Paul Tabulutu - A time for reflections

The speaker at the Indonesian carols service mentioned how she had grown up with an eye on the clock so she would be on time for whatever events she had scheduled for her day. Working in communities with a much more relaxed attitude to time she found it difficult to adjust to the concept of starting when people eventually turned up, perhaps some considerable time after the clock suggested.

This Sunday we had our own experience of flexible time. Our preacher was unfazed as being Fijian he felt very at home with starting when the congregation was gathered and ready rather than being dictated to by the clock.

Vince was to lead our service but an unforseen family health concern demanded his presence and he could not come.

After a short wait we began without him, sang a christmas carol, came before God with a short prayer then launched into the service as planned. Midway through the service we received the message he sent us earlier in the day but had not been received until then.

Paul preached on 'A time for reflection' using the reading 1 Thessalonians 3: 6-13 for his text.

Paul, Silas and Timothy had visited Thessalonica and established a group of believers there. This passage was written to those believers in response to a report by Timothy after he had paid a second visit to them. Paul was looking back with joy at what God had achieved among the Thessalonians, encouraging them and exhorting them to continue and grow in their faith and love.

Our service concluded with Communion.

After a worship service a mother with a fidgety seven-year old boy told how she finally got her son to sit still and be quiet.

About half way through the sermon, she leaned over and whispered, 'If you don't be quiet, the Pastor is going to lose his place and will have to start his sermon all over again!'
It worked.




